Arrivals were recorded at locations in Askira Uba, Bama, Chibok, Damboa, Dikwa, Gubio, Gwoza, Hawul, Jere, Kaga, Kala/Balge, Konduga, Kukawa, Mafa, Magumeri, Maiduguri, Mobbar, Monguno and Ngala Local Government Areas (LGAs) of Borno state and locations in Fufore, Girei, 8 Mafa Gombi, Guyuk, Lamurde, Madagali, Maiha, Mayo Belwa, Michika, Mubi North, Mubi Borno Maiduguri South, Numan, Song, Yola North, and Yola South LGAs of Adamawa state. Departures were recorded at Askira Uba and Chibok LGAs of Borno state and Demsa, Fufore, Girei, Guyuk, Hong, Lamurde, Madagali, Maiha, Mayo Belwa, Mubi North, Mubi South, Numan, Song, Yola North, and Yola South LGAs of Adamawa state. ETT assessments identified the following movement triggers: voluntary relocation (28%), improved security (13%), Military operation (1%), farming (3%), ongoing conflict (33%), poor living conditions (20%) and fear of attacks (3%). **NUMAN:** 65 arrivals and 34 departures were recorded in Numan LGA of Adamawa state. These include 28 arrivals from Nzumosu in Bolki ward of Numan LGA, 7 arrivals from Mumsirmi in Lafiya ward of Lamurde LGA, 24 arrivals from Gwadabawa and Jambutu wards of Yola North, 6 arrivals from Lokowa ward of Mubi North, 16 departures from Bolki ward of Numan LGA and 18 departures from Benjaram ward of Guyuk LGA in Adamawa State. Some of the new arrivals reported to have voluntarily relocated while was due to fear of attack and improved security. Departures was due to the improved security.

**Monguno:** 440 arrivals were recorded in Monguno LGA of Borno state. These include 4 arrivals from Mairari ward of Guzamala LGA, 184 arrivals from Yoyo ward, 127 arrivals from Kekeno ward, 125 arrivals from Baga ward of Kukawa LGA in Borno State. The new arrivals reported to have relocated due to the ongoing conflict.

**GWOZA:** 244 arrivals were recorded in Gwoza LGA of Borno state. These include 74 arrivals from Shehuri ward of Bama LGA, 10 arrivals from Pulka/Bokko and Agapalawa wards of Gwoza LGA, 113 arrivals from Mora ward of Marwa LGA, 7 arrivals from Maisandari ward of Maiduguri and 40 arrivals from Banki and Darajamal wards of Bama LGA in Borno State. The new arrivals reported to have relocated voluntarily while others relocated due to poor living conditions.

MAGUMERI: 243 arrivals were recorded in Magumeri LGA of Borno state. These include 109 arrivals from Gajiram ward of Nganzai LGA, 95 arrivals from Kabubla ward of Marte LGA and 39 arrivals from Bornoyesu ward of Magumeri LGA in Borno State. The new arrivals reported to have relocated due to the ongoing conflict and poor living condition.

**BAMA:** 159 arrivals were recorded in GSSSS Camp and Banki Camp in Bama LGA of Borno state. These include 49 arrivals from Mokola and Marwa LGA in Cameroon, 36 arrivals from Darajamal, Bama and Goniri wards of Bama LGA, 26 arrivals from Sabsawa ward and 45 arrivals from Shehuri and Soye wards on Bama LGA, The new arrivals reported to have relocated voluntarily and due to the poor living condition.

### New Arrival Malnutrition Screening Summary (children 6-59 months)

An exhaustive nutrition screening using mid-upper arm circumference (MUAC) and Oedema for acute malnutrition was conducted by Sector partners for 259 children of 6-59 months. Of the 259 children screened, the MUAC reading was: 3 children (1 from inaccessible and 2 from accessible area) were in the Red category, 21 were in the Yellow category and 235 were measured in the Green category. No case of Oedema was reported in the 6 LGAs that sent in reports.

The results also include 52 children from neighbouring LGAs (15 from Bama, 25 from Gwoza, 1 from Kala/Balge, 2 from Mobbar and 9 from Ngala): of all the 52 children measured, 1 was in red category, 47 in the green category and 4 in the yellow category. All children found with severe
