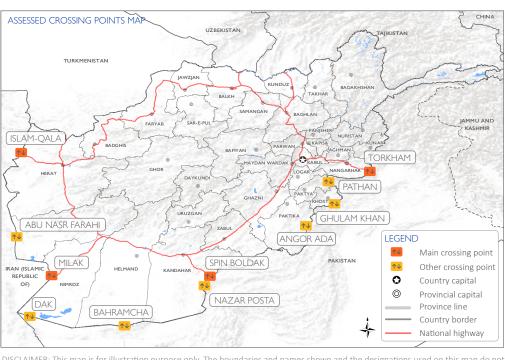


ABOUT DTM FLOW MONITORING

The IOM Afghanistan's DTM Flow Monitoring activity is designed to provide insights into the mobility patterns at Afghanistan's border points with the Islamic Republic of Iran and Pakistan. The activity involves two interlinked exercises: the Flow Monitoring Counting (FMC), a headcount of individuals crossing the border, and the Flow Monitoring Surveys (FMS), which collect data on the profiles and intentions of randomly selected Afghan nationals. DTM FM is operational at four main crossing points (connected to Afghanistan's National Highway) as well as seven other crossing points with Islamic Republic of Iran and Pakistan. This weekly snapshot combines information from the FM activity and various IOM sources related to cross-border movement. HIGHLIGHTS OF THE WEEK

- Inflow exceeded outflow by 18 per cent this week. Both inflows and outflows decreased by 12 per cent from last week. Flows may have been affected by a public holiday on 14 August marking the third anniversary of the De-facto Authority.
- Among the total inflow, those entering through main crossing points were more likely to intend to stay in Afghanistan longer term compared to those entering through other crossing points, who often only intended to stay short-term.
- Among inflow at all borders, female respondents were around twice as likely as male respondents to cite "feeling unsafe in the origin location" as a reason for travel.

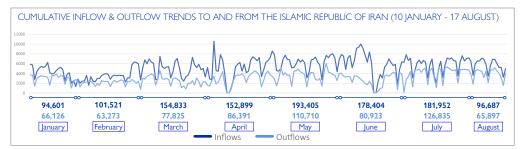

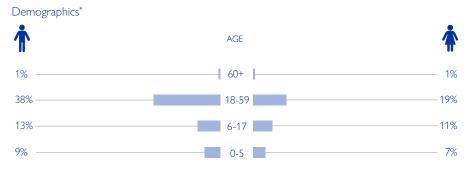

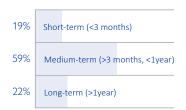

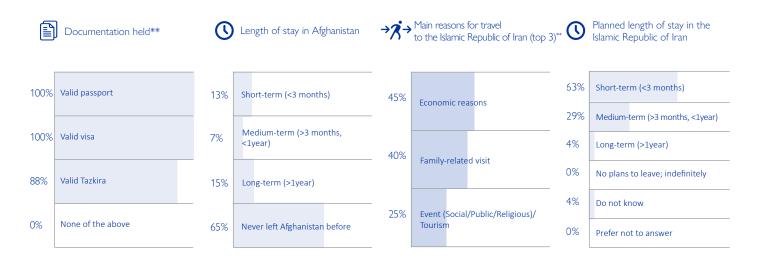

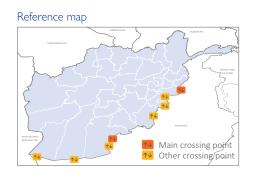

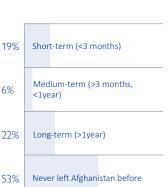
OUTFLOWS TO PAKISTAN



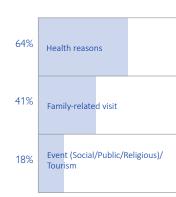

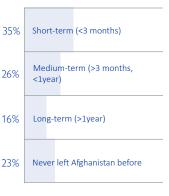

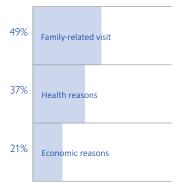

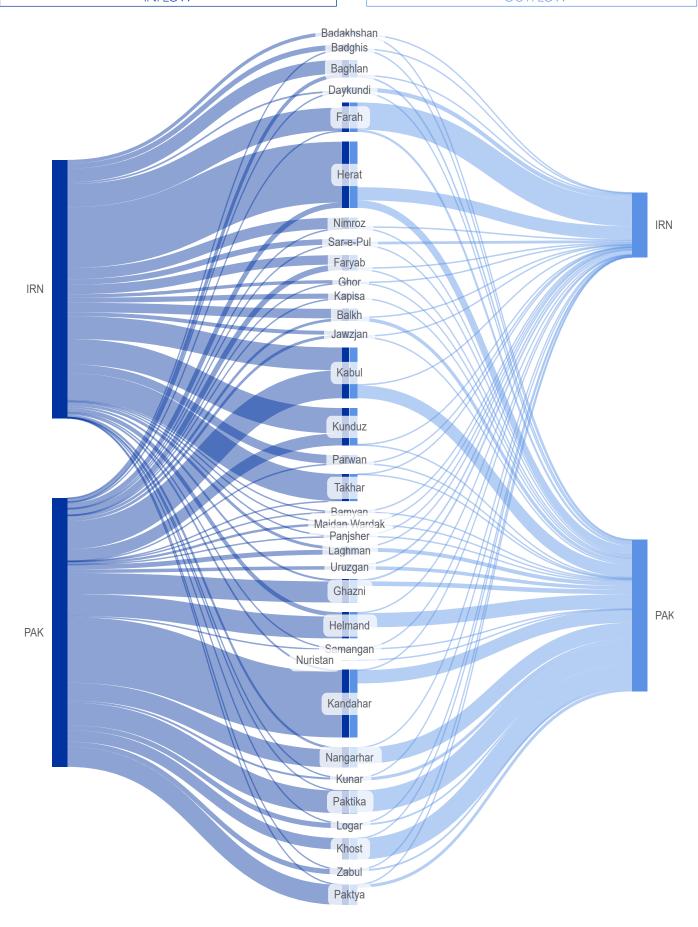
