


Flow Monitoring - Spontaneous Returns of Undocumented Afghans from Pakistan


In Torkham, 'Returning Home' is trending downwards and 83% of the respondents cited this as a push factor (decrease of 3 percentage points compared to last week). 'Economic Factors' is trending upwards, and is at 78% (increase of 11 percentage points compared to last week). 'Afraid of Being Deported' is trending slightly downwards and 35% of the respondents cited this as a push factor (decrease of 3 percentage points compared to last week). 'Lack of Documentation' increased slightly upwards and 7% of the respondents cited this as a push factor (increase of 1 percentage points compared to last week). Whereas 'Camp Closure' decreased slightly and 3% of the respondents cited this as a push factor (decrease of 4 percentage points) at Torkham.

In Chaman, 'Returning Home' is trending upwards, and 75% of the respondents cited this as a push factor (increase of 9 percentage points compared to last week). 'Afraid of Being Deported' is trending slightly downwards and 20% of the respondents cited this as a push factor (decrease of 3 percentage points compared to last week). **'Economic Factors'** stayed the same and 7% of the respondents reported this as a push factor . Whereas none of the respondents cited 'Lack of Documentation' or 'Camp Closure' as a push factor at Chaman.


The indicator rated as the main pull factor for both border crossing points was 'Own Country'. For Torkham, 96% of the respondents reported this as a key concern. whereas in Chaman, this was reported by 70% of the respondents. The second highest concern was 'Reunion with Family / Relatives' which was at 84% for Torkham and at 29% for Chaman.

Further in Torkham, 6% of the respondents reported 'Availability of Assistance in Afghanistan' as a pull factor, wheras 1% of the respondents reported 'Improvement in Security Situation' as a pull factor. Similarly in Chaman, 2% of the respondents reported 'Availability of Assistance in Afghanistan' as a pull factor and none of the respondents reported'Improvement in Security Situation' as a pull factor.

RANK 2 Nangarhar




RANK 3 Kunduz

- Kunar (6%)




The largest proportion of returns are from:

Overall 82% of Undocumented Afghans residing in Pakistan live in rented houses, followed by 16% in camps, whereas the remaining 2% comprise of families that live in spontaneous settlements and / or with their relatives.

There is a significant difference at the provincial level, where for example 100% of undocumented Afghan families residing in FATA live in rented houses, in comparison to 97% for Balochistan,85% for Punjab & Sindh and 76% for KPK.

It was observed that in KPK 23% of undocumented Afghans live in camps followed by 13% in Punjab, and 3% in Balochistan. however Sindh and FATA reported no families living in camps.
