
MUAC category of screened children



The DTM Emergency Tracking Tool (ETT) is deployed to track and to collect information on large and sudden population movements, provide frequent updates on the scale of displacement and quantify the affected population when needed. As a sub-component of the Mobility Tracking methodology in Nigeria, ETT utilises direct observations and a broad network of key informants to capture the best estimates of the affected population per location, enabling targeted humanitarian response planning.


Between 13 and 19 March 2023, a total of 2,766 new arrivals were recorded in locations in Adamawa and Borno states. The new arrivals were recorded at locations in Askira/Uba, Bama, Dikwa, Gwoza, Kaga, Monguno, Ngala and Kala Balge* Local Government Areas (LGAs) of the most conflict-affected state of Borno and in Fufore, Gombi, Hong, Lamurde, Michika, Maiha, Mubi South, Mubi North, Numan, Yola South and Yola North LGAs of Adamawa state.

ETT assessments identified the following movement triggers: poor living conditions (1,106 individuals or 40%), military operations (756 individuals or 27%), improved security (586 individuals or 21%), access to humanitarian support (222 individuals or 8%), family re-unification (49 individuals or 2%), seasonal farming (41 individuals or 1%) and camp closure (6 individuals or <1%).










Country of departure of the arriving population



SUMMARY OF MAJOR NEW ARRIVALS

Bama: Nine hundred and ninety-three (993) new arrivals were recorded in Bama LGA of Borno state. Sixty-nine per cent arrived from hard-to-reach/inaccessible locations (Lawanti/Malam/Mastari/Abbaram and Yabiri Kura/Yabiri Gana/Chongolo wards) within Bama LGA, 16 per cent arrived from Dikwa LGA Borno state, 9 per cent arrived from Mubi South LGA of Adamawa state and 6 per cent arrived from Maiduguri LGA of Borno state. Sixty-four per cent of the movements were triggered by military operations, 21 per cent of the movements were a result of improved security situations in areas of origin and 16 per cent of the movements were triggered by poor living conditions.

Gwoza: Three hundred and fifty-three (353) new arrivals were recorded in Gwoza LGA of Borno state. All arrivals arrived from Gwoza LGA. All movements were triggered by poor living conditions.

Dikwa: Three hundred and eight (308) new arrivals were recorded in Dikwa LGA of Borno state. Seventy-nine per cent arrived from Dikwa LGA and 21 per cent arrived from Ngala LGA of Borno state. All movements were triggered by poor living conditions.

Fufore: One hundred and seventy-eight (178) new arrivals were recorded in Fufore LGA of Adamawa state. All arrivals arrived from Bama LGA of Borno state. All movements were a result of improved security situations in areas of origin.

MALNUTRITION SCREENING SUMMARY OF THE NEW ARRIVALS (CHILDREN 6 — 59 MONTHS)

Between 13 and 19 February 2023, an exhaustive nutrition screening using Mid-Upper Arm Circumference (MUAC) and oedema for acute malnutrition was conducted by sector partners for 583 children of 6-59 months. Of the 583 children screened, the MUAC reading indicated that 38 children were recorded in the red category, 72 children in the yellow category and 473 children in the green category. No case of oedema was reported in the seven LGAs assessed.

Among the 583 children screened, 128 children arrived from neighbouring countries (11 in Bama LGA, 83 in Mobbar LGA and 34 in Monguno LGA); of all the 128 children measured; 121 were in green, 5 were in yellow and 2 was in red. All children found with acute malnutrition have been admitted in the treatment programme.
