
Event Tracking: Abyei, Ameth Aguok

New displacement from Dungop to Abyei Town Data Collection: 4 August 2018

Background

In mid-July, armed attacks in the Dungop in Abyei led to the displacement of 150 individuals (30 households) to Abyei's Ameth Aguok region. In early August, humanitarian partners were alerted to the presence of the IDPs and organized an assessment mission to the displacement site, where IDPs are currently residing primarily with family members in the host community. Ongoing WFP food distribution in the area has mitigated the impact of displacement.

TRIGGER FOR MOVEMENT Armed Attacks


Armed attacks in mid-July led to the displacement of IDPs from Dungop to the Mulmul area of Ameth Aguok in Abyei Town. An assessment on 4 August, 2018, determined that 150 IDPs (30 households) from Dungop are currently residing within the host community, particularly as many of them have family members in Abyei Town.

Some members of the community remained behind following communal clashes, and others have resettled in Dungop since then, primarily to support livelihood activities in their home area. Non-food items were noted as the key area of need for IDPs, particularly plastic sheeting, mosquito nets, blankets and cooking utensils that they were unable to carry with them during displacement. Additionally, protection was also cited as a key area of need.
