Flow Monitoring of Undocumented Afghan Returnees from Pakistan to Afghanistan (18 JUNE TO 01 JULY 2023)



OVERVIEW

IOM Pakistan collects data on the outflows of undocumented Afghan migrants at the Torkham and Chaman border crossing points in an effort to better understand the migration movements of undocumented Afghan migrants returning to Afghanistan from Pakistan.

Between 18 June and 01 July 2023, 6,656 undocumented Afghan nationals spontaneously returned to Afghanistan, including 5,707 through the Torkham border point and 949 through the Chaman border point. Border authorities facilitated the return of 156 individuals due to the lack of legal documentation to remain in Pakistan. Therefore, information about these individuals is not included in the count. Although IOM identified 44,836 undocumented Afghan returnees (between 1 January - 01 July 2023) at two border crossings, this may not reflect the total number of undocumented Afghan returnees. Moreover, for this study, only the head of household or representative of the family were interviewed. This means that the number of interviews conducted by the enumerators is lower than the number of returnees recorded by IOM. Between 18 June and 01 July 2023, IOM interviewed 134 respondents.

HIGHLIGHTS


- The top 3 challenges returnees expect to face in Afghanistan are: arranging for livelihoods, finding income opportunities and settling into a new city.
- During the reporting period, two per cent of returnees were categorized as vulnerable persons.¹
- The primary occupations reported by returnees were: unskilled labor (61%), skilled labor (28%), business (11%) and salaried job (1%).
- All returnees were carrying household items when interviewed.
 They also travelled with personal belongings (98%) and
 additional items, such as cash (90%) and productive assets
 (agriculture tool/seeds, rickshaw, sewing machines, etc.; 66%).
- The average cost of travelling from Pakistan to Afghanistan reported was PKR 69,277 (USD 242 as of 01 July 2023) per family.
- The worsening economic conditions in Pakistan are leading to significant return flows of undocumented Afghans. The perceived availability of assistance in Afghanistan, as well as the ability to reside with family back in their home country, were noted as major pull factors.








DISTRICTS OF ORIGIN IN PAKISTAN OF RETURNEES





