

March 29, 2017

On March 31, a fire outbreak at Kuya camp in Monguno destroyed several IDP makeshift shelters leaving 3 dead and few injured. The injured received treatment from MSF clinic close to the location.

397 Individuals (357 households) arrived at Camps in Bama. 935 Individuals (224 HH) arrived from Cameroon between 27 and 28 March, 316 Individuals arrived at General Hospital Camp from Gulumba in Bama and other locations, 62 Individuals arrived at Banki Camp from Walasa in Bama, while 84 Individuals arrived from Kirawa in

March 27 - April 1, 2017

Movement: Spontaneous Trigger: Voluntary relocation

190 Individuals (37 HH) who were recently displaced to other locations due to recent attacks in Chibok voluntarily returned to Chibok from Adamawa and other nearby locations, as the security threat is perceived to have reduced. 62 individuals arrived at Kautikari in Chibok from Mubi-North in Adamawa, 128 individuals arrived at Kautikari and Mbalala in Chibok from Askira/Uba LGA. Also some individuals (55 observed) previously displaced to other wards in Chibok have started returning to their initial wards of origin.

Movement: Spontaneous Trigger: Attack



Recent attacks in Gumsari ward of Damboa have left several persons displaced in the area and in need of assistance. About 615 individuals who were affected by a suspected attack in Dolo/Malimeri community on March 31 arrived at Hausari Camp, Central Primary School Camp, Abori Camp and Kaya community in Damboa.

Movement: Spontaneous Trigger: Military operations

An estimated 663 individuals (246 households) arrived at IDP Camps and host communities in Dikwa between March 28 and April 1 due to ongoing military operations in the area. 213 new arrivals at 20 Housing Camp in Dikwa, 228 new arrivals at Motor Park Camp, 46 arrivals at Sangaya Camp and 176 arrivals at Shehuri Camp.

An estimated 1,177 individuals (376 HH) arrived at host communities in Gwoza between March 29 and April 3. 198 individuals arrived in Gwoza from Bakasi Camp in Maiduguri, 751 arrivals from Jere and 228 individuals arrived at Kina community in Gwoza from Bokko mountain area in Gwoza due to poor living conditions in Bokko.

ETT Nigeria Glossary

Type of Movement:

- Organized: Planned movements from one location to another, usually with assistance from various actors on ground, such as government, the military, and other humanitarian actors.
- Spontaneous: Unplanned movement usually as a result of sudden triggers, such as attacks, conflicts and other situations that pose threat.

Triggers:

- Voluntary relocation: Voluntary movement of persons from one location to another.
- Involuntary relocation: Involuntary movement of persons from one location to another, usually due to intervention by other actors, for example, the closure of a camp in a location, requiring IDPs in the location to move to other locations, security reasons, and other prompts.
- Conflicts/Attacks: Population movement triggered by security threats in a location.
- Poor living condition: Population movement as a result of difficult circumstances and poor access to basic needs, such as, shelter, food, water, livelihood and other needs.
- Military operations: Population movements as a result of the arrival of the military to a location requiring civilians to move to other locations, to avoid being caught in between conflict situation that might ensue.
- Improved security: Population movement as a result of reduced threat or danger in a location.

Urgent Needs: Areas where an affected population require humanitarian assistance to alleviate suffering and improve the chance of survival.

Available Services: Humanitarian assistance provided to the affected population in a location to alleviate suffering and improve the chance of survival.
