NEW ARRIVALS SCREENING BY NUTRITION PARTNERS






The DTM Emergency Tracking Tool (ETT) is deployed to track and to collect information on large and sudden population movements, provide frequent updates on the scale of displacement and quantify the affected population when needed. As a sub-component of the Mobility Tracking methodology in Nigeria, ETT utilises direct observation and a broad network of key informants to capture best estimates of the affected population per location, enabling targeted humanitarian response planning.


Between 26 December and 01 January 2023, a total of 1,033 new arrivals were recorded in locations in Adamawa and Borno States. The new arrivals were recorded at locations in Askira/Uba, Bama, Dikwa, Gwoza, Monguno, Ngala, and Kala Balge Local Government Areas (LGAs) of the most conflict-affected state of Borno and in Hong, Michika and Yola North LGAs of Adamawa State.

ETT assessments identified the following movement triggers: camp closure (257 individuals or 25%), poor living conditions (257 individuals or 25%), military operations (209 individuals or 20%), improved security (192 individuals or 19%), access to humanitarian support (78 individuals or 8%), seasonal farming (29 individuals or 3%) and attacks (11 individuals or 1%).


PERCENTAGE OF INDIVIDUALS BY MOVEMENT TRIGGER



Arriving population




New arrivals registered by LGA

SUMMARY OF MAJOR NEW ARRIVALS

Bama: Three hundred and twenty-two (322) new arrivals were recorded in Bama LGA of Borno State. Seventy-eight per cent arrived from hard-to-reach/inaccessible locations (Dipchari/Jere/Dar-Jamal/Kotembe, Mbuliya/Goniri/Siraja, Lawanti/Malam/Mastari/Abbaram and Gulumba/Jukkuri/Batra wards) within Bama LGA. Thirteen per cent arrived from Konduga LGA of Borno State and 9 per cent of the arrivals were Nigerian nationals who arrived from the marwa region of Cameroon and integrated in Banki Camp within Bama LGA. Sixty-five per cent of the movements were triggered by military operations, 13 per cent were as a result of the closure of Gubio Camp in Konduga LGA of Borno State, 13 per cent of the movements were triggered by poor living conditions and 9 per cent of the movements were a result of improved security situations in areas of origin.

Ngala: Two hundred and three (203) new arrivals were recorded in Ngala LGA of Borno State. All arrivals arrived from Konduga LGA of Borno State and were as a result of the closure of Gubio Camp in Konduga LGA.

Askira/Uba: Ninety (90) new arrivals were recorded in Askira/Uba LGA of Borno State. Eighty-four per cent arrived from Askira/Uba LGA of Borno State and 16 per cent arrived from Mubi South LGA of Adamawa State. All movements were a result of improved security situations in areas of origin.

Dikwa: Eighty-four (84) new arrivals were recorded in Dikwa LGA of Borno State. Ninety per cent arrived from Konduga LGA of Borno State and 10 per cent arrived from Bama LGA of Borno State. All movements were triggered by poor living conditions.

NEW ARRIVAL MALNUTRITION SCREENING SUMMARY (CHILDREN 6 — 59 MONTHS)

Between 26 December and 01 January 2023, an exhaustive nutrition screening using Mid-Upper Arm Circumference (MUAC) and oedema for acute malnutrition was conducted by sector partners for 143 children of 6-59 months. Of the 143 children screened, the MUAC reading indicated that 7 children were recorded in the red category, 19 children in the yellow category and 117 children in the green category. No case of oedema was reported in the six LGAs assessed.

Among the 143 children screened, 41 children arrived from neighbouring countries (9 in Bama LGA, 5 in Gwoza LGA, 14 in Kala Balge LGA and 13 in Monguno LGA); of all the 41 children measured; 39 were in green and 2 were in yellow. All children found with acute malnutrition have been admitted in the treatment programme.

Please note, the data presented above are not surveillance results and should be interpreted with caution.
