NEW ARRIVALS SCREENING BY NUTRITION PARTNERS

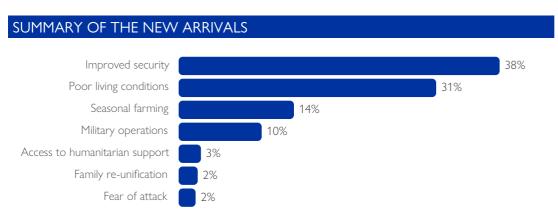

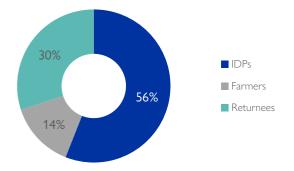
The DTM Emergency Tracking Tool (ETT) is deployed to track and collect information on large and sudden population movements, provide frequent updates on the scale of displacement and quantify the affected population when needed. As a sub-component of the mobility tracking methodology in Nigeria, ETT utilizes direct observations and a broad network of key informants to capture the best estimates of the affected population per location, enabling targeted humanitarian response planning.

Between 14 and 20 August 2023, a total of 1,579 new arrivals were recorded at locations in Adamawa and Borno states. The new arrivals were recorded at locations in Askira/Uba, Bama, Biu, Chibok, Damboa, Dikwa, Gwoza, Hawul, Kala / Balge\*, Monguno and Ngala Local Government Areas (LGAs) of the most conflict-affected Borno State and in Fufore, Gombi, Hong, Lamurde, Maiha, Michika, Mubi South, Song and Yola North LGAs of Adamawa State.

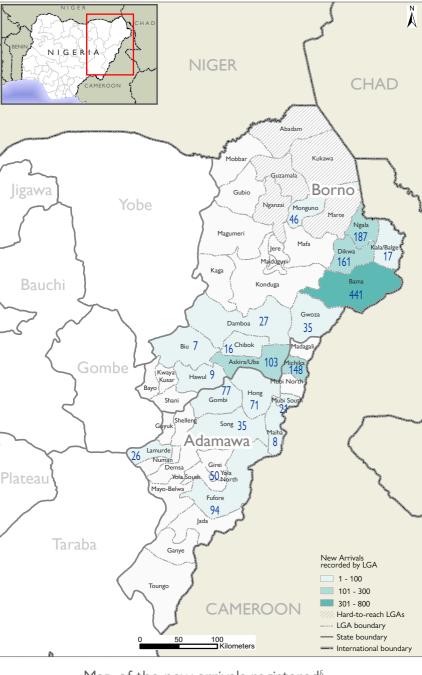
ETT assessments identified the following movement triggers: improved security (607 individuals or 38%), poor living conditions (487 individuals or 31%), seasonal farming (218 individuals or 14%), military operations (157 individuals or 10%), access to humanitarian support (42 individuals or 3%), family re-unification (36 individuals or 2%), and fear of attack (32 individuals or 2%).



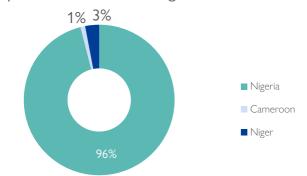
Percentage of individuals by movement trigger

### LGAS OF MAJOR NEW ARRIVALS

Bama: Four hundred and forty-one (441) new arrivals were recorded in Bama LGA of Borno State. Ninty-four per cent arrived from hard-to-reach/inaccessible locations (Dapchari / Jere / Dar-jamal / Kotembe, Andara / Ajiri / Wulba, Mbuliya / Goniri / Siraja, Shehuri / Hausari / Mairi and Yabiri Kura / Yabiri Gana / Chongolo wards) within Bama LGA of Borno State and six per cent arrived from Mafoni ward in Maiduguri Metropolitant Council of Borno State. Seventy-nine per cent of the movements were triggered by improved security and 21 per cent were as a result of military operations.

Ngala: One hundred and eighty-seven (187) new arrivals were recorded in Ngala LGA of Borno State. Seventy-four per cent arrived from hard-to-reach/inaccessible location (Fuye and Ndufu wards) in Ngala LGA and 26 per cent from (Anadua ward) in Mafa LGA of Borno State. Seventy-four per cent of movements were triggered by poor living conditions and 26% were triggered by improved security.

Dikwa: One hundred and sixty-one (161) new arrivals were recorded in Dikwa LGA of Borno State. All arrivals were from hard-to-reach/inaccessible locations (Muliye / Jemuri ward) within Dikwa LGA of Borno State. All movements were triggered by poor living conditions in areas of origin.

Michika: One hundred and forty-eight (148) new arrivals were recorded in Michika LGA of Adamawa State. Sixty-three per cent arrived from Gombi LGA, 23 per cent arrived from Hong LGA, 20 per cent arrived from Yola South LGA and 15 per cent arrived from Song LGA of Adamawa State. All movements were triggered by improved security.

#### MALNUTRITION SCREENING SUMMARY OF THE NEW ARRIVALS (CHILDREN 6 — 59 MONTHS)

Between 14 and 20 August 2023, an exhaustive nutrition screening using Mid-Upper Arm Circumference (MUAC) and oedema for acute malnutrition was conducted by sector partners for 288 children of 6-59 months. Of the 288 children screened, the MUAC reading indicated that 17 children were recorded in the red category, 37 children in the yellow category and 234 children in the green category. No case of oedema was reported in the seven LGAs assessed.

Among the 288 children screened, 92 arrived from neighbouring countries (2 in Kala / Balge, 73 in Mobbar and 17 in Monguno); of all the 92 children measured; 77 were in green, 13 were in yellow and two were in red. All children found with acute malnutrition have been admitted in the treatment programme.

Please note, the data presented above are not surveillance results and should be interpreted with caution.
