

FLASH REPORT: POPULATION DISPLACEMENT North East Nigeria - Dikwa LGA (Borno State)

15 - 21 May 2021


Movement Trigger: Fear of Attack


OVERVIEW

The lingering conflict in Nigeria's North East Zone has been the major cause of widespread population displacement. Over 2 million persons have been forced to leave their areas of residence in search of safety and security in neighbouring Wards and LGAs.


On 01 and 02 March 2021, a Non-State Armed Group (NSAG) carried out an attack in Dikwa LGA. On 17 May 2021, Dikwa LGA was attacked once more by a Non-State Armed Group, leading to a new wave of population displacement. Following the attacks, flow monitoring assessments were conducted by DTM field staff with the purpose of informing the humanitarian community and government partners, and enabling targeted response. DTM enumerators were deployed in the transit point Dikwa Motor Park in the ward Dusuman in Jere LGA. IDPs passing through the transit point were asked about their intended destinations and most needed assistance.

As a result of the attacks, between 15 and 21 May 2021, a total of 1,513 individuals were displaced from Dikwa LGA towards the LGAs Jere and Maiduguri Metropolitan Council. They arrived at Dikwa Motor Park from various camps and communities in Dikwa LGA. As presented on the map below, their intended destinations were locations in the LGAs Jere and Maiduguri Metropolitan Council in Borno State. Meanwhile, between 15 and 21 May 2021, a total of 1,382 individuals have returned to Dikwa LGA from Maiduguri since the first attack on 01 March 2021






AGE CLASSIFICATION OF IDPs (FIG. 3)

SECTORIAL INFORMATION ON LOCATION OF ORIGIN - DIKWA



In the past week, Care international moved food items to Dikwa for their next food distribution which will be in the coming week. Food items will be distribut-FOOD ed to households that were enrolled in the seasonal farming livelihood support programme and have currently completed the programme. Also, food items will be distributed to households with scope card issues that did not benefit from previous food distribution.



It has been observed that some shelters are completely destroyed by windstorms, others are damaged because of termites and worn-out tarpaulins. The camps Sehuri Mudu Kasa, Masarmari, and Motor Park are identified as camps that are currently facing considerable shelter challenges.



There was a measeles outbreak in Dikwa in the past week which led to loss of 5 children (3 in Klagaru and 2 in Sangaya Camps). The clinic in Shehu Msata II Camp is now opened and has started to support IDPs in the past weeks. However, the facilities and medicine in the clinic do not suffice to meet the needs of the IDPs.



There was water scarcity in Shehuri Mudu Kasa Camp in the past week as a result of a fault on the SI solar borehole. Klagaru, Agric and Shehu Masta II Camps experienced water challenges due to some non-functioning hand pumps. IOM WASH volunteers continued COVID-19 sensitization and hygiene promotion in various camps. In the past week, the hygiene promotion included a cholera prevention campaign in case an outbreak should occur. On a weekly basis, the environmental and sanitation situation is assessed by the IOM WASH volunteers.

Other challenges observed were partially damaged toilets in Masarmari, Fulatari, Agric, Alhaji Bashir, Mohammed Kyari, Klagaru and Sangaya Camps.



The attacks by the NSAG have become frequent and the impact is overwhelming on the affected population. A Non-State Armed Group (NSAG) made attemps to infilterate Dikwa LGA in the past week but were repelled by the Nigerian military, the LGA has since been calm.
