CONFLICT



The DTM Emergency Event Tracking (EET) is deployed to track sudden displacement and population movements, provide more frequent updates on the scale of displacement, and quantify the affected population when needed. As a subcomponent of the new Mobility Tracking methodology in Sudan (Round Four), and activated on a need basis, EET utilises a broad network of key informants to capture best estimates of the affected population presence per location – a useful tool for humanitarian response planning and design.

Event Overview







DTM teams activated EET to monitor the displacement of individuals affected by inter-communal violence involving Fur and Rezeigat Mahariya tribes on 15 August 2022. Clashes erupted following the discovery of two members of the Rezeigat tribe who were found dead deceased in Molagat village in Kutum locality, North Darfur. The first EET update estimates that a total number of 1,450 individuals (290 households) are currently displaced in Kassab IDP camp (100%) in Kutum locality, North Darfur. The entire IDP caseload was displaced from Korsi (39%), Senana (17%), Aubaja'ab (14%), Jambo (10%), Kernaga (7%), Ketanga (7%), and Talgah (6%) villages in Kutum locality, North Darfur.

DTM field teams have confirmed that five individuals were killed, six individuals were injured and there are 150 reported cases lost goods, livestock, and/or cattle. All displaced individuals are Sudanese nationals. At least 262 cases of additional vulnerabilities in need of assistance and support were identified by key informants through DTM's Protection indicator. Additionally, DTM Sudan estimates that there are approximately 218 persons with disabilities among the IDP caseload.* Based on a ranking scale, the three priority needs across the caseload are Non-Food Items, Food, and Emergency Shelter.
