


Flow Monitoring - Spontaneous Returns of Undocumented Afghans from Pakistan 31st March - 13th April 2019




In Torkham, 'Returning Home' is trending upwards and 86% of the respondents cited this as a push factor (increase of 16 percentage points compared to the last reporting period). 'Economic Factors' is trending downwards and 45% of the respondents cited this as a push factor (decrease of 3 percentage points compared to the last reporting period). 'Afraid of Being Deported' decreased to 21% (decrease of 7 percentage points compared to the last reporting period). 'Lack of Documentation' was reported by 11% of the respondents (decrease of 1 percentage point compared to the last reporting period). Whereas none of the respondents at Torkham reported 'Camp Closure' as a push factor.

In Chaman, 'Returning Home' is trending downwards and is at 68% (decrease of 8 percentage points compared to the last reporting period). 'Economic Factors' is at 25% (increase of 11 percentage points compared to the last reporting period). 'Afraid of Being Deported' is trending downwards and is at 4% (decrease of 2 percentage points compared to the last reporting period). 'Camp Closure' was reported by 1% of the respondents as a push factor (same as last reporting period). Whereas none of the respondents at Chaman reported 'Lack of Documentation' as a push factor.

The indicator rated as the main pull factor for both border crossing points was 'Own Country'. This was reported by 97% of the respondents at Torkham and 87% of the respondents at Chaman. The second highest concern was 'Reunion with Family / Relatives' which was reported by 54% of the respondents at Torkham and 11% of the respondents at Chaman. Furthermore, 1% of the responded at Chaman and none at Torkham reported 'Availability of Assistance in Afghanistan'. Whereas none of the respondents at Torkham and Chaman reported 'Improvement in Security Situation' as a pull factor.

- Paktya (6%)




The largest proportion of returns are from:

Overall, 86% of Undocumented Afghan returnees from this week reported living in rented houses, whereas 8% reported living in a 'Camp,' 5% reported 'living in a spontaneous settlement,' whereas the remaining 1% reported 'living with relatives'.

There are differences at the provincial level where for example in Sindh 97%, in Balochistan and Punjab 91% and in KP 72% of Undocumented Afghan returnees reported living in 'rented houses'.

In KP, 16% of the Undocumented Afghan returnees reported living in Camp compared to 9% in Balochistan and 3% in Punjab and Sindh.
