ABOUT DTM

The Displacement Tracking Matrix (DTM) is a system that tracks and monitors displacement and population mobility. It is designed to regularly and systematically capture, process and disseminate information to provide a better understanding of the movements and evolving needs of displaced populations, whether on site or en route. For more information about the DTM, please visit www.displacement.iom.int/afghanistan.

In Afghanistan, DTM employs the Baseline Mobility Assessment tool, designed to track mobility, determine the population sizes and locations of forcibly displaced people, reasons for displacement, places of origin, displacement locations and times of displacement, including basic demographics, as well as vulnerabilities and priority needs. Data is collected at the settlement level, through key informant interviews, focus group discussions, and direct observations.

This provincial report summarises the DTM findings in Paktya. The data has been collected throughout 11 districts and 405 settlements in Paktya. This provincial report is supplementary to its nationwide counterpart, please see: Baseline Mobility Assessment Summary Results (November — December 2017).

DTM enables IOM and its partners to deliver evidencebased, better targeted, mobility-sensitive and sustainable humanitarian assistance, reintegration, community stabilization and development programming.

5 TARGET POPULATIONS

Through the Baseline Mobility Assessments, DTM tracks the locations, population sizes, and cross-sectoral needs of the five core target population categories:

- 1. Returnees from Abroad
- 2. Out-Migrants

Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs), subdivided into the following three categories:

- Arrival IDPs
- 4. Returnee IDPs
- Fled IDPs

Data on population sizes for the 5 target population categories is collected by time of displacement, using each of the following time frames: 2012-2015 • 2016 • 2017.

KEY INFORMAN

DTM's field enumerators, District Focal Points (DFPs), collect data at the settlement level, predominantly through focus group discussions with key informants. The average size of focus groups is five key informants per group. In the rare case that DTM's District Focal Points cannot physically reach a community, due to insecurity, conflict, or risk of retaliation by anti-government elements, DFPs meet the focus groups at a safe place outside their communities or conduct the assessments by phone.



☆→ >>> RETURNEES

Returnees are Afghan nationals who have returned to Afghanistan in the assessed location after having spent at least six months abroad. This group includes both documented returnees (Afghans who were registered refugees in host countries and then requested voluntary return with UNHCR and relevant national authorities) and undocumented returnees (Afghans who did not request voluntary return with UNHCR, but rather returned spontaneously from host countries, irrespective of whether or not they were registered refugees with UNHCR and relevant national authorities).

The overall number of returnees in Paktya remained almost the same from the period between 2012 to 2015 and 2016 (only a 1% increase), followed by a 41% decrease in returnees in 2017






The below table displays the 20 settlements of Paktya that are most populated by IDPs and returnees. These settlements are especially fragile and susceptible to social instability induced by the large influx of returnees and IDPs and the subsequent competition for limited, already overstretched resources and job opportunities. Ragha Kalay settlement of the Chamkani district is most affected, hosting 7,974 returnees and IDPs, or 9% of all of the IDPs and returnees in the 405 assessed settlements of Paktya. Together, these 20 settlements host 25% of all of the province's IDPs and Returnees.



STORIES FROM THE DISPLACED

Resilient Returnees working hard to improve their circumstances

Walid Sadat migrated to Pakistan after the Soviet occupation in 1988. Though he was very young at the time, as the eldest son of his family he took large burden of responsibility. Both he and his younger brother, a boy of ten years, worked hard, moving from job to job to provide income for the family. Initially, they worked at a hotel for four years. Afterwards, they found employment in garbage collection, where Walid tells us that the work was hard, especially in the hot weather. Finally, they cooked and sold rice on the side of the street. Unable to attend school on top of their busy work engagements, Walid tells us that every day was a struggle and that it was difficult to make any progress in life. "Almost half of our lives have been filled with sorrow," Walid wistfully tells us. Nevertheless, the brothers did not lose their courage to continue fighting for a better existence. In 2016, they decided to return to Afghanistan in the hope that they would find better fortune and more stability. They settled back in their original home village in Paktya.

DTM data coverage tells us that the number of Afghans returned to Paktya from abroad dramatically increased in 2016, where there was a total of 27,606 returnees, as compared to a similar number of 27,067 returnees over the entire period of 2012-2015. The vast majority of returnees, like Walid and his brother, come from neighbouring Pakistan.

In Paktya, they quickly opened up stalls in two local marketplaces selling local home-made food. Over the two years that they have been back, they have built a strong reputation and business has been very good. "We live next to our market stall," Walid cheerfully tells us. "We've made a lot of progress, and we're now living well and happy with our lives."

Walid and his brother are both examples of how the challenges endured during tough migratory passages can build personal resilience. Upon their return to a relatively stable part of Paktya, they have been able to harness their entrepreneurial spirits and create a successful small business, positively contributing to the well-being of their society.
