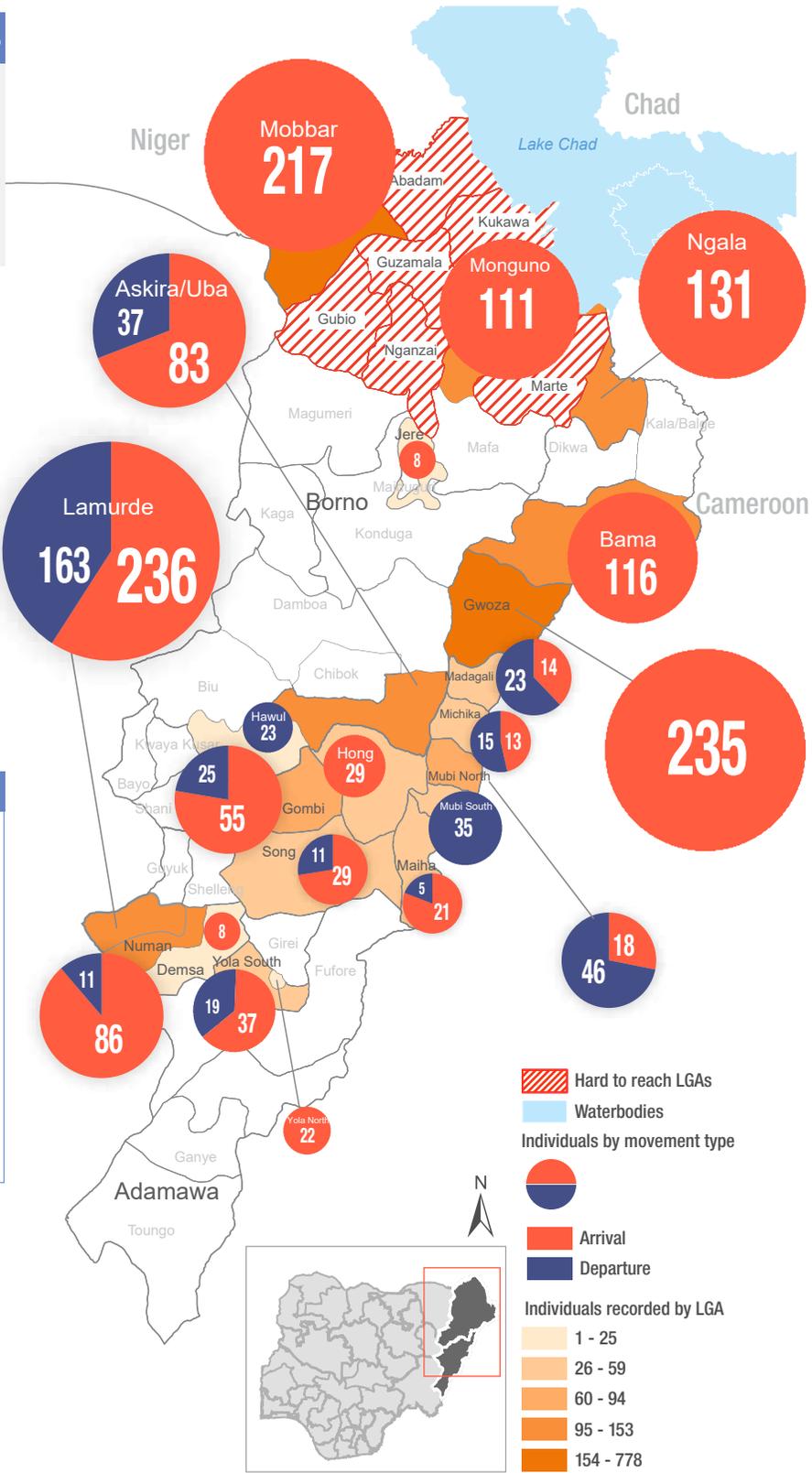

A total of 1,878 movements were recorded, comprising 1,473 arrivals and 405 departures, between 8 and 14 June 2020. Arrivals were recorded at locations in Askira/Uba, Bama, Gwoza, Jere, Mobbar, Monguno and Ngala Local Government Areas (LGAs) of the most-affected Nigerian State of Borno. Arrivals were also recorded in Demsa, Gombi, Hong, Lamurde, Madagali, Maiha, Michika, Mubi North, Numan, Song, Yola North and Yola South LGAs of the state of Adamawa. Departures were recorded in Askira/Uba and Hawul LGAs of Borno; Gombi, Lamurde, Madagali, Maiha, Michika, Mubi North, Mubi South, Numan, Song and Yola South LGAs of Adamawa.

ETT assessments identified the following movement triggers: voluntary relocation (41.5%), fear of attack (24.3%) poor living conditions (15.3%), improved security (9.9%), conflict/attack (5.5%), military operations (3.0%) and fear of covid-19 (0.5%).

SUMMARY OF MAJOR MOVEMENTS

Lamurde: 236 arrivals and 163 departures were recorded in Lamurde LGA of Adamawa state. All arrivals recorded were from Lafiya ward in Lamurde LGA of Adamawa state. The departures included 126 from Guyuk ward in Guyuk LGA and 37 from Waduku ward in Lamurde LGA of Adamawa state. 91 per cent of the movements recorded were as a result of fear of attack and 9 per cent due to improved security.

Gwoza: 235 arrivals were recorded in Gwoza LGA of Borno state. The arrivals included 82 from Konduga, 53 from Gwoza, 35 from Jere and 13 from Bama LGAs of Borno state. 14 arrivals were also recorded from Girei and Michika LGAs of Adamawa state. And 30 arrivals from Abuja Municipal Area Council LGA of the Federal Capital Territory, 4 from Zaria LGA of Kaduna state and 4 from Marwa region of Cameroon. 87 per cent of the movements were due to voluntary relocation, 8 per cent poor living condition, 4 per cent from fear of covid-19 and 2 per cent fear of attack.

Mobbar: 217 arrivals were recorded in Mobbar LGA of Borno state. All arrivals recorded were from Shettimari ward in Diffa region of Niger Republic. 82 per cent relocated voluntarily and 18 per cent of the movements recorded were as a result of poor living conditions.

Ngala: 131 arrivals were recorded in Ngala LGA of Borno state. The arrivals included 77 from Rann "A" ward in Kala Balge LGA of Borno state and 54 from Mayo-Sava ward in Marwa region of Cameroon. All movements recorded relocated voluntarily.

NEW ARRIVAL MALNUTRITION SCREENING SUMMARY (CHILDREN 6-59 MONTHS)

An exhaustive nutrition screening using mid-upper arm circumference (MUAC) and Oedema for acute malnutrition was conducted by Sector partners for 151 children of 6-59 months. Of the 151 children screened, the MUAC reading was 5 children (3 in In-accessible and 2 in accessible areas) in the Red category, 12 were in the Yellow category and 134 were measured in the Green category. No case of Oedema was reported in the 4 LGAs that we received reports from.

The results also include 67 children from neighboring countries (11 in Bama, 3 in Gwoza, 40 in Mobbar and 13 in Ngala); of all the 67 children measured, 2 children were in the Red category with 58 in the Green category and the remaining 7 in the Yellow category. All children found with acute malnutrition have been admitted for treatment. Please note, the data presented are not surveillance results and should be interpreted with caution.
