




A total of 1,426 movements were recorded, composed of 1,077 arrivals and 349 departures, between 18 and 24 May 2020. Arrivals were recorded at locations in Askira/Uba, Gwoza, Mobbar, Ngala, Bama, Damboa and Monguno Local Government Areas (LGAs) of Borno. Arrivals were also recorded in Demsa, Madagali, Maiha, Gombi, Hong, Mubi North, Mubi South, Numan, Song, Yola North, Yola South and Girei LGAs of Adamawa.

Departures were recorded in Askira/Uba, Gwoza, Damboa, Dikwa and Kala Balge LGAs of Borno; Fufore, Gwoza, Madagali, Maiha, Michika, Mubi North, Numan, Song, Yola North, Girei, and Lamurde LGAs of Adamawa also recorded departures.

ETT assessments identified the following movement triggers: voluntary relocation (26%), poor living conditions (23%), military operations (15%), conflict/attack (14%), improved security (14%) and fear of attack (8%).

SUMMARY OF MAJOR MOVEMENTS

Askira/Uba: 186 arrivals were recorded in Askira/Uba LGA of Borno state. The arrivals included 167 from Uba and Lassa wards in Askira/Uba LGA. 11 arrivals were also recorded from Hong LGA and 8 from Yola North LGA in Adamawa state. 89 per cent of the movements were as a result of improved security and 11 per cent poor living conditions.

Damboa: 159 arrivals and 3 departures were recorded in Damboa LGA of Borno state. All 159 of the arrivals were from Damboa ward, Damboa LGA in Borno state. All 3 departures were from Azur/Multe/For For ward in Damboa LGA. 98 per cent of the movements were triggered by military operations and 2 per cent due to poor living conditions.

Gwoza: 131 arrivals and 9 departures were recorded in Gwoza LGA of Borno State. The arrivals included 120 from Bama LGA and 4 from Maiduguri Metropolitan Council LGA of Borno state. 5 arrivals were also recorded from Mubi South LGA and 2 from Yola North LGA of Adamawa state. All 9 departures were from Bama LGA of Borno state. 67 per cent of movements recorded were as a result of poor living conditions and 33 per cent voluntary relocations.

Yola South: 109 arrivals were recorded in Yola South LGA of Adamawa state. The arrivals included 95 from Lamurde LGA and 7 from Yola South LGA in Adamawa state. 7 arrivals were also recorded in Askira/Uba LGA of Borno state. 87 per cent of the movements were triggered by conflict/attack and 13 per cent due to voluntary relocations.

NEW ARRIVAL MALNUTRITION SCREENING SUMMARY (CHILDREN 6-59 MONTHS)

An exhaustive nutrition screening using mid upper arm circumference (MUAC) and Oedema for acute malnutrition was conducted by Sector partners for 67 children of 6-59 months. Of the 67 children screened, the MUAC reading was 8 children (1 in In-accessible and 7 in accessible areas) in the Red category, 7 were in the Yellow category and 52 were measured in the Green category. No case of Oedema was reported in the 4 LGAs that we received reports from.

The results also include 19 children from neighbouring countries (2 in Bama, 8 in Mobbar and 9 in Ngala); of all the 19 children measured, 4 children were in the red category with 13 in the green category and the remaining 2 in the yellow category. All children found with acute malnutrition have been admitted in the treatment programme.
