




METHODOLOGY

The DTM Emergency Tracking Tool (ETT) is deployed to track and collect information on large and sudden population movements, provide frequent updates on the scale of displacement and quantify the affected population when needed. As a sub-component of the mobility tracking methodology in Nigeria, ETT utilizes direct observations and a broad network of key informants to capture the best estimates of the affected population per location, enabling targeted humanitarian response planning.


LIMITATIONS

The ETT figures reported are not cumulative of all the affected persons thus far but rather provide a snapshot of the current displacement situation on the date indicated. The data and information reported on this dashboard are related solely to the movements caused by the triggers on page two between 05 – 11 August.

ALERT SUMMARY


Between 05 and 11 August 2024, a total of 2,073 new arrivals were recorded at locations in Adamawa and Borno states. The new arrivals were recorded at locations in Askira/Uba, Bama, Gubio, Gwoza, Kaga, Kala Balge, Mafa, Monguno and Ngala Local Government Areas (LGAs) of the most conflict-affected Borno State, and in Demsa, Fufore, Ganye, Girei, Gombi, Guyuk, Hong, Jada, Lamurde, Madagali, Maiha, Mayo-Balwa, Mubi North, Mubi South, Numan, Song, Yola North and Yola South LGAs of Adamawa State.

ETT assessments identified the following movement triggers: military operations (608 individuals or 29%), poor living conditions (469 individuals or 23%), seasonal farming (387 individuals or 19%), family re-unification (255 individuals or 12%), fear of attack (101 individuals or 5%), access to humanitarian support (96 individuals or 5%), government re-integration (90 individuals or 4%) and improved security (67 individuals or 3%).




PERCENTAGE OF INDIVIDUALS BY MOVEMENT TRIGGER





MALNUTRITION SCREENING SUMMARY OF THE NEW ARRIVALS (CHILDREN 6 – 59 MONTHS)

Between 05 and 11 August 2024, an exhaustive nutrition screening using Mid-Upper Arm Circumference (MUAC) and oedema for acute malnutrition was conducted by sector partners for 315 children aged 6-59 months. Of the 315 children screened, the MUAC reading indicated that 79 were recorded in the red category, 56 in the yellow category and 180 in the green category. No case of oedema was reported in the seven LGAs assessed.

Among the 315 children screened, 54 arrived from neighbouring countries (3 in Gwoza LGA, 46 in Mobbar LGA and 5 in Ngala LGA); of all the 54 children measured; 48 were in green, six were in yellow and none in the red category. All children found with acute malnutrition have been admitted to the treatment programme.
