IDP SHELTER ARRANGEMENT

IRAQ IDP CRISIS - JANUARY 2014 TO 28 APRIL 2016

IOM's DTM aims to monitor displacement and provide accurate data about the IDP population in Iraq. Data is collected by Rapid Assessment and Response Teams (RART), composed of 140 staff on the entire Iraqi territory. Data is gathered via a network of over 1,300 key informants.

From the start of January 2014 through 28 April 2016, the DTM identified 3,333,384 internally displaced individuals (555,564 families). This maps shows the sizes of IDP population residing in 3 main shelter categories (private, critical, camp plus unknown).









Critical shelter arrangements³


