



During the period of 4 - 10 May 2020, a total of 1,036 movements were recorded, composed of 787 arrivals and 388 departures. Arrivals were recorded at locations in Askira/Uba, Gwoza, Mobbar, Ngala Bama and Damboa Local Government Areas (LGAs) of Borno State. Arrivals were also recorded in Demsa, Madagali, Maiha, Gombi, Hong, Michika, Mubi North, Mubi South, Numan, Song, Yola North and Yola South LGAs of Adamawa State.

Departures were recorded in Askira/Uba LGA of Borno State; Fufore, Gombi, Hong, Madagali, Maiha, Michika, Mubi North, Mubi South, Numan, Song, and Yola South LGAs of Adamawa State also recorded departures.

ETT assessments identified the following movement triggers: poor living condition (37.2%), improved security (31.8%), voluntary relocation (30.5%) and fear of attack (0.6%).

SUMMARY OF MAJOR MOVEMENTS

Askira/Uba: 165 arrivals and 17 departures were recorded in Askira/Uba LGA of Borno state. The arrivals include 127 from Uba and Uda/Uvu wards in Askira/Uba LGA and 3 from Pallam ward in Madagali LGA of Borno State. 25 arrivals were also recorded from Yola North LGA and 10 from Michika LGA in Adamawa State. 12 of the departures recorded were from Damboa LGA and 5 from MMC LGA in Borno State. 75% of the movements were as a result of improved security, 20% poor living conditions, 3% voluntary relocation and 2% were due to fear of attack.

Bama: 165 arrivals were recorded in Bama LGA of Borno state. All 165 of the arrivals were from Sabsabwa/Soye/Bulongu ward, Bama LGA in Borno state. All movements were as a result of poor living conditions.

Gombi: 57 arrivals and 24 departures were recorded in Gombi LGA of Adamawa State. 30 arrivals were recorded in Hong LGA and 27 from Hawul LGA of Adamawa State. 16 arrivals were also recorded from Mubi South LGA and 8 from Yola South LGA of Adamawa State. 70% of movements recorded were as a result of improved security and 30% voluntary relocation.

Michika: 65 arrivals and 15 departures were recorded in Michika LGA of Adamawa state. The arrivals include 42 from Yola South LGA, 13 from Mubi North LGA, 10 from Hong LGA in Adamawa state. And 15 departures were recorded from Yola South LGA in Adamawa state. 81% of the movements were as a result of improved security and 19% due to poor living conditions.

NEW ARRIVAL MALNUTRITION SCREENING SUMMARY (CHILDREN 6-59 MONTHS)

An exhaustive nutrition screening using mid upper arm circumference (MUAC) and Oedema for acute malnutrition was conducted by Nutrition Sector partners for 34 children of 6-59 months. Of the 34 children screened, the MUAC reading was no child (accessible areas) in the Red category, 5 were in the Yellow category and 29 were measured in the Green category. No case of Oedema was reported in the 3 LGAs that reports were received from.

The results also includes 10 children from neighbouring country, Republic of Niger. All 10 children moved to Mobbar LGA. 8 of the children were screened into the Green category and 2 in the Yellow category. All children found with acute malnutrition have been admitted in the treatment programme.
