IDP SHELTER ARRANGEMENT

IRAQ IDP CRISIS - JANUARY 2014 TO 30 JULY 2017

IOM's DTM aims to monitor displacement and provide accurate data about the IDP population in Iraq. Data is collected by Rapid Assessment and Response Teams (RART), composed of 123 staff on the entire Iraqi territory. Data is gathered via a network of over 9,500 key informants.

From the start of January 2014 through 30 July 2017, the DTM identified 3,295,602 internally displaced individuals (549,267 families). This maps shows the sizes of IDP population residing in 3 main shelter categories (private, critical, camp plus unknown).

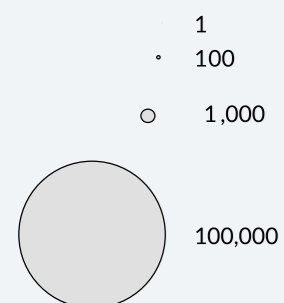

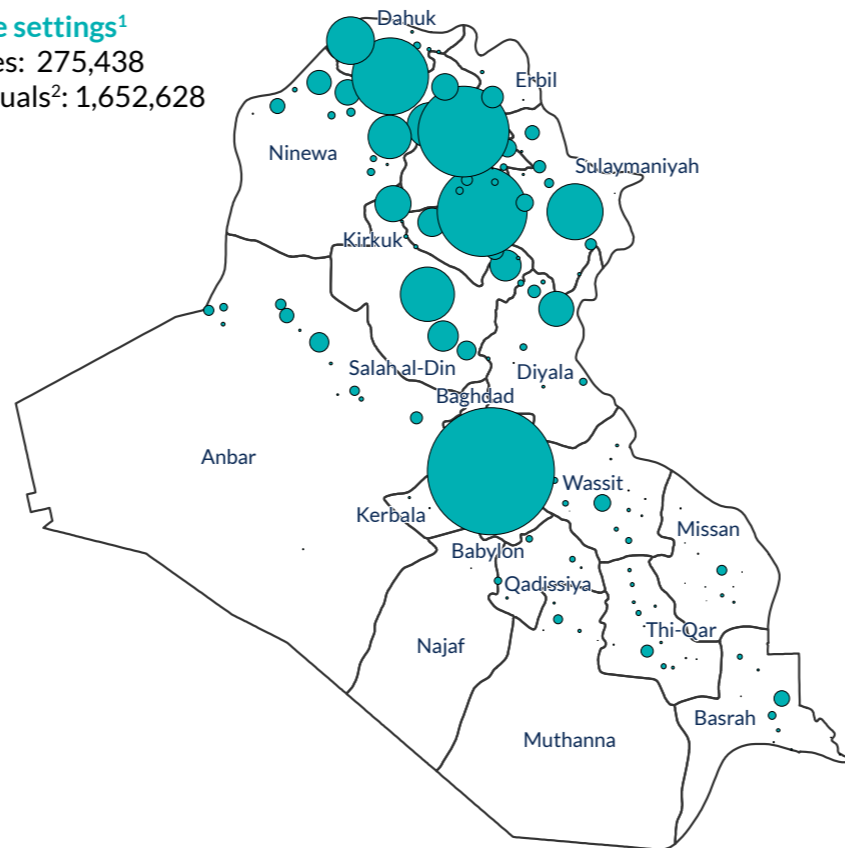

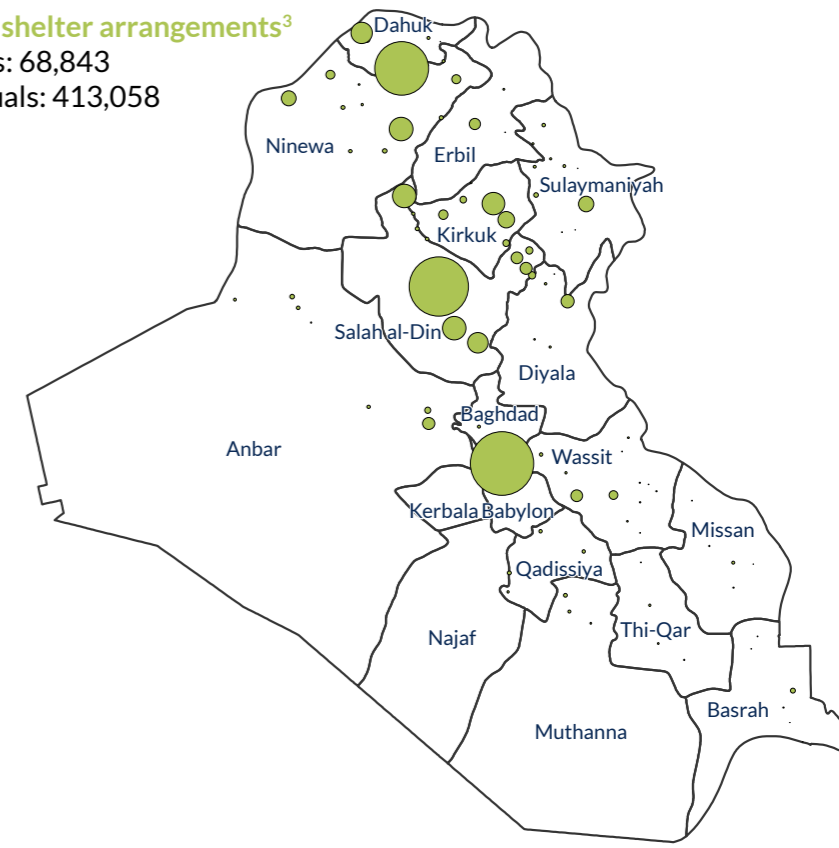

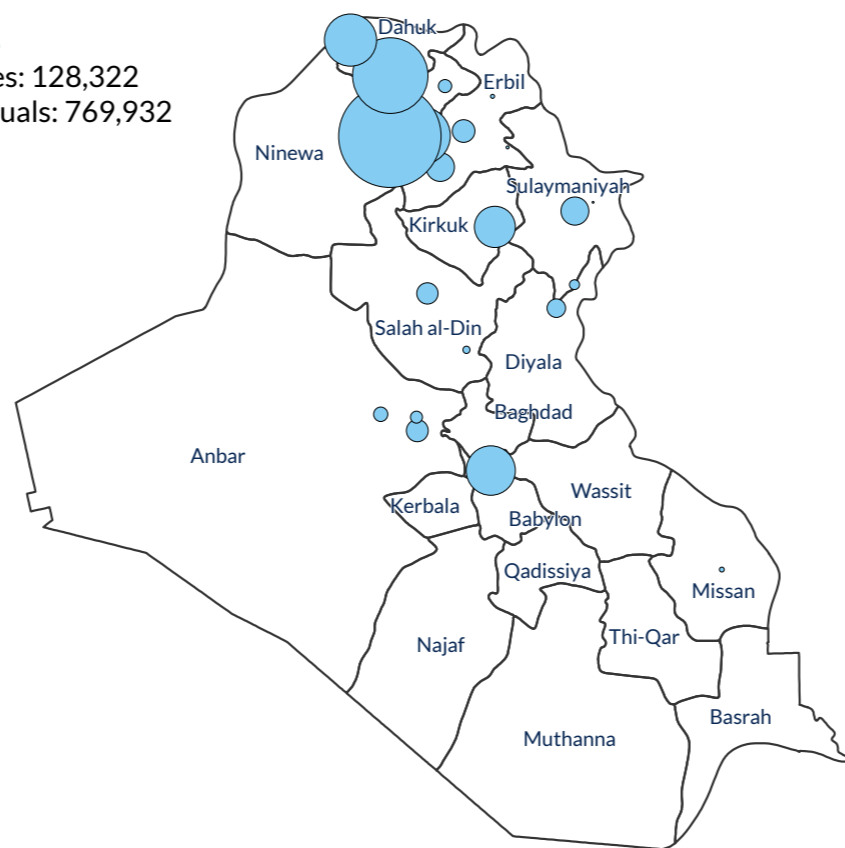
Critical shelter arrangements³

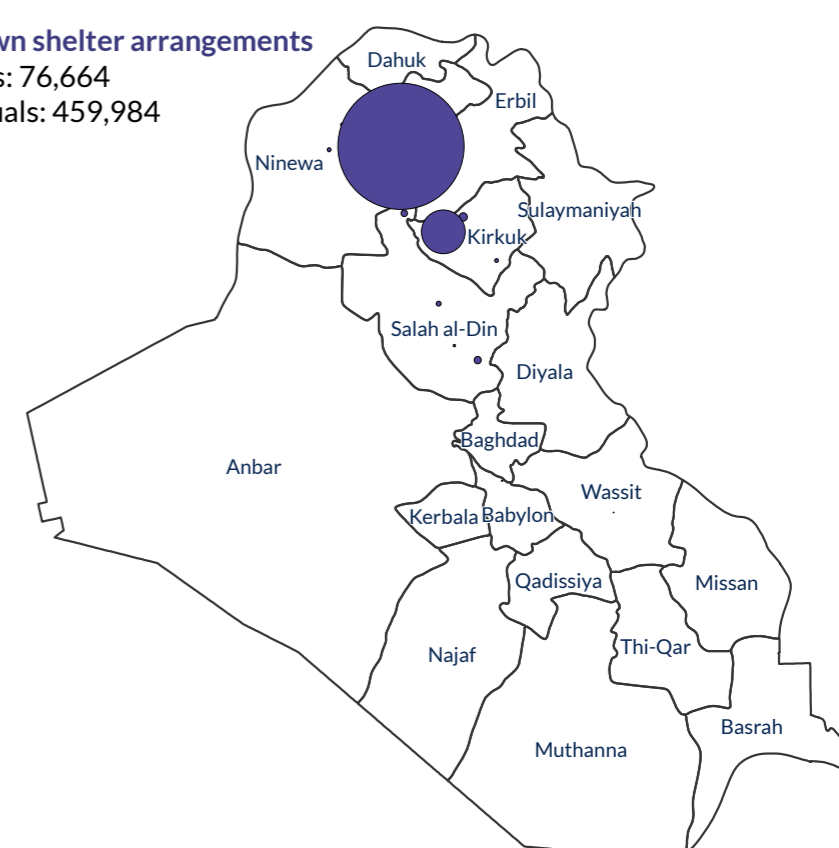
Camps
