





Between 7th and 13th February 2022, a total of 1,678 movements were recorded in Adamawa and Borno States. The recorded movements consisted of 1,329 arrivals and 349 departures. Arrivals were recorded at locations in Askira/Uba, Bama, Biu, Gwoza, Kala/Balge, Munguno and Ngala Local Government Areas (LGAs) of the most conflict-affected State of Borno and in Girei, Gombi, Hong, Lamurde, Maiha, Michika, Mubi South, Yola North and Yola South LGAs of Adamawa State.

Departures were recorded in Askira/Uba LGA of Borno, and in Gombi, Hong, Maiha, Mubi South, Song and Yola North LGAs of Adamawa State.

ETT assessments identified the following movement triggers: Voluntary relocation (828 individuals or 49%), poor living conditions (422 individuals or 25%), improved security (261 individuals or 15%), conflicts/attacks (80 individuals or 5%), fear of attack (42 individuals or 3%), involuntary relocation (27 individuals or 2%) and military operations (18 individuals or 1%).







SUMMARY OF MAJOR MOVEMENTS

Bama: Three hundred and sixty-three (363) arrivals were recorded in Bama LGA of Borno State. The arrivals included 268 individuals from within Bama LGA and 95 individuals from the Marwa region in Cameroon. All movements recorded were due to voluntary relocation.

Gwoza: Two hundred and eight (208) arrivals were recorded in Gwoza LGA of Borno State. The arrivals included 193 individuals from within Gwoza LGA, 8 individuals from Bama LGA and 7 individuals from Jere LGA in Borno State. Eighty-seven per cent (87%) were due to poor living conditions, 9 per cent were due to military operations and 4 per cent were a result of conflicts/attacks.

Hong: One hundred and eleven (111) arrivals and 58 departures were recorded in Hong LGA of Adamawa State. All arrivals recorded were from other locations within Hong LGA. All departures were to Gombi LGA in Adamawa State. Sixty-six per cent (66%) of the movements were due to voluntary relocation and 34 per cent were a result of poor living conditions.

Askira/Uba: One hundred and twelve (112) arrivals and 53 departures were recorded in Askira/Uba LGA of Borno State. The arrivals included 82 individuals from within Askira/Uba LGA, 25 individuals from Mubi North LGA in Adamawa State and 5 individuals from Bauchi LGA in Bauchi State. The departures included 33 individuals to other locations within Askira/Uba LGA, 11 individuals to Bama LGA and nine (9) individuals to Damboa LGA in Borno State. Eighty-five per cent (85%) of the movements recorded resulted from improved security conditions in areas of origin, 12 per cent were a result of poor living conditions and 3 per cent were due to voluntary relocation.

NEW ARRIVAL MALNUTRITION SCREENING SUMMARY (CHILDREN 6 - 59 MONTHS)

An exhaustive nutrition screening using Mid-Upper Arm Circumference (MUAC) and oedema for acute malnutrition was conducted by sector partners for 218 children of 6-59 months. Of the 218 children screened, the MUAC reading indicated that 9 children were recorded in the red category, 26 children in the yellow category and 183 children in the green category. No case of oedema was reported in the four LGAs assessed.

The results also included 23 children who arrived from neighbouring countries (18 in Bama LGA, 2 in Gwoza LGA and three in Monguno LGA). Of all the 23 children measured, one was recorded in the red category, none was in the yellow category, and 22 were in the green category. All Children found with acute malnutrition have been admitted for treatment. Please note, the data presented are not surveillance results and should be interpreted with caution.
