


# WEEKLY DISPLACEMENT SNAPSHOT (12)


#### Overview

(SAF) and the Rapid Support Forces (RSF). As a result of the military clashes, DTM Sudan estimates that 5,340,863 Individuals (1,063,273 Households) have been recently internally displaced. The IDP caseload has been observed in 5,742 locations across all of Sudan's 18 states.

The highest proportions of IDPs have been observed across South Darfur (12.83%), River Nile (11.46%), East Darfur (11.29%), Aj Jazirah (8.84%), and North Darfur (8.19%). Field teams reported that the IDPs observed were originally displaced from ten states. The majority (3,459,935, 64.79%) were reportedly displaced from Khartoum state; followed by South Darfur (16.14%), North Darfur (8.73%), Central Darfur (4.37%), West Darfur (3.52%), East Darfur (1.20%), South Kordofan (0.66%), North Kordofan (0.54%), White Nile (0.04%), and Aj Jazirah (0.01%).

From 15 April 2023, armed clashes erupted between the Sudanese Armed Forces DTM Sudan also estimates that approximately 2.27% of the IDP caseload are non-Sudanese nationals.\*

> In addition to the internal displacement, the conflict in Sudan has caused the Mixed Cross-Border Movements of 1,437,874 individuals into neighbouring countries namely Egypt, Libya, Chad, Central African Republic, South Sudan and Ethiopia. 63% of arrivals tracked in those countries were Sudanese nationals and 37% estimated foreign nationals and returnees. The majority of arrivals were reported in Chad (38.3%), South Sudan (29.2%), and Egypt (23.9%).\*\*\* For more granular information on the humanitarian and displacement context, please see DTM Sudan's DTM's Monthly Displacement Overview 03.




Map 1: Displacement across Sudan and into neighbouring countries since 15 April 2023.




Disclaimer: DTM Sudan is a suite of methodological tools which aims to track and monitor displacement. DTM collects primary data, with a focus on providing best estimates for support of the wider humanitarian community. DTM Sudan notes that military clashes remain continuous in many areas across Sudan. As such, DTM is currently collecting data through a dual combination of face-to-face and remote interviews with key informants across its network. Data on flows into neighbouring countries is based on available information from DTM flow monitoring networks and secondary sources. Figures should be treated as preliminary findings only and are subject to change via future verification exercises.

# Displacement of Foreign Nationals within Sudan



From the total reported IDP caseload, field teams indicated that 121,299 individuals are foreign nationals (approximately 2.27% of total IDPs across Sudan). These individuals are located across the following locations, in descending order of the number of foreign nationals: White Nile, Red Sea, Gedaref, Kassala, South Kordofan, Northern, River Nile, Blue Nile, North Kordofan, and Khartoum.

DTM estimates that the IDP caseload in the remaining states are all Sudanese nationals. The majority of foreign nationals (90,901 IDPs) are located in White Nile state — where they constitute 20.96% of the IDP caseload in that state. In comparison, foreign nationals constitute smaller proportions of the observed caseload in Red Sea (11.69%), Kassala (4.58%), Gedaref (2.71%), Blue Nile (0.78%), South Kordofan (0.70%), Khartoum (0.68%), North Kordofan (0.26%), Northern (0.18%), and River Nile (0.08%).



Mixed Cross-Border Movement


Since the onset of the conflict on April 15, 2023, DTM has noted substantial mixed cross-border movements involving both Sudanese and foreign nationals (including returnees). Field teams report that such these movements have proved challenging for communities to undertake. Security concerns, such as the both the direct implication of military clashes or following the breakdown in law and order in many areas, as well as steep fuel and transportation costs, and environmental events (for example flooding during the 2023 rainy season) have all impacted options for travel domestically and into neighbouring countries.


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




