

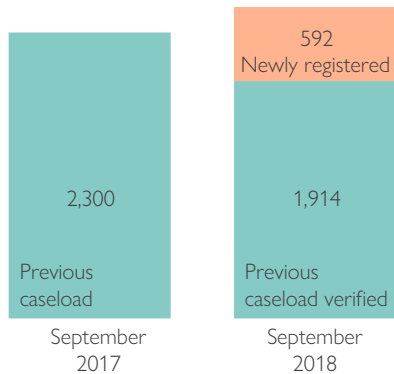
The International Organization for Migration (IOM), in cooperation with ACTED, in support of the World Food Programme (WFP) and other partners, conducted a biometric registration (BMR) exercise at Bor Protection of Civilians Site (Jonglei) from 13 to 15 September 2018. The team processed 2,506 individuals corresponding to 1,187 households. 1,914 out of these 2,506 persons (76%) were verified individuals already registered since September 2017 and 592 individuals were newly registered (F.1). The exercise will allow beneficiaries to access services and partners to allocate resources efficiently.

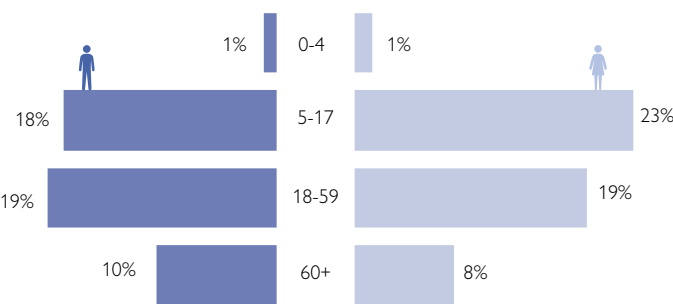

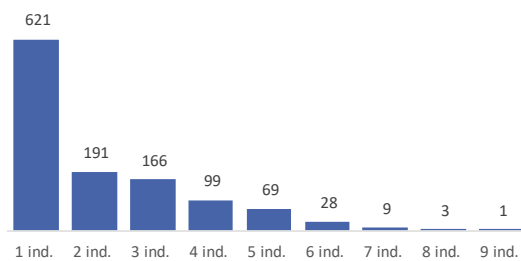
F.1 Previous and current registered population



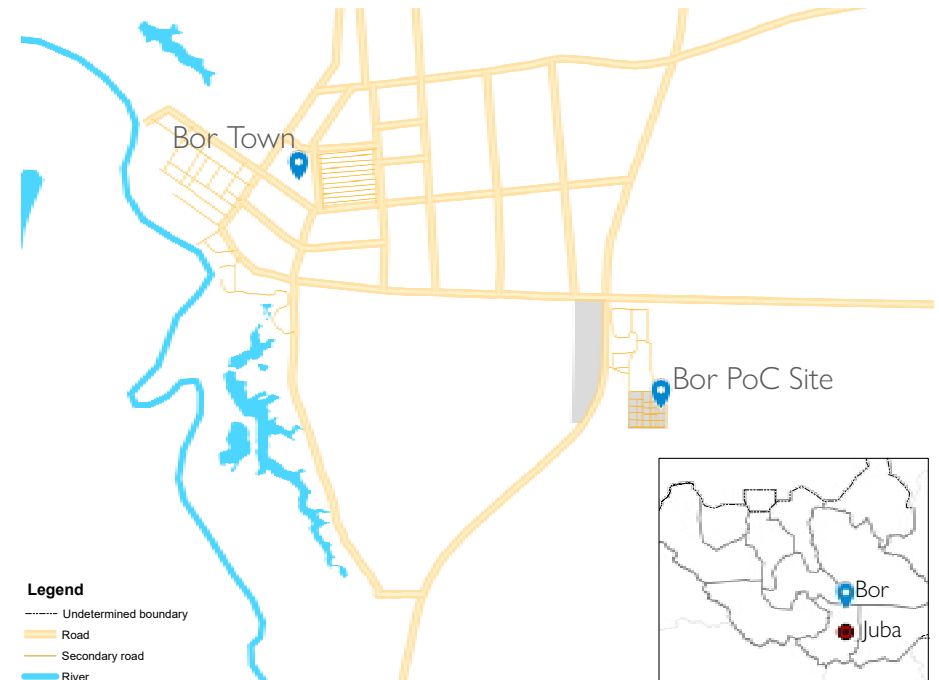
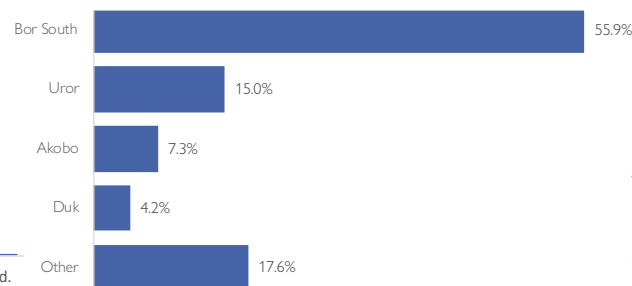
F.2 Population pyramid of reg. individuals (n=2,506)

Ninety-two per cent of registered individuals came from Jonglei and four per cent from Unity State (4% other). More than half of all individuals came from Bor South County (of these, 89% Bor and 6% Anyidi Payam) and 15 per cent from Uror County (of these, 28% Motot, 25% Pathai) (F.4). Fifty-two per cent of individuals were female and 56 per cent under the age of 18 (F.2). With an average household size of 2.1 individuals, 52 per cent of households counted one person only, 16 per cent two persons and 14 per cent three individuals (F.3).
