




# EMERGENCY TRACKING TOOL (ETT)

**365** Children (6-59 months) screened for malnutrition


**MUAC category of screened children**

Green: 198   Yellow: 66   Red: 101


Within the period of 15 – 21 August 2018, a total of 5,408 movements were recorded, including 3,958 arrivals and 1,450 departures at locations in Askira/Uba, Bama, Chibok, Damboa, Demsa, Dikwa, Fufore, Girei, Gombi, Gwoza, Hawul, Hong, Jere, Kala/Balge, Konduga, Kukawa, Madagali, Mafa, Magumeri, Maiduguri, Maiha, Mayo-Belwa, Michika, Mobbar, Monguno, Mubi-North, Mubi-South, Ngala, Nganzai, Numan, Song, Yola-North and Yola-South Local Government Areas (LGAs) of Adamawa and Borno States.

Assessments identified the following main triggers of movements: poor living conditions (26%), flood (19%), ongoing conflict (14%), fear of attacks/communal clashes (14%), voluntary relocation (13%), improved security (9%) and military operations (5%).



### Number of individuals by movement triggers

### Summary of major movements

**YOLA-SOUTH:** 535 arrivals and 197 departures were recorded in Yola South LGA of Adamawa State. These include 501 arrivals at Namtari ward from Bole/Yolde-Pati ward of Yola South LGA due to fear of attacks in the area; 24 arrivals at Namtari ward from Kauri ward of Konduga LGA and 10 arrivals at Namtari from Guduf ward of Gwoza LGA. Out of the 501 individuals who fled Bole/Yolde-Pati ward for Namtari ward, 197 voluntarily returned to their village after calm was restored in the area.

**BAMA:** 608 arrivals and 19 departures were recorded in Bama LGA of Borno State. These include 442 arrivals at GSSSS Camp from Soye/Goniri wards of Bama, 166 arrivals at Banki Camp from Koteambe/Dar-Jamal wards of Bama and 19 individuals who left Banki Camp for Maiduguri. The movements were mainly due to poor living conditions in the areas.

**SONG:** 622 individuals were displaced from their homes in Song Gari ward of Song LGA in Adamawa state due to heavy rains and flooding in the region between 15 and 18 August 2018. Majority of the affected persons were displaced to neighbouring wards in Song LGA, including Song Waje (438 individuals) and Zumo (165 individuals) wards, while 19 individuals were displaced to Manjekin ward of Maiha LGA. Urgent needs include shelter, food and NFIs.

**GWOZA:** 431 arrivals were recorded in Gwoza LGA of Borno State. These include 300 arrivals at the Transit Camp in Pulka and 131 arrivals at GSS Camp. The main movement triggers include poor living conditions and ongoing conflict.

**NGANZAI:** 356 individuals arrived at Gajiram ward of Nganzai LGA from Gasarwa village in Jigalta ward of Nganzai, due to recent conflict in Gasarwa.

## New Arrival Malnutrition Screening Summary (children 6-59 months)

An exhaustive nutrition screening using mid-upper arm circumference (MUAC) and signs of Oedema was conducted by Sector partners for 365 children. Of the 365 children screened, the MUAC reading for 101 children (100 from inaccessible areas and 1 from accessible areas) was in the Red category, 66 were in the Yellow category and 198 were measured in the Green category. No case of Oedema was reported in any of the seven LGAs where children were screened.

The results also include 34 children from neighbouring countries (2 arriving at Gwoza, 8 at Kala/Balge, 19 at Mobbar and 5 at Ngala); out of which 33 children were in the Green category and 1 in the Red category. All children found with severe acute malnutrition have been admitted for treatment.
