


Overview of Migrant Situation in Turkey

According to the latest available figures from the Turkish Directorate General for Migration Management (DGMM) currently there are more than 4 million foreign nationals present in Turkish territory seeking international protection.

Most of them are Syrians (3,639,705* individuals) who are granted the temporary protection (TP) status, while according to UNHCR another large group of the foreign nationals are 368,230** asylum-seekers and refugees consisting of different nationalities, but mainly coming from Afghanistan, Islamic Republic of Iran, Iraq, Somalia and other countries.

In addition, there are 896,814* foreign nationals under residence permit holder status including humanitarian residence holders.




Temporary Protection*

Turkey implements a Temporary Protection regime for 3,639,705 individuals from Syrian Arab Republic which grants beneficiaries right to legally stay in Turkey as well as some level of access to basic rights and services. A vast majority of them, 3,497,854 individuals, live outside the camps and are spread across the Turkish border provinces while nearly 141,851 live in 13 camps the majority of which are also located close to the Syrian border.

Monthly Population Chart of Persons Under Temporary Protection




Asylum Seekers and Refugees

Another large group other than Syrians who are under TP in Turkey are 368,230* asylum seekers and refugees consisting of different nationalities, but mainly coming from Afghanistan, Iraq, Islamic Republic of Iran and Somalia.

Residence Permit Holders

Foreigners who would stay in Turkey beyond the duration of a visa or a visa exemption or, longer than ninety days should obtain a residence permit. There are 896,814 residence permit holders in Turkey within various categories. According to DGMM, the "other" residence permit category includes Humanitarian Residence permit holders but the exact number is unknown. It is believed that vast majority of this category are Iraqi nationals. The breakdown of the residence permit holders are shown in the map on the left. The category breakdown of residence permits are published annually whereas the total number of residence permit holders are monthly published.

Since 4 April 2016 there are 1,835* migrants and refugees readmitted to Turkey from Greece. Main returning points from Greece include Lesbos, Chios, Kos and Samos and the main readmission points to Turkey include Dikili, Çeşme, Bodrum and Adana (through the airport).

Apprehended Persons on Land*



According to Turkish Armed Forces (TAF) sources, in February 2019, TAF registered a total number of 13,869 irregular border crossings; 12,206 of which having entered Turkey from Syrian Arab Republic, Greece, Islamic Republic of Iran, Iraq and Bulgaria and registered 1,663 irregular crossings from Turkey into Greece, Syrian Arab Republic and Bulgaria. The numbers per border are shown in the table on the left.

Resettlement of Syrians From Turkey

Since 4 April 2016 when EU-Turkey agreement on the readmission of migrants to Turkey arriving in Greece after 20 March 2016 entered into force, a total number of 19,768* Syrians were resettled to the below mentioned countries according to One-to-One mechanism with the assistance of IOM.

Apprehended/Rescued Persons on Sea

According to Turkish Coast Guard (TCG) reports, the Turkish Coast Guard apprehended 1,428* irregular migrants and one fatality was recorded in February 2019. The top ten nationalities of apprehended/rescued migrants are Afghan, Palestinian, Syrian, Iraqi, Central African, Congolese, Iranian, Togolese, Somalian and Eritrean.
