EMERGENCY EVENT TRACKING

Data collection: 27 December 2022

As a subcomponent of the Mobility Tracking methodology (Round Five), the Emergency Event Tracking (EET) tool is deployed to track sudden displacement, provide more frequent updates on the scale of displacement, and quantify the affected population when needed.

Event Overview






On 13 December 2022, inter-communal conflict erupted between members of the Asra and the Tagli tribes in Khor Altina village in Abu Kershola locality, South Kordofan following a dispute over land accessibility. The first EET update estimates a total number of 1,661 IDP individuals (251 households) currently seeking shelter in Alein Aldabab (42%), Aradeba (9%), Hai Alshate (4%), and Um Ginebila (3%), Ar Rahad locality, and Masn (15%), Hillat Ibrahim (12%), Alsalamat (9%), Faj Alhala (4%), and Um Katira (2%) in Abu Kershola, South Kordofan. The entire IDP caseload (100%) was displaced from Khor Altina village in Abu Kershola, South Kordofan.

Field teams estimate, upon triangulation with additional sources of information, that five individuals were killed and two individuals sustained injuries. There have been no cases of reported lost goods, cattle, and/or livestock. All displaced individuals are Sudanese nationals. At least 127 cases of additional vulnerabilities in need of assistance and support were identified by key informants through DTM's Protection indicator. Additionally, DTM Sudan estimates that there are approximately 249 persons with disabilities among the IDP caseload.* Based on a ranking scale, the three priority needs across the caseload are Food, Non-Food Items, and Health (Medical Needs).






Return Intention

Data collected through the return intention indicator estimates that the entire IDP caseload (100%) intends to remain in their locations of displacement.

* DTM Sudan adopts the WHO global estimate that approximately 15% of the total population are persons with disabilities (PwDs)
