

OVERVIEW


IOM's Displacement Tracking Matrix in collaboration with INGD conducted a movement intention survey to 1,062 household hosting 5,010 individuals displaced from Chiure district in Cabo Delgado to Erati district in Nampula province. Conflict and/or fear of attacks due to Non-State Armed Groups (NSAGs) in Cabo Delgado was the main trigger of displacement. **95%** were displaced from Ocuá posto. **52%** of the IDPs are female whilst **48%** are males. Children constitutes **55%** of the IDPs.

The objective of the assessment was to better understand the conditions of the IDP households in the current place of displacement and their short term intentions. **98%** of the displaced households arrived in the current locations between 19 and 24 February 2024. **84%** intend to stay in the current location for a period longer than one week.

POSTO OF ORIGIN AND DISPLACEMENT







If you intend to return to your place of origin or go to another area, when do you intend to do so?




IDPs who intend to **return** need support with:



53% of the respondents feel deeply integrated and actively involved in the local community, **39%** feel being part of the community but not deeply involved whilst the remaining **8%** reported neutral and negative relationship with the host community. Among those who prefer relocating somewhere else rather than returning to places of origin, the major reasons include; not comfortable in place of usual residence (**95%**), presence of family members in the intended location of destination (**40%**) and availability of livelihood opportunities in intended place or destination (**12%**).

Of the **43** IDPs who intend to relocate, **42** prefer relocating to areas within Nampula:
