



The DTM Emergency Tracking Tool (ETT) is deployed to track and collect information on large and sudden population movements, provide frequent updates on the scale of displacement and quantify the affected population when needed. As a sub-component of the mobility tracking methodology in Nigeria, ETT utilizes direct observations and a broad network of key informants to capture the best estimates of the affected population per location, enabling targeted humanitarian response planning.


Between 25 and 31 December 2023, a total of 915 new arrivals were recorded at locations in Adamawa and Borno states. The new arrivals were recorded at locations in Askira/Uba, Bama, Chibok, Dikwa, Gwoza, Kala Balge, Monguno and Ngala Local Government Areas (LGAs) of the most conflict-affected Borno State and in Demsa, Fufore, Girei, Gombi, Hong, Lamurde, Madagali, Maiha, Mayo-Belwa, Michika, Mubi North, Numan, Song, Yola North and Yola South LGAs of Adamawa State.

ETT assessments identified the following movement triggers: poor living conditions (408 individuals or 45%), family re-unification (139 individuals or 15%), access to humanitarian support (101 individuals or 11%), improved security (82 individuals or 9%), insurgency (68 individuals or 7%), military operations (59 individuals or 6%) and seasonal farming (58 individuals or 6%).




Percentage of individuals by movement trigger

LGAs OF MAJOR NEW ARRIVALS

Askira/Uba: One hundred and sixteen (116) new arrivals were recorded in Askira/Uba LGA of Borno State. Thirty-three per cent were movements from Mbalala ward in Chibok LGA, four per cent were movements from Maisandari ward in Maiduguri Metro-Politant Council of Borno State, 28 per cent were movements from Gude ward in Mubi South LGA, 23 per cent were movements from Uba ward in Hong LGA and 12 per cent were movements from Dakri ward in Girei LGA of Adamawa State. Fifty-one per cent of movements were triggered by family re-unification and 49 per cent were as a result of poor living conditions.

Michika: One hundred and two (102) new arrivals were recorded in Michika LGA of Adamawa State. Thirty-six per cent arrived from Jera Bonyo ward in Girei LGA, 15 per cent arrived from Gaya ward in Hong LGA, 15 per cent arrived from Namtari ward in Yola South LGA, 14 per cent arrived from Tambajam ward of Maiha LGA of Adamawa State and 20 per cent were movements from Husara/Tampul ward in Askira/Uba LGA of Borno State. Eighty per cent of movements were triggered by improved security and 20 per cent were as a result of poor living conditions.

Hong: Eighty-five (85) new arrivals were recorded in Hong LGA of Adamawa State. Seventy-one of movements were from Shangui ward in Hong LGA and 29 per cent were movements from Bole Yolde Pate ward in Yola South LGA of Adamawa State. Seventy-one per cent of movements were triggered by insurgency and 29 per cent were as a result of poor living conditions.

Gombi: Seventy (70) new arrivals were recorded in Gombi LGA of Adamawa State. Seventy-three per cent arrived from Pallam ward in Madagali LGA and 27 per cent arrived from Luggere wards in Yola North LGA of Adamawa State. Seventy-three per cent of movements were triggered by poor living conditions and 27 per cent were as a result of family re-unification.
