FLASH UPDATE • FLOODS IN SOUTHEASTERN LIBYA

13 August 2024



HIGHLIGHTS

Displacement

- Nearly 3,000 individuals¹ have been displaced in Alkufra and Rabiana (southeastern Libya) after heavy rains caused **flooding** and a power outage on 11 August 2024.
- Around 600 individuals, including 50 Sudanese families, are sheltered in four schools, one guesthouse and one health centre in the municipalities of **Alkufra** and **Rabiana** (around 120 km west of Alkufra) (map 1 & 2). Others have recently left the schools where they were taking refuge because of poor access to water and sanitation due to overcrowding.

Sex and age breakdown

• DTM estimates that around a third (33%) of those displaced and sheltering in schools, guesthouse and health centre (map 1 & 2) are adult males while 23 per cent are adult females and 45 per cent children.

Health


- The Attia Alkaseh hospital has been **flooded** and 35 patients had to be transferred to nearby clinics.
- · The floods and the lack of sufficient artificial light due to the power outage may be contributing to an increasing number of scorpion stings. This year, the Attia Alkaseh hospital has reported two deaths as a result of scorpion sting. While the majority of scorpion stings are not deadly, children are at greater risk of envenomation than adults. Antivenom is reportedly available with an additional supply on its way.

Material damage

- Damage to services and infrastructure was reported (including water, electricity, telecommunications and road transport).
- The floods damaged at least 30 houses in the municipality of Alkufra in the neighbourhoods of Algadraffi, Alshura, and Alwasati (Aljawf Center area) and 16 others in the oasis of Rabiana.
