

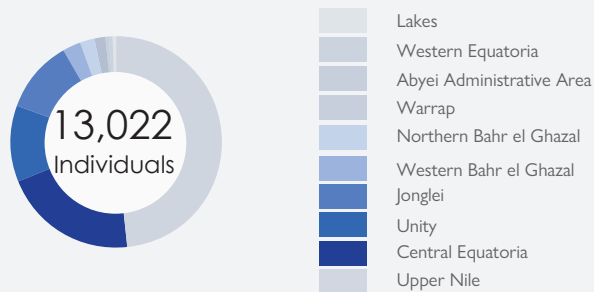
Overview

Since the conflict between the Sudanese Armed Forces (SAF) and the Rapid Support Forces (RSF) erupted in Khartoum, Sudan, clashes have further spread to other states within the country. As of 9 March 2024, over 600,561 individuals had crossed into South Sudan through the Wunthow (Juda) point of entry in Renk. The majority are South Sudanese (78.5%), followed by Sudanese (20.7%), and individuals of other nationalities (0.8%). The population of Renk TC and its adjacent area was 15,230 individuals (3,064 households) during the reporting period.

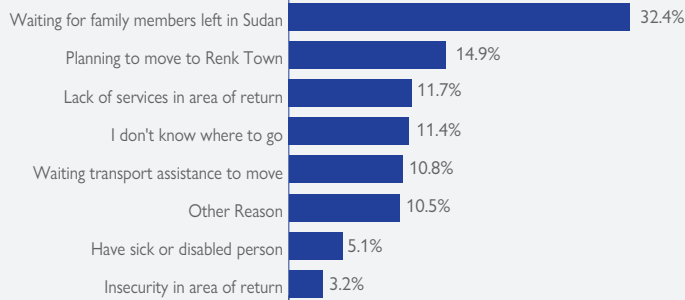
On 9 March 2024, the IOM's Displacement Tracking Matrix (DTM), in collaboration with WFP and ACTED, conducted a rapid intention survey in Renk TC and its adjacent area to understand the population's return intentions, preferred destinations of return, as well as reasons for choosing to remain in the transit center.

Intentions of returnees

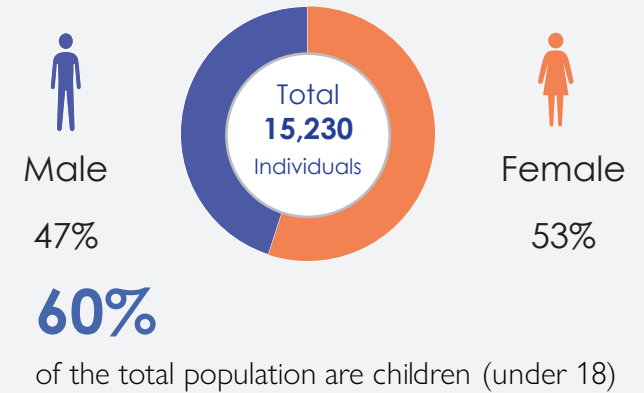
85.5% of returnees intend to go to their areas of origin (70.9%) or move to other areas within South Sudan (14.6%)



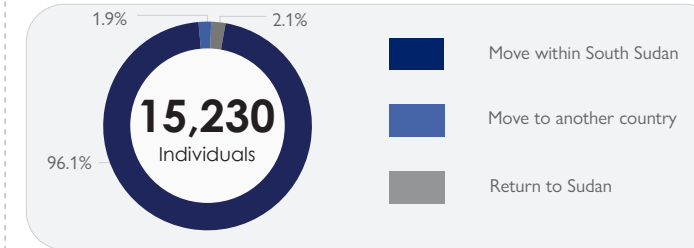
8.8% of returnees intend to remain at the Renk TC for the short-term indicating these reasons



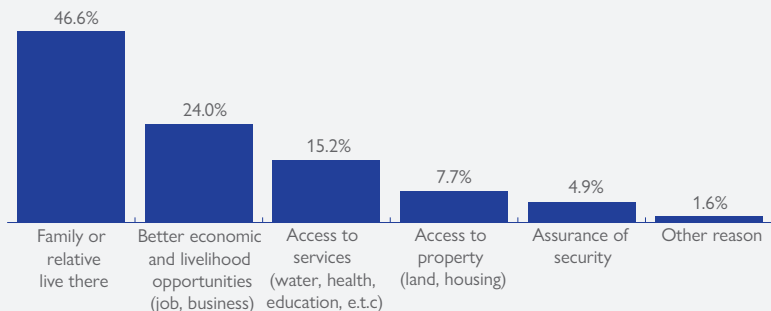

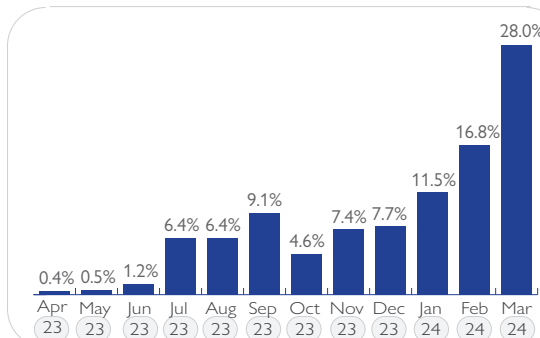
Intention of population at Renk TC
