




New Arrival Screening by Nutrition Partners




Within the period of 3 - 9 June, a total of 2,231 movements were recorded, including 1,633 arrivals and 598 departures. Arrivals were recorded at locations in Askira/Uba, Bama, Biu, Damboa, Gwoza, Hawul, Jere, Kala Balge, Maiduguri, Mobbar, Monguno and Ngala Local Government Areas (LGAs) of Borno state and locations in Demsa, Fufore, Girei, Gombi, Guyuk, Hong, Madagali, Maiha, Mayo Belwa, Numan, Song, Yola North and Yola South LGAs of Adamawa state. Departures were recorded at Askira/Uba LGA of Borno state, Fufore, Girei, Gombi, Guyuk, Hong, Madagali, Maiha, Mayo Belwa, Michika, Mubi South, Numan, Yola North and Yola South LGAs of Adamawa state.

ETT assessments identified the following movement triggers: voluntary relocation (16%), improved security (40%), fear of attack (3%), ongoing conflict (2%) military operation (7%) and poor living conditions (32%).



Number of individuals by movement triggers

Summary of major movements

Madagali: 235 arrivals and 45 departures were recorded in Madagali LGA of Adamawa state. These include 115 arrivals from Danyel, Girei I and II, Wuro Dule and Moderi/Viniklang wards of Girei LGA, 42 arrivals from Imburu ward of Numan LGA, 22 arrivals from Lokuwa and Yelwa wards of Mubi North LGA, 13 arrivals from Bangshika ward of Hong LGA and 13 arrivals from Makama A ward of Yola South LGA. Other arrivals include 9 from Karewa ward of Yola North LGA, 17 from Gulak and Hyambula ward and 7 from Shamaki ward of Gombe LGA of Gombe state. Departures include 17 from Nassarawo ward of Mubi North LGA, 15 from Gombi South ward of Gombi LGA and 13 from Gadamayo and Gwoza Wakane wards of Gwoza LGA of Borno state. 91% of the new arrivals reported to have relocated due to improved security, 6% due to fear of attack while 3% was due poor living conditions. 29% of the departure was due to improved security while 71% was due to poor living conditions.

Askira/Uba: 241 arrivals and 37 departures were recorded in Askira/Uba LGA of Borno state. These include 152 arrivals from Uba ward of Askira/Uba LGA tracked at Dille/Huyim and Kopa/Multhfu wards of Askira/Uba LGA. Other arrivals include 19 from Kolere ward of Mubi North LGA and 70 from Mampaya in Uba ward of Hong LGA of Adamawa state. Departures include 26 from Lassa ward of Askira/Uba LGA tracked at Uvu Central ward of Askira/Uba LGA and 11 from Michika II ward of Michika LGA of Adamawa state. 92% of the new arrivals reported to have relocated due to improved security while 8% relocated due to poor living conditions. 70% of the departure was due to poor living conditions while 30% was voluntary.

Damboa: 142 arrivals were recorded in Damboa LGA of Borno state. The new arrivals were all from Sabon Gari in Azur/Multe/Forfor ward of Damboa LGA and they all reported to have relocated due to military operation.

Gwoza: 158 arrivals were recorded in Gwoza LGA of Borno state. The new arrivals include 19 from Darajamal and Soye wards of Bama LGA, 40 from Chikede ward and 49 arrivals from Dure, Bokko and Hambagda/Limankara wards of Gwoza LGA tracked at Pulka/Bokko ward of Gwoza LGA. Other arrivals include 12 from Lamisula/Jabbamari ward of Maiduguri Metropolitan Council, 19 from Wurolarde ward of Maiha LGA, 4 from Wuro Patuje ward of Mubi South LGA of Adamawa state and 15 from Marwa in Cameroon. The new arrivals reported to have relocated due to poor living conditions.

New Arrival Malnutrition Screening Summary (children 6-59 months)

An exhaustive nutrition screening using monitoring of symptoms of acute malnutrition mid-upper arm circumference (MUAC) and Oedema was conducted by Nutrition Sector partners for 139 children of 6-59 months. Of the 139 children screened, the MUAC reading was: 24 children (from inaccessible area) were in the Red category, 22 were in the Yellow category and 93 were measured in the Green category. No case of Oedema was reported in the 7 LGAs.

The results also include 18 children from neighbouring Cameroon, Chad and Republic of Niger (4 moved to Mobbar while 14 moved to Ngala). Out of the 18 children measured, none was in the red category, 14 were in the green category and 4 children were in the yellow category. All children found with severe acute malnutrition have been admitted for treatment. The data presented is not surveillance results and should be interpreted with caution.
