

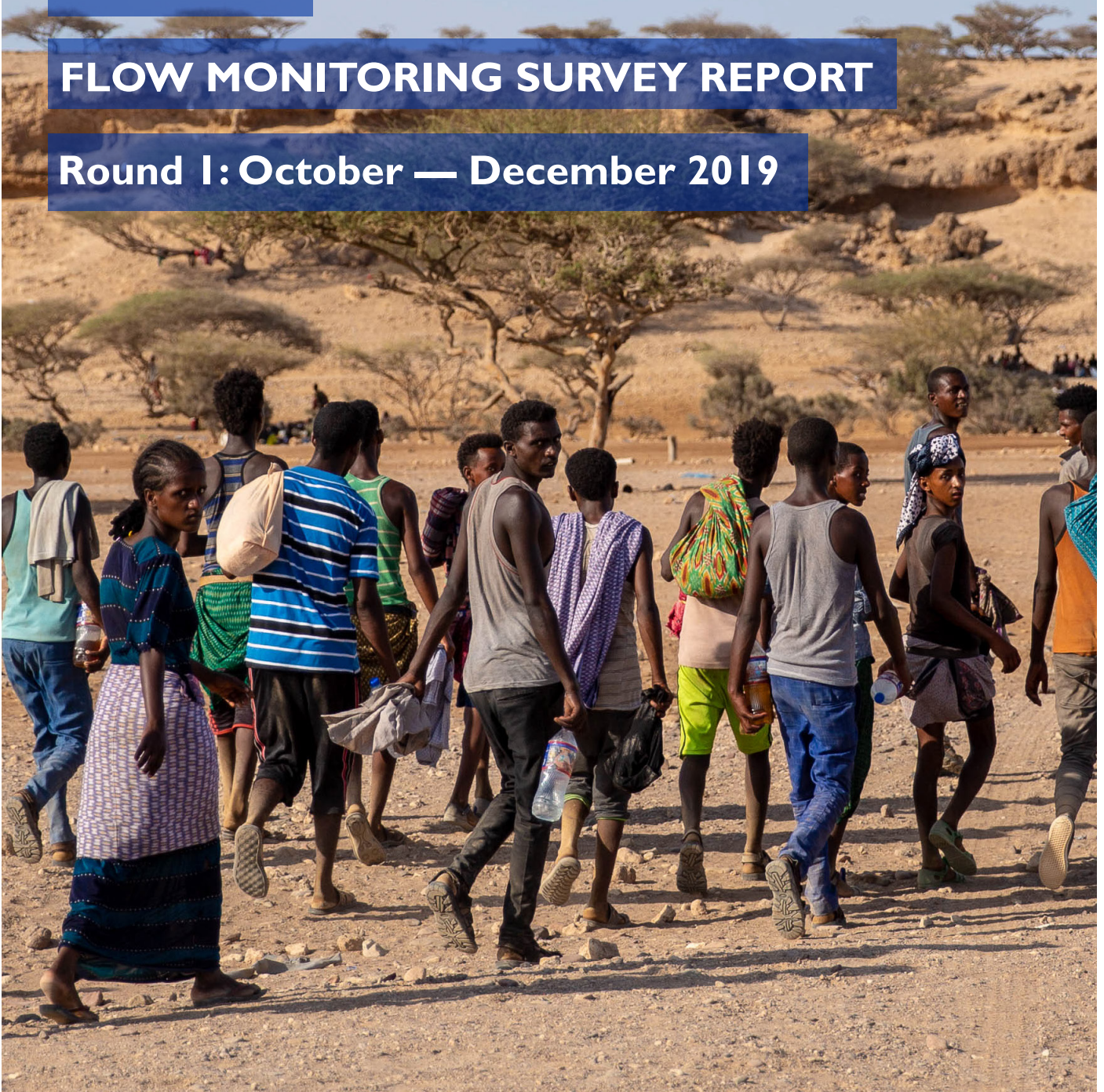

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DISCLAIMER

Data presented in this document are representative of the individuals captured at the flow monitoring points during the timeframe indicated. Data should not be generalised and do not represent a full picture of inter and intra-regional migration, but rather of migration flows at the specific locations monitored. For example, while IOM aims to establish flow monitoring points at locations with high transit flows (based on information from informed stakeholders), flows are fluid and specific locations will provide an incomplete picture. The monitoring of flows in an assessed location should not lead to assumptions about flows in a non-assessed location or area without monitoring points.

Migrants adjust their routes according to opportunities and obstacles they encounter along their journey. Their intended transit and destination locations are often subject to change. This renders the systematic assessment of their mobility throughout the region complex.

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METHODOLOGY

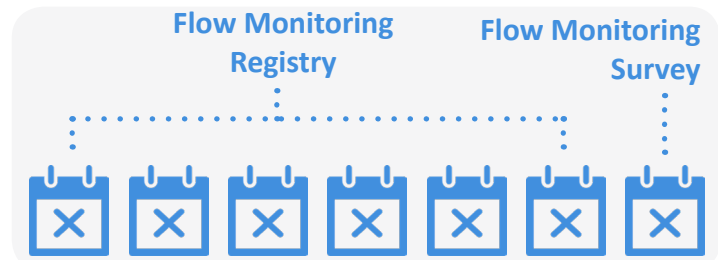

Flow Monitoring Registry is conducted 6 days a week, while Flow Monitoring Survey is conducted once a week (on a different day every week)

**Migrants who did not give their consent to be interviewed and migrants who have participated in the survey before were thanked and the interviews were discontinued.*

Flow Monitoring is one of the four components of IOM’s Displacement Tracking Matrix (DTM), a system that tracks and monitors displacement and population mobility. Flow Monitoring generally relies on two tools, (i) Flow Monitoring Registry (FMR), which observes migration flows and produces quantitative, observational data based on groups arriving or departing together and (ii) Flow Monitoring Survey (FMS) which produces qualitative data on intentions and profiles of individuals.

Both exercises are conducted at flow monitoring points (FMPs), which are often major transport hubs or key border crossings points of high mobility, identified through extensive consultation with key informants. These key informants are often government officials, local community leaders, and humanitarian partners who have widespread knowledge about population mobility in their respective locations.

Data is collected on a daily basis during regular working hours at these points by trained

enumerators and supervised by designated field staff. It is important to note that this methodology allows for regular information on trends along or within a specific network of points that track a particular migratory route in question. However, the restricted geographic coverage, time constraint and self-reported nature of responses all constitute limitations to the methodology, which does not provide representative data but rather an indication of trends.

The findings in this report are reflective of data collected from 1 October to 31 December 2019. During this period, a total of 30,953 movements were observed through Flow Monitoring Registry, and 1,855 migrants responded to the Flow Monitoring Survey. However, of the FMS sample, 66 respondents had already participated in the survey before and 86 respondents did not consent to being interviewed, bringing the sample size to 1,703 respondents. Children below the age of 14 years old were not asked to participate in the survey.

Number of migrants surveyed

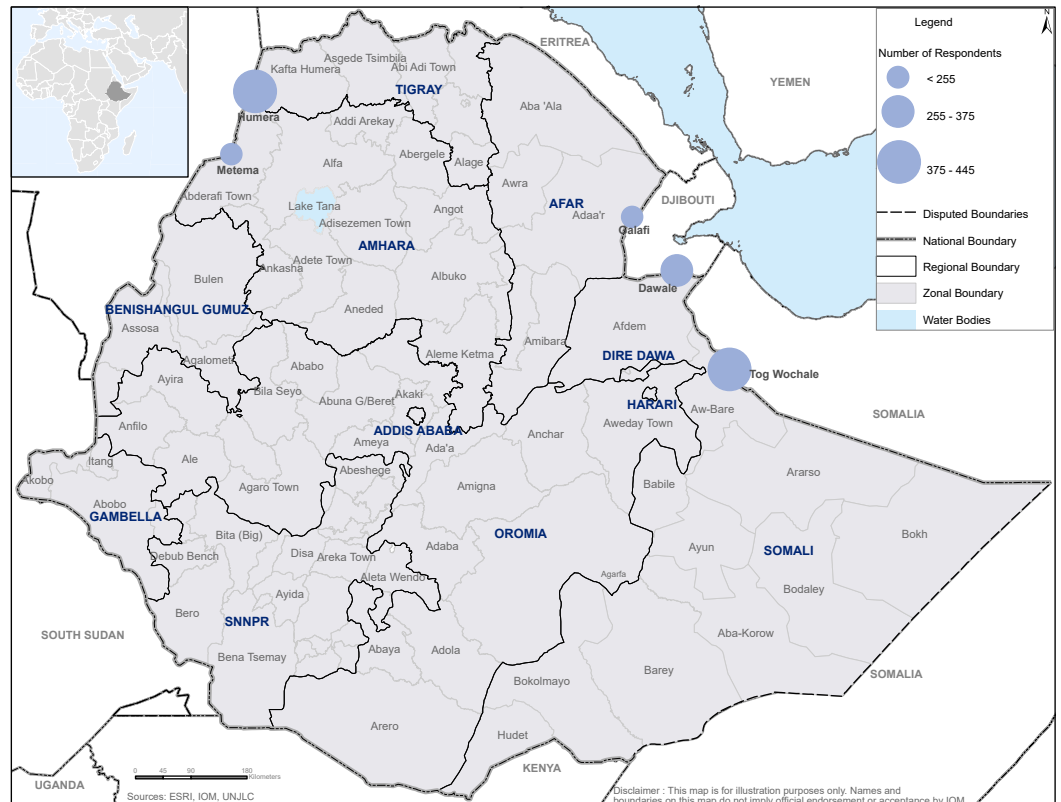


Figure 1: Number of migrants surveyed at each flow monitoring point.

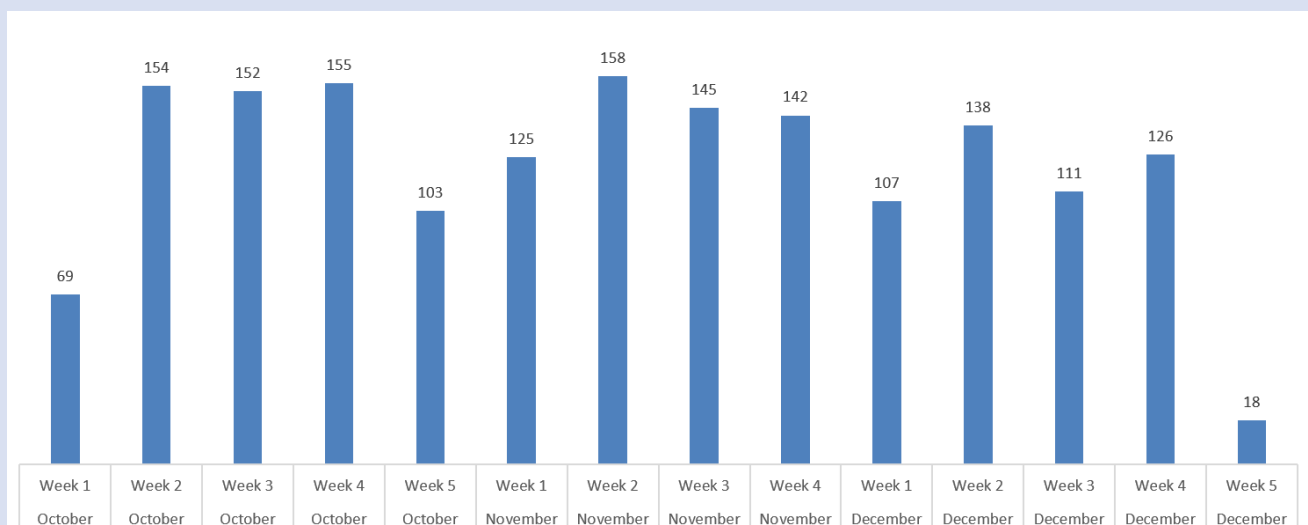
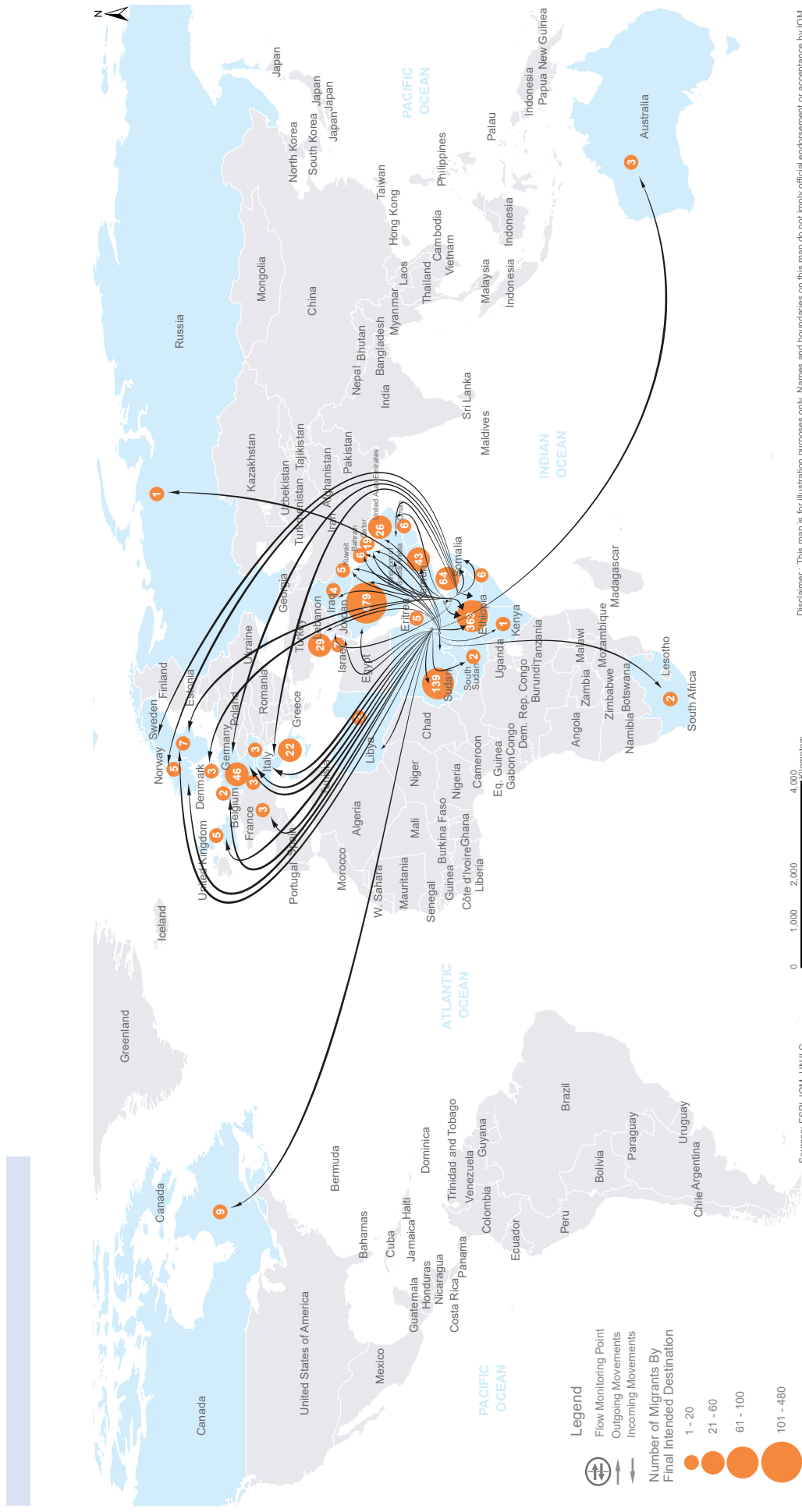


Figure 2: Number of migrants surveyed each week from October to December 2019.

On the other hand, Figure 2 shows the number of migrants surveyed each week across the 5 FMPs throughout the reporting period. Note that changes in the number of surveyed migrants do not necessarily reflect broader migration trends. A high number of surveys were answered during the

second to fourth week of October and during the second week of November. There is a positive correlation between the number of flows captured through the Flow Monitoring Registry tool and the number of surveys answered through the Flow Monitoring Survey tool.

Figure 3: Final intended destinations of migrants inflowing and outflowing from Ethiopia.

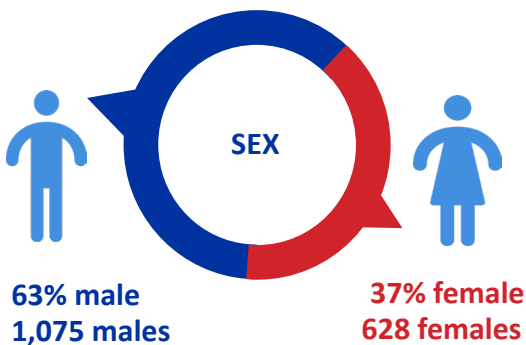

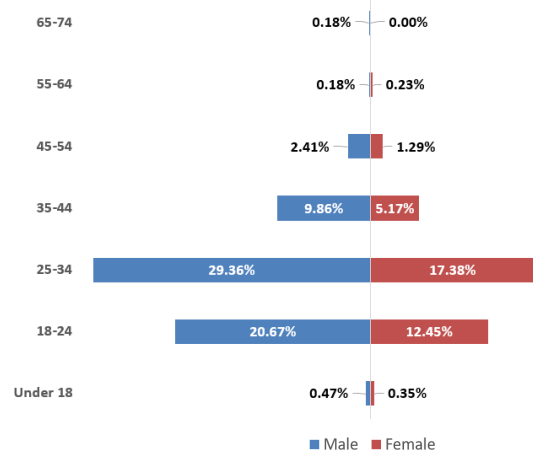

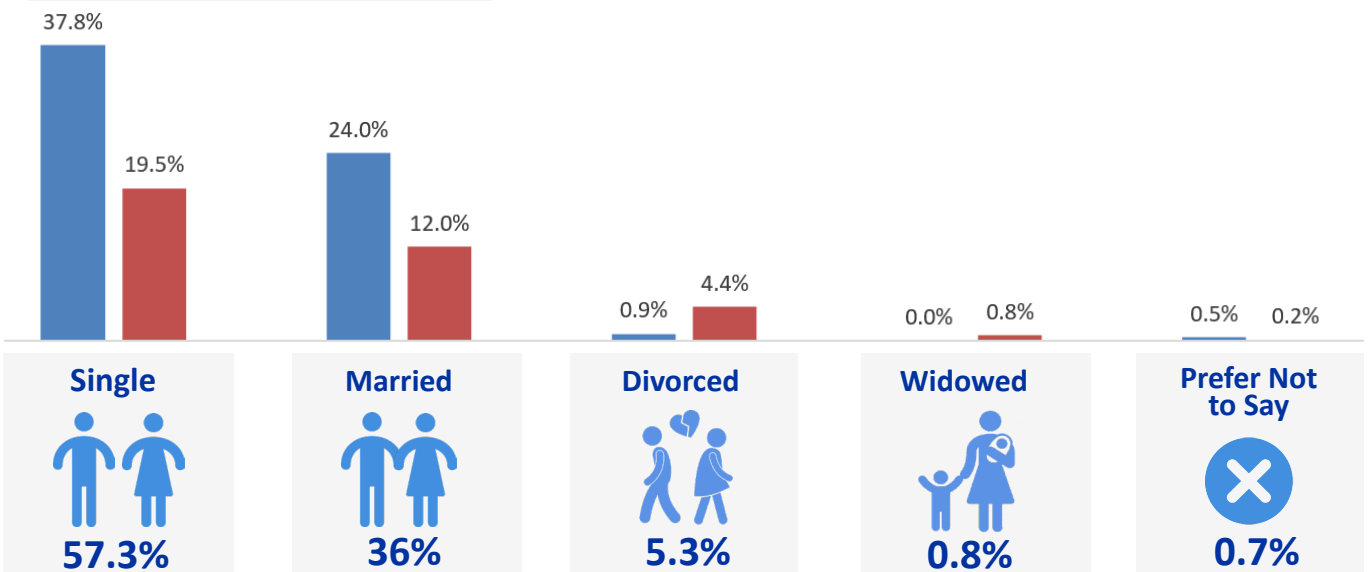
Sex of Migrants

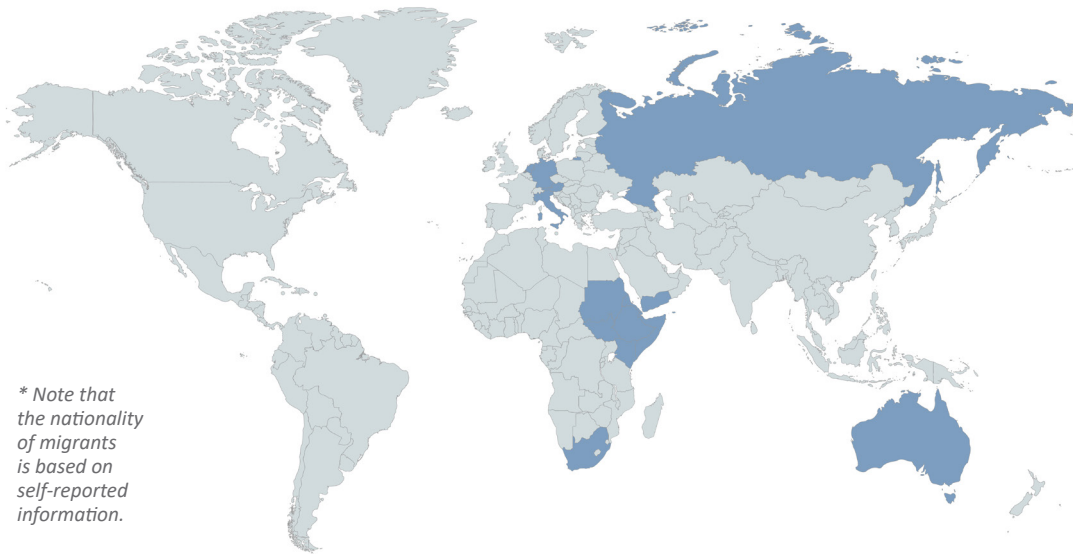


Sex and Age of Migrants



Marital Status of Migrants



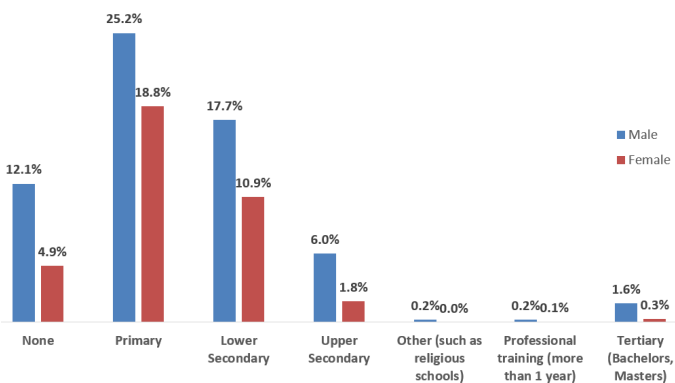

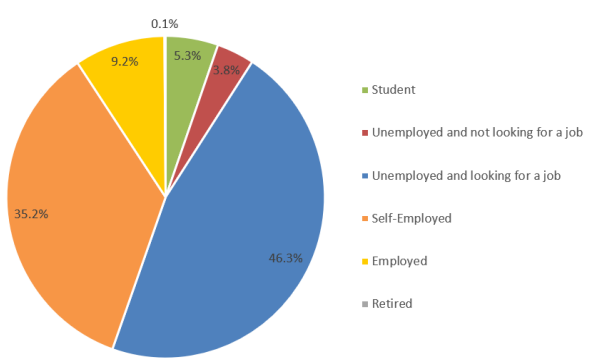

Highest Level of Education of Migrants

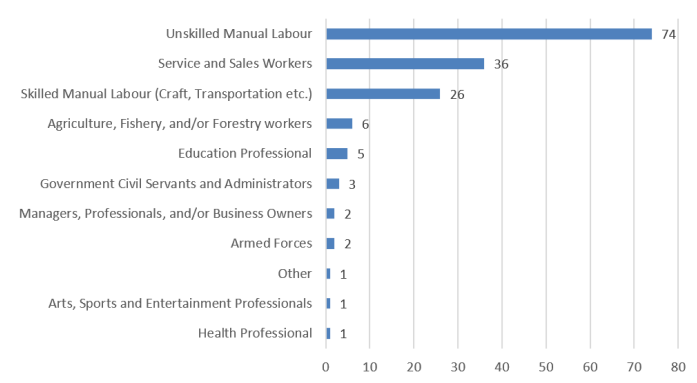


The most common level of education reportedly obtained by respondents was primary (44%). A sizeable portion of migrants (28.6%) received lower secondary education. Meanwhile, 17% of migrants stated that they had not received any form of education.

Main Profession/Occupation of Migrants Prior to Departure

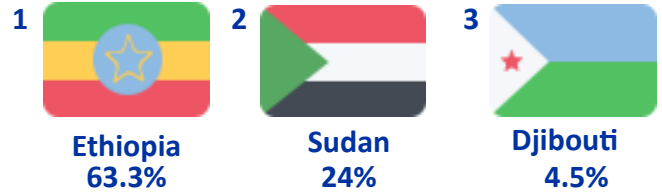
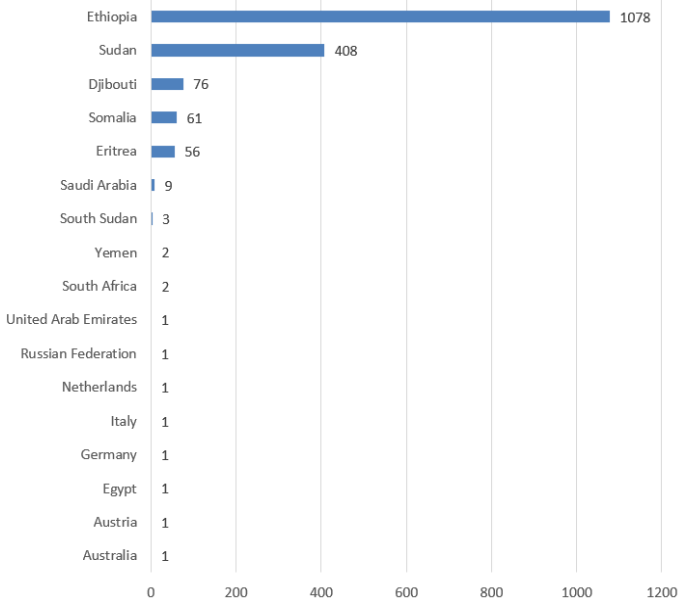


An estimated 44.5% of migrants are either employed or self-employed, while roughly 50.1% of migrants are unemployed.

Of the 157 migrants who revealed their main occupation prior to departure, a majority are unskilled manual labourers (74 individuals or 47%).

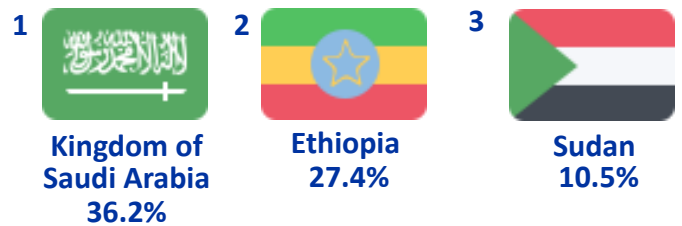
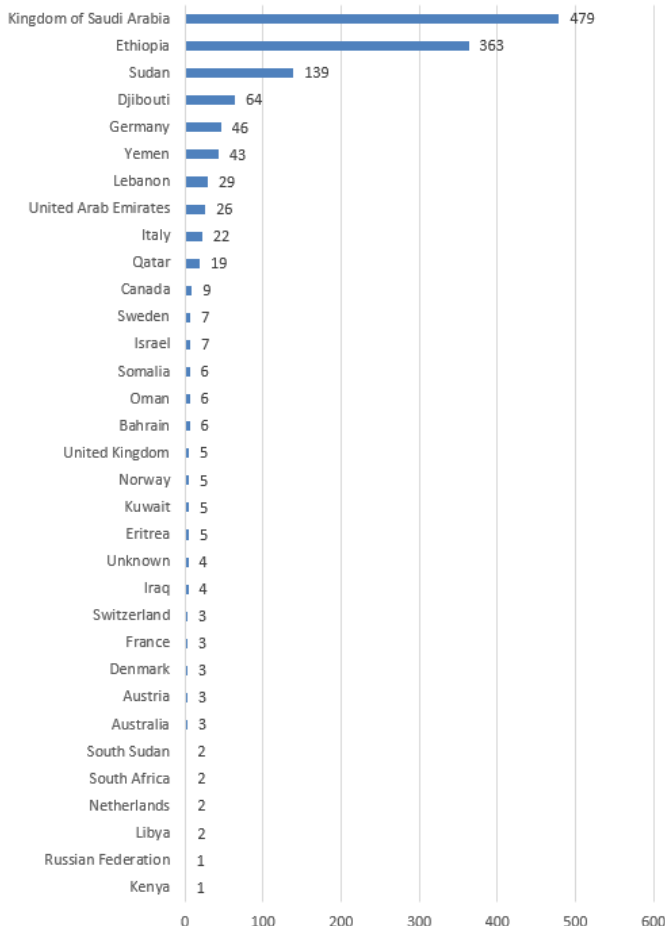
Country of Departure

Country of Intended Final Destination

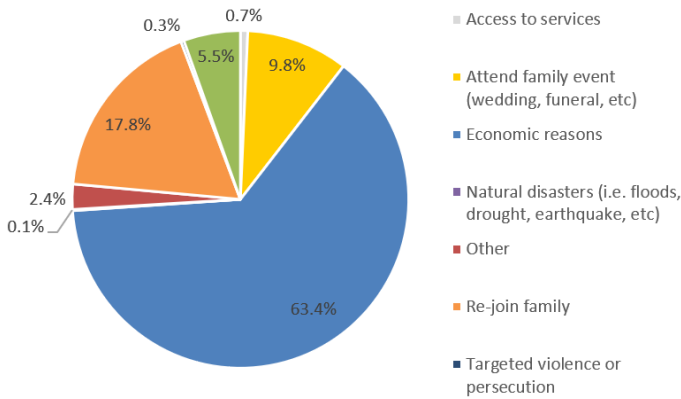


Of the 1,703 migrants who revealed their country of departure, a large majority of them left from Ethiopia (1,078 migrants or 63.3%). As many as 476 migrants (36%) intend to travel from Ethiopia to the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia.

The second largest group consist 408 migrants (24%) who originally left Sudan and came to Ethiopia. Of that figure, 291 migrants (22%) who departed from Sudan indicated that Ethiopia was their intended final destination.

The third largest country of departure is Djibouti where 76 migrants (4.5%) originated from, before arriving in Ethiopia. Of that number, 34 migrants (2.6%) cited Ethiopia as their intended final destination.

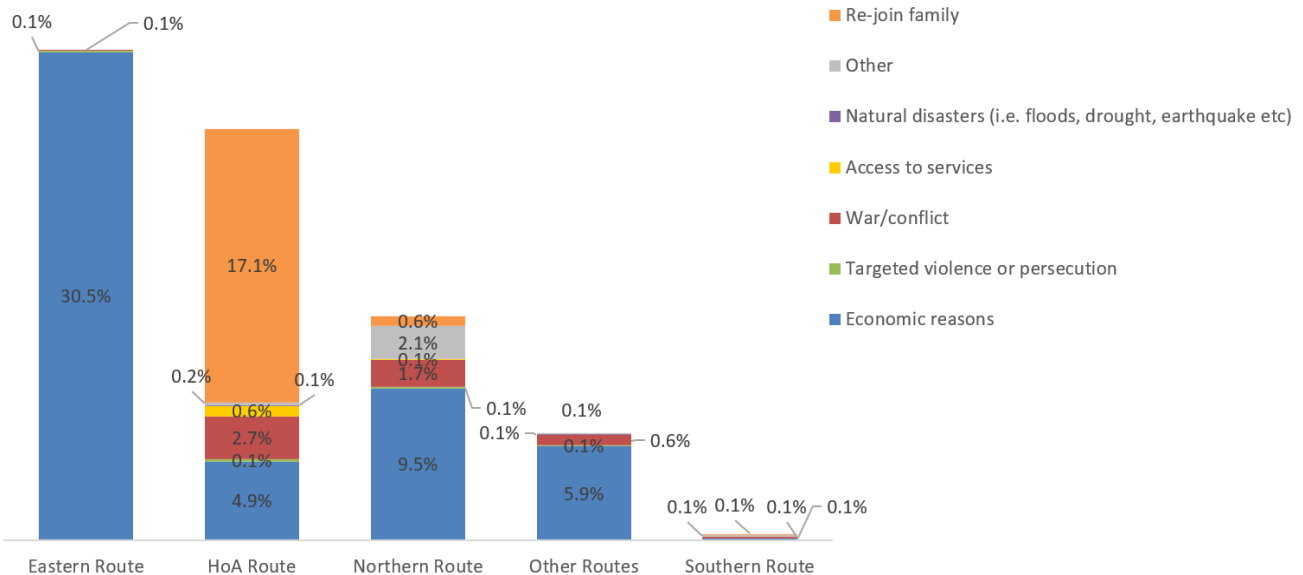
Reasons for the Journey



“63.4% (1,080 migrants) cite economic reasons as the main motivator for embarking on their journey.”

The reason behind the journey of most migrants is due to economic reasons (63.4% or 1,080 migrants), followed by wanting to rejoin family members (17.8% or 303 migrants) and attending family events (9.8% or 167 migrants).

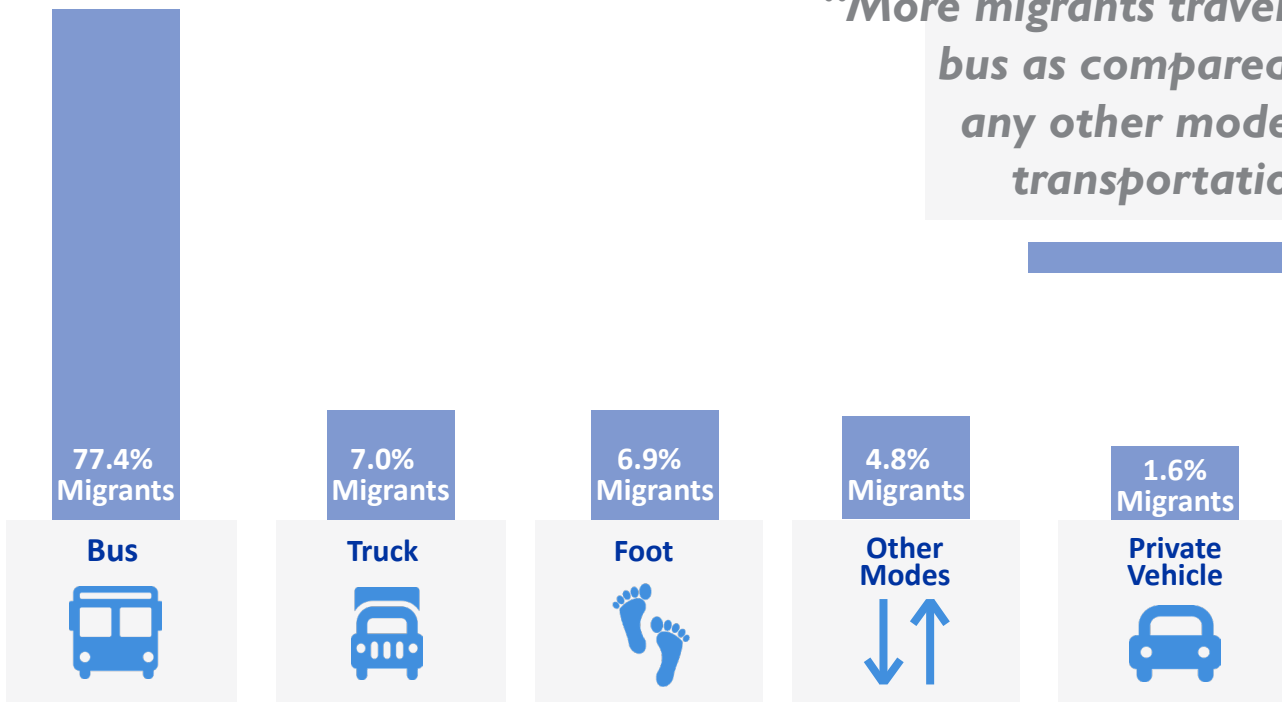
Reasons for the Journey by Destination



30.5% of migrants travel on the Eastern route for economic reasons, and this is the overwhelming reason for embarking on this route. The main reason for taking the Horn of Africa route is to rejoin family as reported by

17.1% of migrants. The main reason for taking the Northern route and other route is for economic reasons as shown by 9.5% of migrants and 5.9% of migrants respectively.

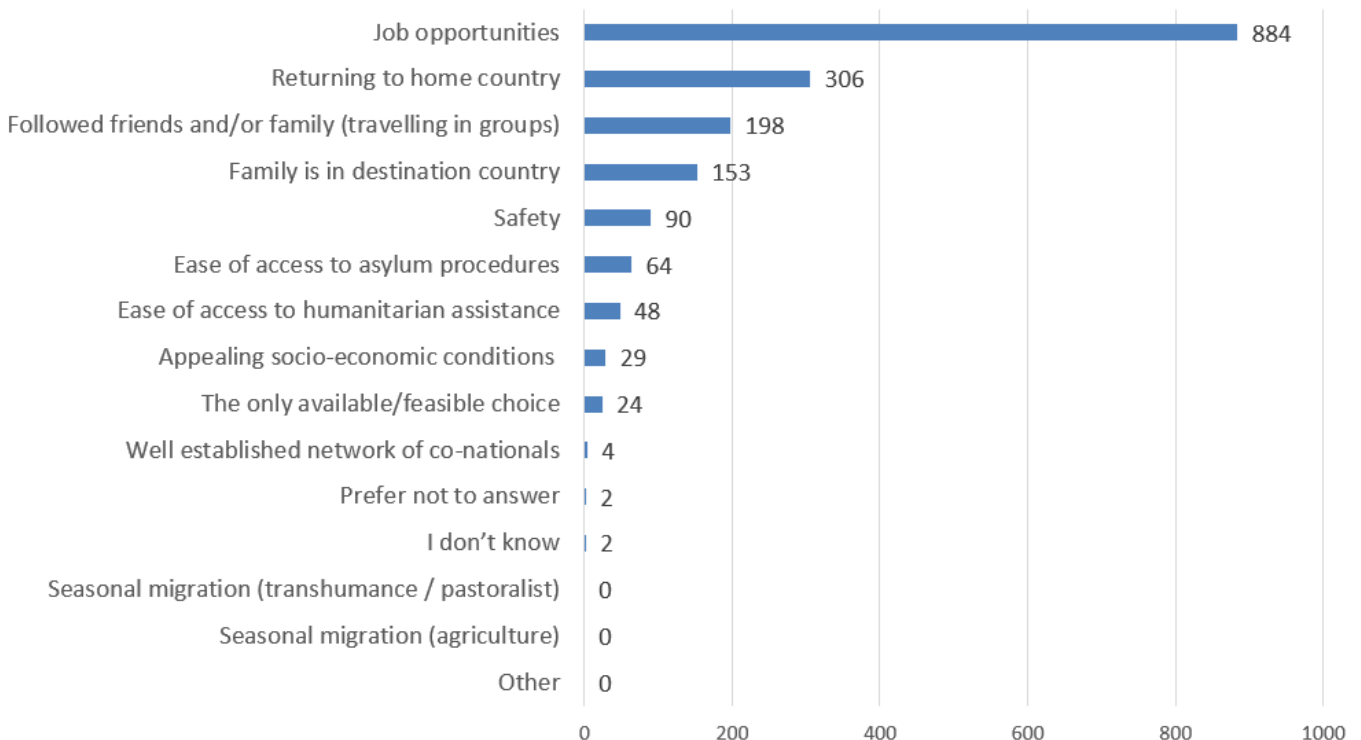
Top 5 Modes of Transportation

3. INTENTIONS

Reason for Choosing Destination Country



When asked about the reason behind the choice of destination country, an overwhelming majority of 884 migrants (81.5%) cited job opportunities as the main reason. This is followed by 306 migrants (17%) who mentioned that they are returning to their home countries. Meanwhile, 198 migrants (11%) are following their friends or family along

the journey while 153 migrants (8.5%) chose the destination country because their family is there. 64 migrants (3.5%) cited ease of access to asylum procedures as the reason behind the choice of destination country and 48 migrants (2.7%) cited ease of access to humanitarian assistance.

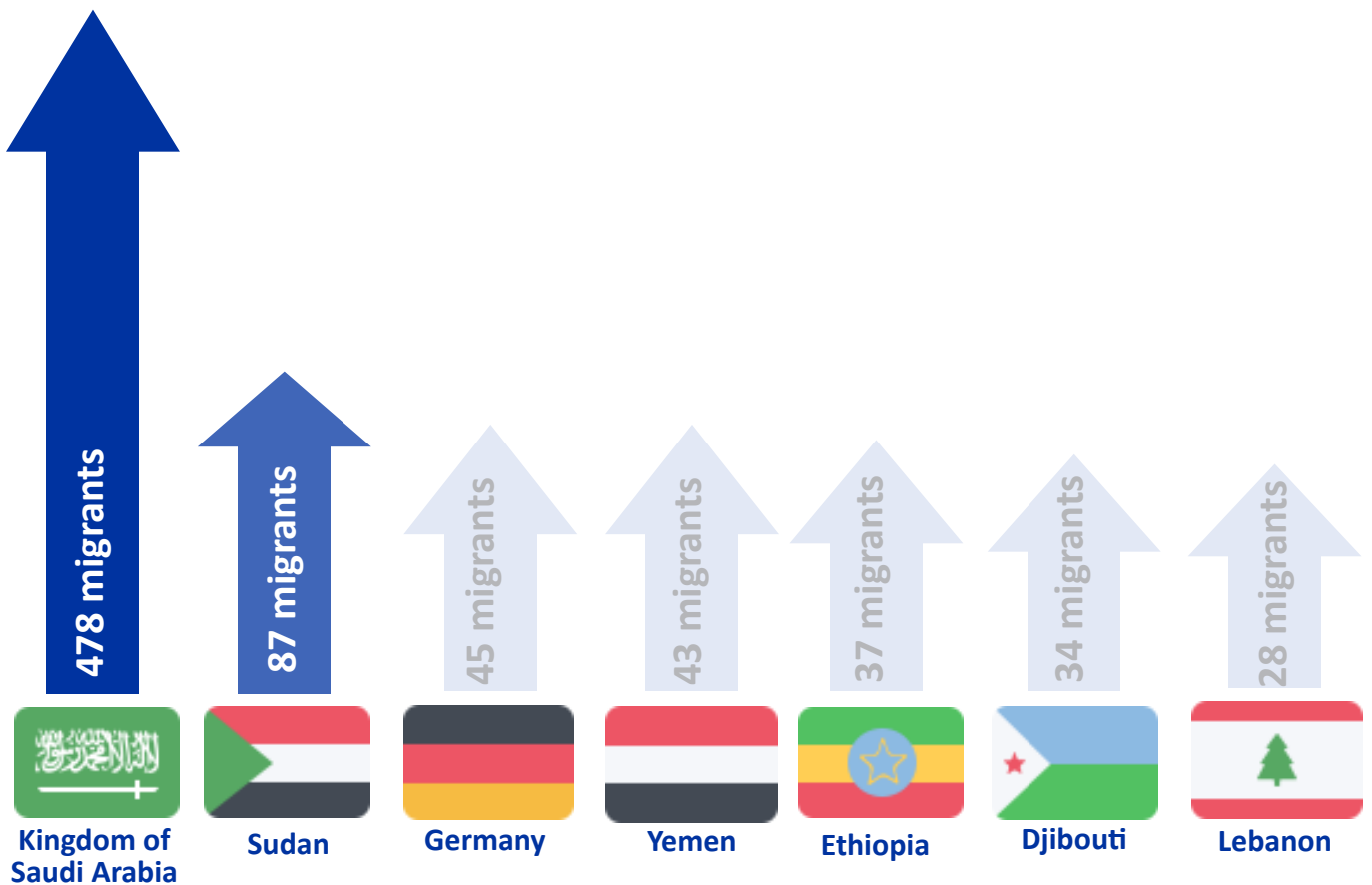
Intended Final Destinations of Migrants Who Are Travelling By Specific Reasons

The top 7 intended final destinations for the 884 migrants who cited job opportunities as the main reason for choosing the destination country are as follows:

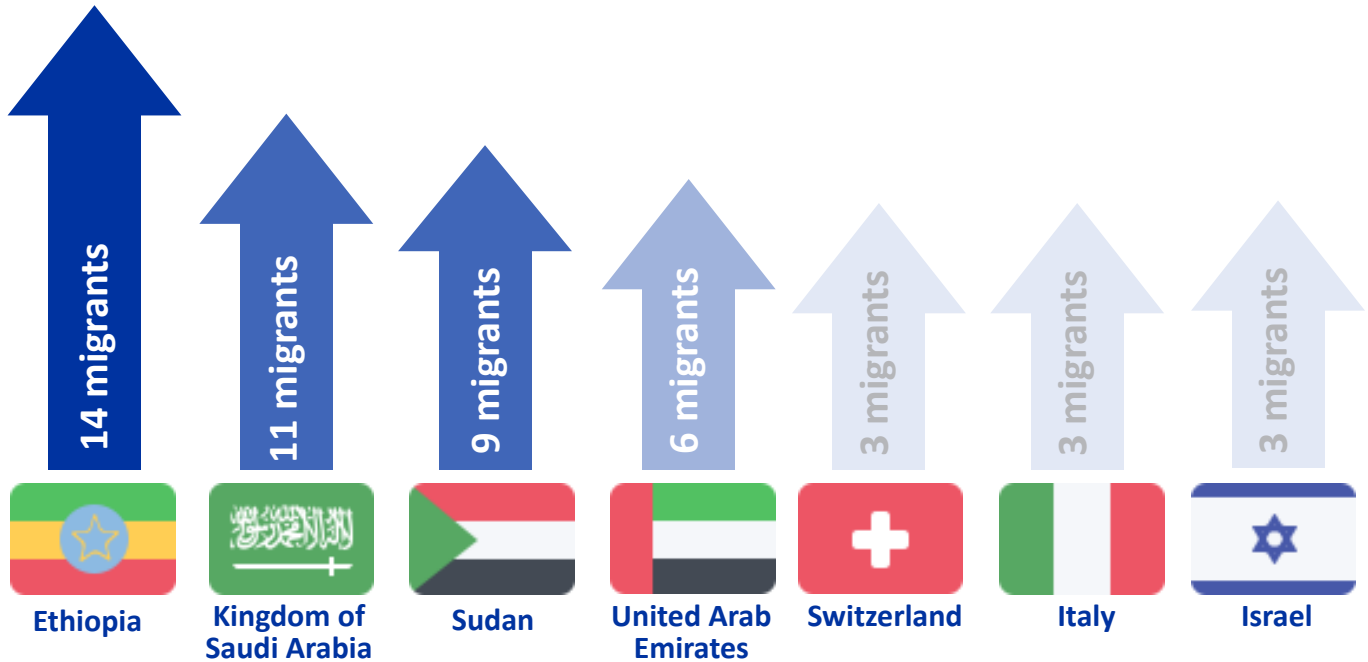

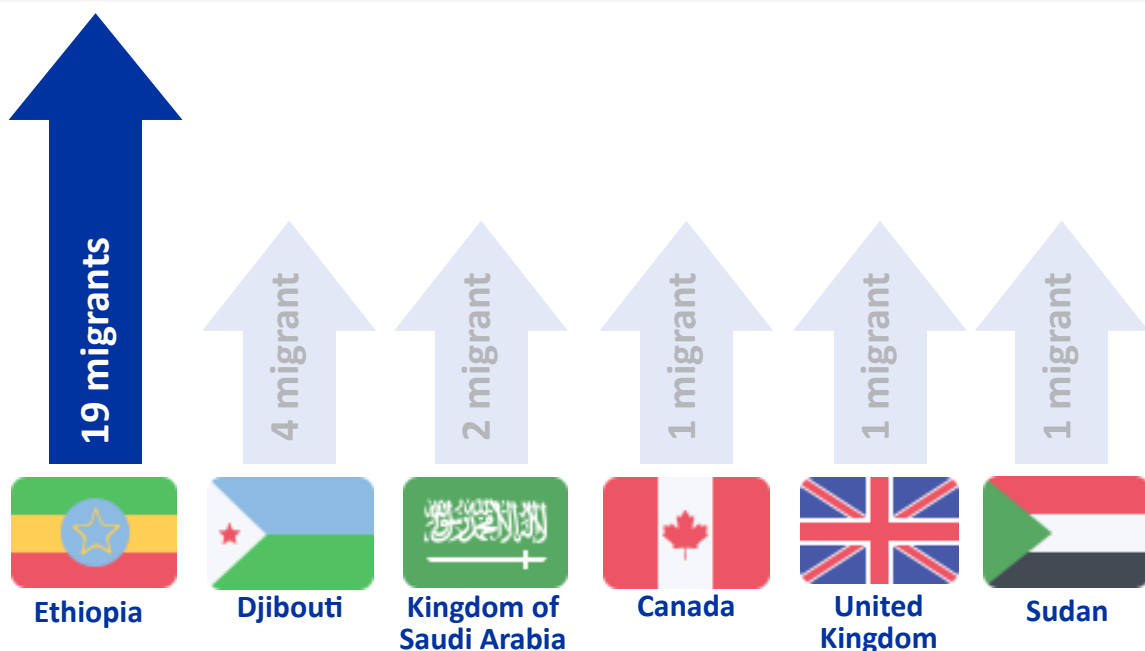
Ease of Access to Asylum Procedures

The top 7 intended final destinations for the 64 migrants who cited ease of access to asylum procedures as the main reason for choosing the destination country are as follows:



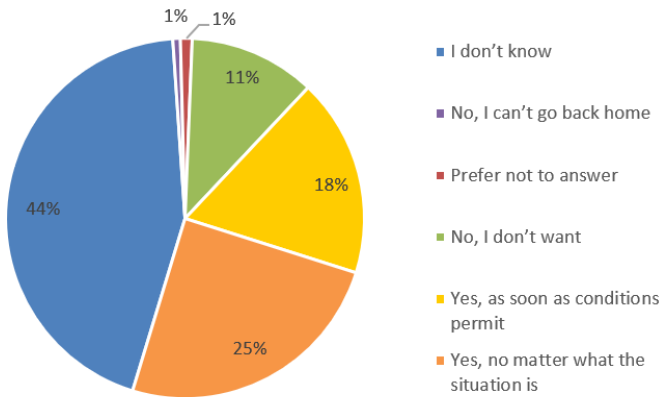
Ease of Access to Humanitarian Assistance

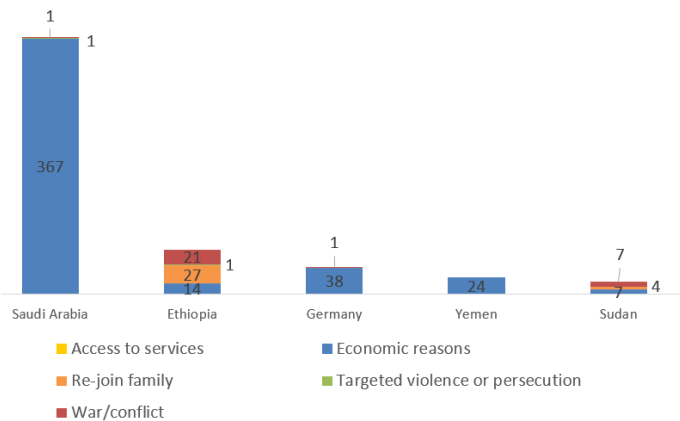
Willingness to Return Home



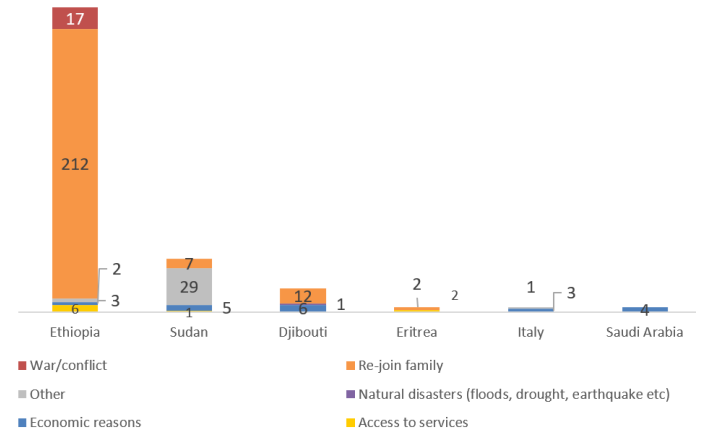
Many migrants (44% or 585 individuals) are unsure about whether or not to return home at the time of this survey. However, 25% of migrants (329 individuals) stated that they would return home no matter how the political, economical or social situation evolves. 11% of migrants (151 individuals) said that they would not want to return home.

Intended Final Destination & Reason for Travel

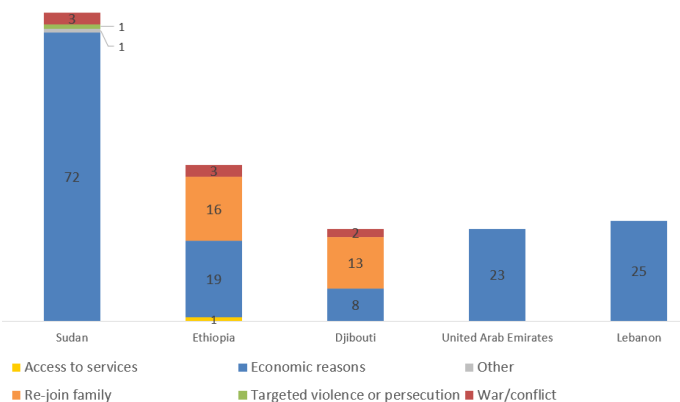
Migrants who cited that they don't know if they would be willing to return home.



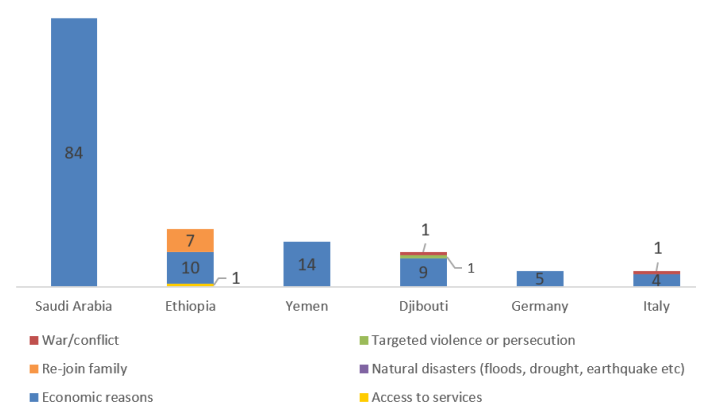
Number of migrants who cited that they would return no matter what the situation is.



Number of migrants who cited that they would return as soon as conditions permit.



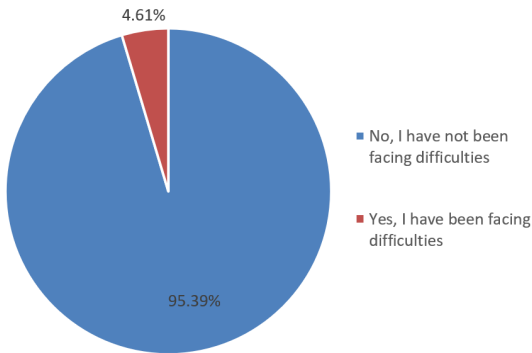
Number of migrants who cited that they would not want to return home.

4. NEEDS

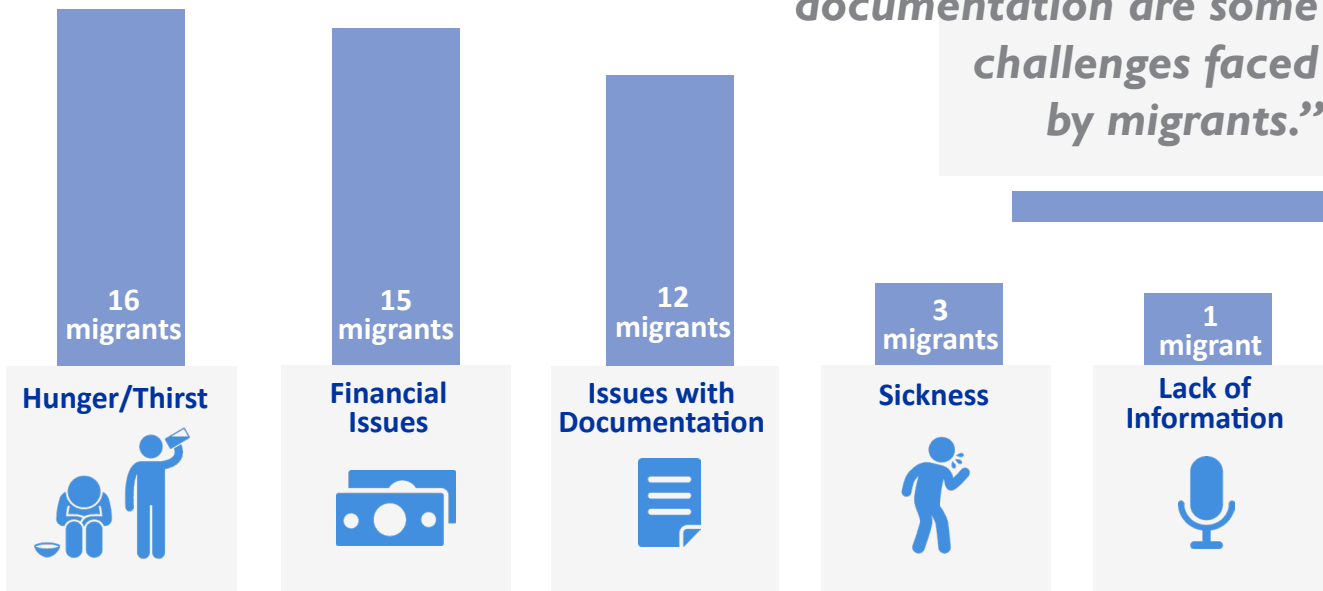
Number of Migrants Who Face Difficulties



95.4% of respondents (331 migrants) said that they have not been facing any specific difficulties, but 4.6% of respondents (16 migrants) said that they faced challenges.

All 16 migrants self-report as Ethiopians by nationality, and departed from Sudan to return to Ethiopia through the Humera Flow Monitoring Point. 15 out of the 16 migrants are female and all are between the ages of 20 to 25 years old. 12 of the 16 migrants are not married, while the highest level of education is lower secondary. Moreover, these migrants were traveling on foot and initially fled due to conflict.

Information Needs



18

18 migrants need information on return and repatriation assistance. All 18 migrants are Ethiopian and departed from Sudan. The region of origin is SNNPR for 8 migrants, Amhara for 6 migrants, Oromia for 3 migrants and 1 migrant originated from Addis Ababa.

1. Screening Section

This section is meant to avoid double profiling, hence migrants that have been already interviewed should be thanked and the interview be stopped.

2. Socio-demographic info

This section is meant to collect information on the demographic and socio-economic profile of the migrant

Q2.1 Nationality (declared)	Write the nationality of the migrant. This information is reported by the migrant, not from checking his/her passport or travel documents or IDs.
Q2.2 Origin at birth	Write in Q2.2.1 the Country of birth of the migrant, which can be different from the reported nationality in Q2.1 Write in Q2.2.2 the Region/State within the Country indicated in Q2.2.1 Write in Q2.2.3 Province/District/ Department within Q2.2.2 Write in Q2.2.4 the Ethnic group or language in text
Q2.3. Sex	Write the sex of the migrant.
Q2.4. Age in completed years (must be more 14 or above) _____	Note that we cannot interview migrants who are younger than 14 years. This question has the objective to identify short term migrants or local travellers and stop the interview. Short term local migrants are those who move daily or weekly for family or business reasons and will return to their homes within days

Q3.7. If you are travelling for access to services, what are these? (Single answer)	Only ask this question if one of the reasons for traveling is “access to services”. Select only one of the options among the answers.

Q4.3. Why did you specifically choose this destination country (Q4.2)? multiple answer	Write the reason(s) why the migrant chose the final destination reported in Q4.2
Q4.4 How long are you considering staying in the current country?	Write the number of days/weeks/months the migrant is planning to stay in the current country or the country where the interview is taking place.
Q4.5. do you want to return home?	Write the intention of the migrant regarding returning home (which can be the place of departure or the place of birth)

Q4.6 If yes, when?	Write the approximate time when the migrant is planning to return home

Q5.4 If yes, what type of information do you mainly need? Single answer	If the migrant says that he/she needs info that cannot be obtained, what are the information needed



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
