
## Overview

From 15 April 2023, armed clashes erupted between the Sudanese Armed Forces (SAF) and the Rapid Support Forces (RSF). As a result of the military clashes, DTM Sudan estimates that 5,090,869 Individuals (1,013,051 Households) have been recently internally displaced. The IDP caseload has been observed in 5,473 locations across all of Sudan's 18 states.\*

The highest proportions of IDPs have been observed across South Darfur (12.28%), River Nile (11.99%), East Darfur (10.59%), White Nile (8.32%), North Darfur (8.31%), and Northern (7.09%). Field teams report that the IDPs observed were originally displaced from eight states. The majority (3,403,481 IDPs, 66.85%) have been reportedly displaced from Khartoum state; followed by South Darfur (15.61%), North Darfur (8.87%), Central Darfur (3.8%), West Darfur (3.65%), South Kordofan (0.69%), North Kordofan (0.52%), and Aj Jazirah (0.01%). DTM

Sudan also estimates that approximately 2.39% of the IDP caseload are non-Sudanese nationals.\*\*

In addition to the internal displacement, the conflict in Sudan has caused the Mixed Cross-Border Movements of 1,400,375 individuals into neighbouring countries namely Egypt, Libya, Chad, Central African Republic, South Sudan and Ethiopia. 64% of arrivals tracked in those countries were Sudanese nationals and 36% estimated foreign nationals and returnees. The majority of arrivals were reported in Chad (39.2%), South Sudan (27.6%), and Egypt (24.5%).\*\*\* This product provides a brief snapshot of ongoing displacement across Sudan post-15 April 2023. 



Map 1: Displacement across Sudan and into neighbouring countries since 15 April 2023.



**Disclaimer:** DTM Sudan is a suite of methodological tools which aims to track and monitor displacement. DTM collects primary data, with a focus on providing best estimates for support of the wider humanitarian community. DTM Sudan notes that military clashes remain continuous in many areas across Sudan. As such, DTM is currently collecting data through a dual combination of face-to-face and remote interviews with key informants across its network. Data on flows into neighbouring countries is based on available information from DTM flow monitoring networks and secondary sources. Figures should be treated as preliminary findings only and are subject to change via future verification exercises.


## Displacement of Foreign Nationals within Sudan



From the total reported IDP caseload, field teams indicate that 121,665 individuals are foreign nationals (approximately 2.39% of total IDPs across Sudan). These individuals are located across the following locations, in descending order of the number of foreign nationals: White Nile, Red Sea, Gedaref, Kassala, South Kordofan, Northern, River Nile, Blue Nile, Khartoum, and North Kordofan.

DTM estimates that the IDP caseload in the remaining states are all Sudanese

nationals. The majority of foreign nationals (90,901 IDPs) are located in White Nile state – where they constitute 21.46% of the IDP caseload in that state. In comparison, foreign nationals constitute smaller proportions of the observed caseload in Red Sea (11.92%), Kassala (4.82%), Gedaref (2.74%), Blue Nile (0.80%), South Kordofan (0.71%), Northern (0.18%), River Nile (0.09%), and North Kordofan (<0.01%).




## Mixed Cross-Border Movement




Since the onset of the conflict on April 15, 2023, DTM has noted substantial mixed cross-border movements involving both Sudanese and foreign nationals (including returnees). Field teams report that such these movements have proved challenging for communities to undertake. Security concerns, such as the both the direct implication of military clashes or following the breakdown in law and order in many areas, as well as steep fuel and transportation costs, and environmental events (for example flooding during the 2023 rainy season) have all impacted options for travel domestically and into neighbouring countries.




Graph 3: Timeline of Mixed Cross-Border Movement into Central African Republic




Graph 4: Timeline of Mixed Cross-Border Movement into Chad






Graph 5: Timeline of Mixed Cross-Border Movement into Egypt






Graph 6: Timeline of Mixed Cross-Border Movement into Ethiopia




Graph 7: Timeline of Mixed Cross-Border Movement into Libya
