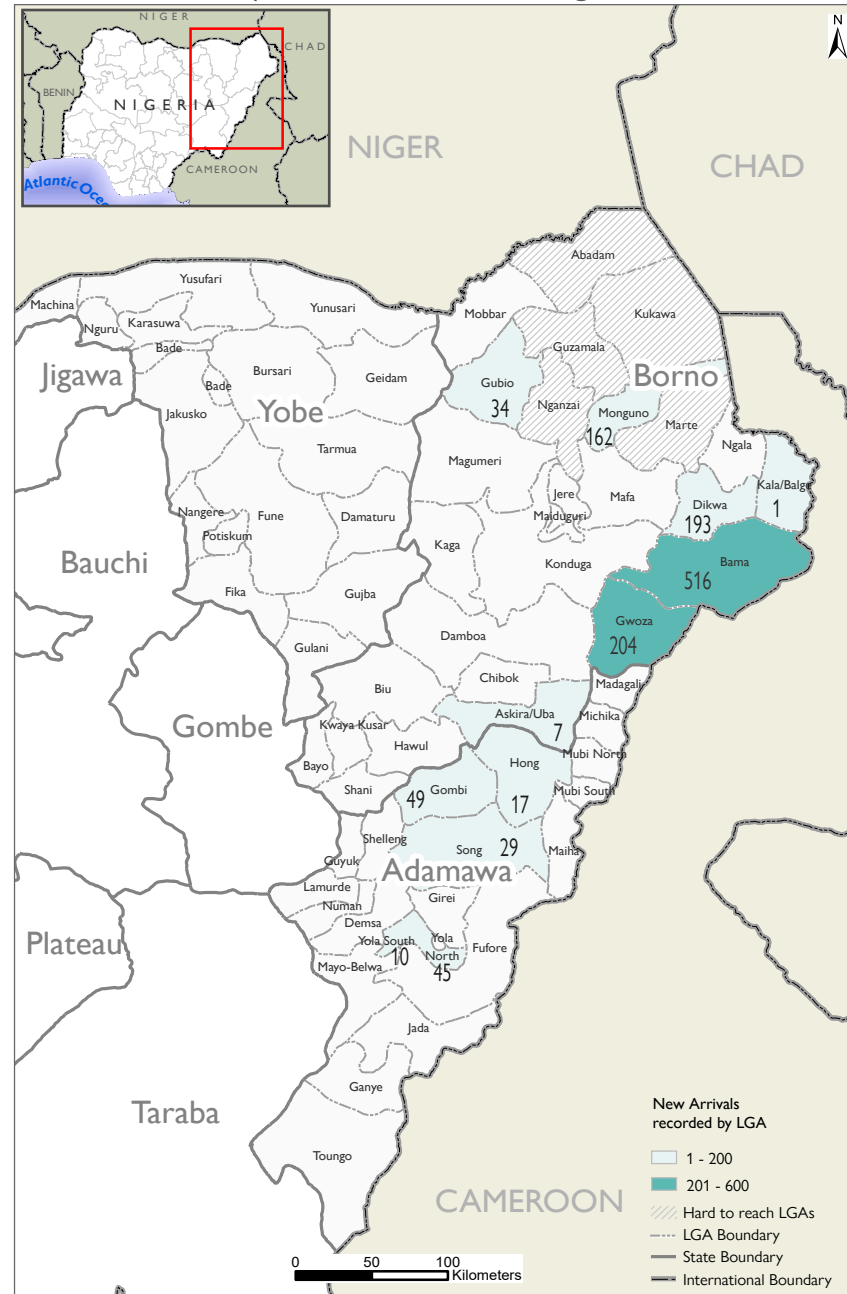

The DTM Emergency Tracking Tool (ETT) is deployed to track and to collect information on large and sudden population movements, provide frequent updates on the scale of displacement and quantify the affected population when needed. As a sub-component of the Mobility Tracking methodology in Nigeria, ETT utilises direct observations and a broad network of key informants to capture the best estimates of the affected population per location, enabling targeted humanitarian response planning.

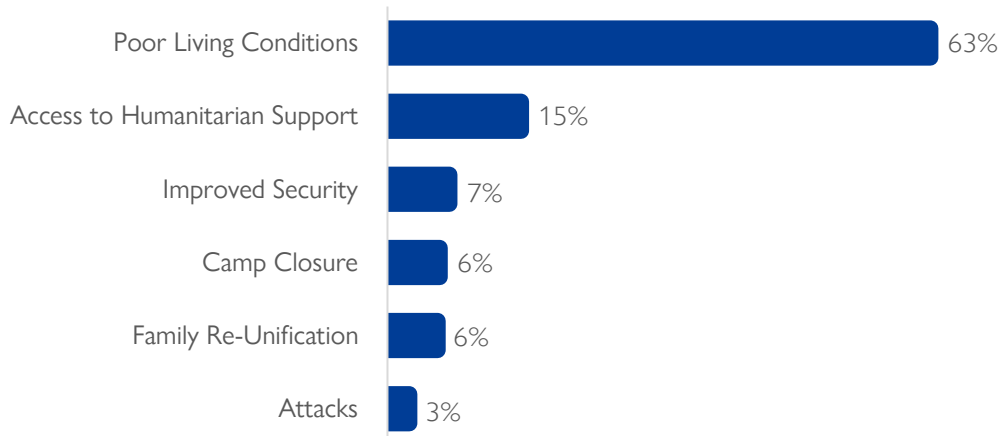
Between 27 February and 05 March 2023, a total of 1,338 new arrivals were recorded in locations in Adamawa and Borno states. The new arrivals were recorded at locations in Askira/Uba, Bama, Dikwa, Gwoza, Gubio, Monguno and Kala Balge\* Local Government Areas (LGAs) of the most conflict-affected state of Borno and in Gombi, Hong, Song, Yola South and Yola North LGAs of Adamawa state.

ETT assessments identified the following movement triggers: poor living conditions (842 individuals or 63%), access to humanitarian support (207 individuals or 15%), improved security (96 individuals or 7%), camp closure (81 individuals or 6%), family re-unification (78 individuals or 6%) and attacks (34 individuals or 3%).

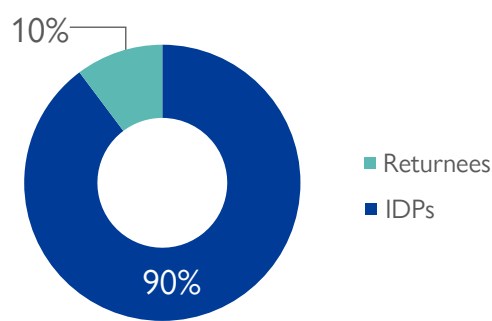
Map of the new arrivals registered<sup>§</sup>



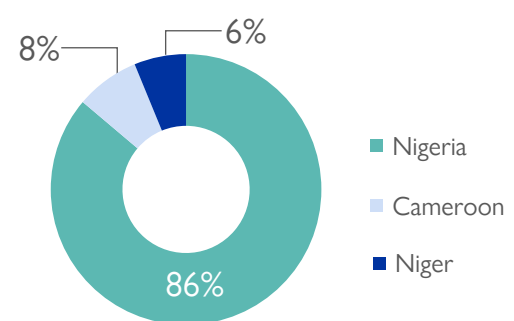
### PERCENTAGE OF INDIVIDUALS BY MOVEMENT TRIGGER

## SUMMARY OF MAJOR NEW ARRIVALS

**Bama:** Five hundred and sixteen (516) new arrivals were recorded in Bama LGA of Borno state. Eighty-three per cent arrived from hard-to-reach/inaccessible locations (Dipchari/Jere/Dar-Jamal/Kotembe and Lawanti/Malam/Mastari/Abbaram wards) within Bama LGA, 7 per cent arrived from Girei LGA of Adamawa state, 6 per cent arrived from Konduga LGA of Borno state and 4 per cent of the arrivals were Nigerian nationals who arrived from the Marwa region of Cameroon. Eighty-three per cent of the movements were triggered by poor living conditions and 17 per cent of the movements were a result of improved security situations in areas of origin.

**Gwoza:** Two hundred and four (204) new arrivals were recorded in Gwoza LGA of Borno state. Eighty-one per cent arrived from Gwoza LGA and 19 per cent arrived from Bama LGA of Borno state. All movements were triggered by poor living conditions.

**Dikwa:** One hundred and ninety-three (193) new arrivals were recorded in Dikwa LGA of Borno state. All arrivals arrived from Boboshe ward within Dikwa LGA. All movements were triggered by poor living conditions.

**Monguno:** One hundred and sixty-two (162) new arrivals were recorded in Monguno LGA of Borno state. All arrivals were Nigerian nationals who returned from abroad (51% from the Diffa region in the Republic of Niger and 49% from the Marwa region of Cameroon). All movements were triggered by access to humanitarian support.

### MALNUTRITION SCREENING SUMMARY OF THE NEW ARRIVALS (CHILDREN 6 — 59 MONTHS)

Between 27 February and 05 March 2023, an exhaustive nutrition screening using Mid-Upper Arm Circumference (MUAC) and oedema for acute malnutrition was conducted by sector partners for 338 children of 6-59 months. Of the 338 children screened, the MUAC reading indicated that 17 children were recorded in the red category, 42 children in the yellow category and 279 children in the green category. No case of oedema was reported in the five LGAs assessed.

Among the 338 children screened, 56 children arrived from neighbouring countries (7 in Bama LGA, 15 in Gwoza LGA and 34 in Monguno LGA); of all the 56 children measured; 48 were in green, 7 were in yellow and 1 was in red. All children found with acute malnutrition have been admitted in the treatment programme.
