EMERGENCY TRACKING TOOL (ETT)

The DTM Emergency Tracking Tool (ETT) is deployed to track and to collect information on large and sudden population movements, provide frequent updates on the scale of displacement and quantify the affected population when needed. As a subcomponent of the Mobility Tracking methodology in Nigeria, ETT utilises direct observation and a broad network of key informants to capture best estimates of the affected population per location, enabling targeted humanitarian response planning.




Between 19 and 25 July 2021, a total of 1,489 movements were recorded in the states of Adamawa and Borno. The recorded movements consisted of 878 arrivals and 611 departures. Arrivals were recorded at locations in Askira/Uba, Bama, Gwoza, and Ngala Local Government Areas (LGAs) of the most conflict-affected state of Borno and in Fufore, Girei, Gombi, Hong, Lamurde, Madagali, Maiha, Michika, Mubi North, Mubi South,

Departures were recorded in Askira/Uba LGA of Borno, and Gombi, Hong, Madagali, Maiha, Mubi North, Mubi South, Numan, Song, and Yola North LGAs of Adamawa.

ETT assessments identified the following movement triggers: voluntary relocation (521 individuals or 35%), poor living conditions (518 individuals or 35%), improved security (312 individuals or 7%), seasonal farming (100 individuals or 7%) and military operations (38 individuals or 2%).

SUMMARY OF MAJOR MOVEMENTS

Askira/Uba: 14 arrivals and 192 departures were recorded in Askira/Uba LGA of Borno State. All individuals who arrived came from within Askira/Uba LGA in Borno State. The departures included 79 individuals to Hong LGA in Adamawa State, 36 individuals to Song LGA in Adamawa State, 36 individuals to Askira/Uba LGA in Borno State, 35 individuals to Chibok LGA in Borno State and 6 individuals to Madagali LGA in Adamawa State. Seventy-three per cent of the movements recorded were due to poor living conditions, 24 per cent of the movements recorded were a result of the improved security situation in areas of origin and 3 per cent of the movements recorded were voluntary relocation.

Gombi: 65 arrivals and 87 departures were recorded in Gombi LGA of Adamawa State. The arrivals included 43 individuals from Gwoza LGA in Borno State and 22 individuals from Maiha LGA in Adamawa State. All individuals reported that their intended destination was Hong LGA in Adamawa State. Fifty-one per cent of the movements recorded were a result of the improved security situation in areas of origin, 28 per cent were due to seasonal farming and 21 per cent were due to voluntary relocation.

Hong: 81 arrivals and 41 departures were recorded in Hong LGA of Adamawa State. All individuals who arrived came from within Askira/Uba LGA in Borno State. All individuals who departed had Yola South LGA in Adamawa State as their intended destination. All movements recorded were due to poor living conditions.

Madagali: 49 arrivals and 68 departures were recorded in Madagali LGA of Adamawa State. The arrivals included 24 individuals from Mubi North LGA in Adamawa State, 19 individuals from Maiha LGA in Adamawa State and 6 individuals from Askira/Uba LGA in Borno State. The departures included 29 individuals to Girei LGA in Adamawa State, 27 individuals to Madagali LGA in Adamawa State and 12 individuals to Yola South LGA in Adamawa State. Forty-four per cent of the movements recorded were a result of the improved security situation in areas of origin, 40 per cent of the movements recorded were voluntary relocation and 16 per cent of the movements were due to poor living conditions.

IOM's Emergency Tracking Tool (ETT) is deployed in Nigeria's northeastern states. Only Local Government Areas (LGAs) in which the IDP population changed since the latest DTM round of assessments are represented in this report. The data has been collected by DTM staff deployed at the locations listed and cross-checked with the partners present on the ground.

NEW ARRIVAL MALNUTRITION SCREENING SUMMARY (CHILDREN 6-59 MONTHS)

An exhaustive nutrition screening using mid-upper arm circumference (MUAC) and oedema for acute malnutrition was conducted by sector partners for 38 children of 6-59 months. Of the 38 children screened, the MUAC reading indicated that 6 children were recorded in the red category, 2 children in the yellow category and 30 children in the green category. No case of oedema was reported in the 3 LGAs assessed.

The results also included 8 children who arrived from neighbouring countries (all in Bama). Of all the 8 children measured, none was recorded in the red category and yellow category, all were in the green category. All children found with acute malnutrition have been admitted for treatment. Please note, the data presented are not surveillance results and should be interpreted with caution.
