

# COVID-19 Preparedness: Mobility Update Week 5 (20 - 26 April 2020)

#### **Background and Methodology**

DTM relies on its network of key informants and on secondary sources to provide a weekly assessment of mobility and COVID-19 preparedness at priority locations in South Sudan. The updates are released in the beginning of each week based on information collected Monday–Sunday of the previous week. Table 2 on page 2 represents only points recommended by the Points of Entry Technical Working Group (PoETWG). #### **Overview**

On 25 April 2020, South Sudan registered its <u>sixth</u> COVID-19 case just two days after the <u>fifth</u>. On confirmation of the sixth case, the High-Level Task Force (HLTF) on 26 April 2020 issued a suspension of all public transportation from and to Juba as well as Torit, where cases of the virus were found. These road movement restrictions follow interstate flight limitations from 13 April 2020. As of 21 April, the HLTF further extended all movement restrictions introduced in March 2020 until further notice.

**Humanitarian access** was limited by newly imposed flight clearance taxations and mandatory "COVID-19 free" certificates prior to travel. This impacted food air drops as well as trucking for pre-positioning of humanitarian goods during these final weeks of the dry season. As of 25 April 2020, humanitarian workers can return to their home-country without such a certificate. Further COVID-19 related **population movements** included increased permanent exits from Wau PoC AA (observed by IOM DTM) and reportedly return movements from Uganda and in-country locations to Juba according to the RRC.


Although cargo is mostly allowed to enter the country, movement restrictions have caused **market prices** like those of wheat, sorghum and maize to increase.

Further<sup>1</sup> **arrests** were made of persons breaking <u>congregation</u> or <u>travel</u> restrictions.

### Key insights on countries bordering South Sudan

- SUDAN: DTM observed travel of cargo between South Sudan and Sudan through Abyei as well as sporadic cases of movements through alternative routes near the border point, which is otherwise closed. Movement through Kiir Adem (Aweil North) continues uninterrupted. Markets in Renk Town are reported to have undergone rapid price increases due to travel restrictions with a rise in smuggling. Movements into Raja of persons from camps in Darfur as well as cargo continues uninterrupted.
- ETHIOPIA: Cross-border movements to and from Ethiopia at most points of entries remain on halt or is carried out via alternative local roads. However, movement of cargo through Akobo continues with a lower volume of flows through Boyi / Dima. Ethiopia is to embark on door to door testing of COVID-19 cases in the country in a quest to test at least 4,000 people on a daily basis.
- UGANDA: On 21 April 2020, a traveler who tested positive for coronavirus was <a href="held-while-on-his-way-to-Uganda">held-while-on-his-way-to-Uganda</a>. The traveler, believed to be a truck driver, was held at Nimule border after he delivered goods to Juba. Uganda has increased <a href="testing-truck drivers">testing-truck drivers</a> after 11 drivers en route from Tanzania and Kenya had <a href="tested-positive">testing-truck drivers</a> after 11 drivers en route from Tanzania and Kenya had <a href="tested-positive">testing-truck drivers</a> after 12020. "Relay <a href="trucking">trucking</a>" is supposed to ensure that drivers to not cross international borders. The RRC has reported that since the confirmation of COVID-19 cases in Uganda and South Sudan, over 700 families have arrived in Wonduruba Payam of Juba County from Uganda and from other states of South Sudan.
- DEMOCRATIC REPUBLIC OF CONGO: While cargo is allowed to enter through Gangura, none has been observed during the reporting period. This is reportedly due to security concerns related to the suspected presence of the Lord's Resistance Army (LRA) along the way. Movement of persons continues to take place via smaller roads.
- CENTRAL AFRICAN REPUBLIC: The border point at Source Yubu remains shut by authorities on ground but movements continue through smaller alternative crossings.
- KENYA: Movement through Nadapal has been limited to incoming cargo.

# South Sudan COVID-19 Timeline (part 1/2: 19 March - 18 April 2020)

#### High Level Task Force

The Government of South Sudan establishes the High Level Task Force on COVID-19 led by The First Vice President Dr. Riak Machar.

#### Closure of edu. facilities

South Sudan Vice President for Service Cluster Hussein Abdelbagi Akol has decided to close all the schools, teachers training institutes and the universities across the country.

#### Uganda suspends refugee policy

Uganda's open-door policy for refugees and asylum seekers is suspended for 30 days. Refugees who are already in the country will continue to receive support.



#### 1st COVID-19 Case in SSD

The South Sudan Government confirmed its <u>first</u> case of COVID-19.




#### 4th COVID-19 Case

Education ministry to launch distance learning for students. Lessons for core subjects for primary and secondary school students will be delivered over radio stations and national television.

#### Release of 143 prisoners

Authorities in South Sudan has released 143 prisoners in an effort to combat the spread of the new coronavirus disease in crowded jails.



#### Preparedness & Response Plan

Ministry of Health releases COVID-19 Country Preparedness and Response Plan (April - September 2020).

#### South Sudan closes borders

South Sudan <u>closes all airports and seals land borders</u> for passengers. Curfew across country from 8.00PM to 6.00AM. Public institutions working half-time. First suspected case of COVID-19 tested negative.

#### Quarantine Escape

Over 500 South Sudan nationals described as returnees escape quarantine in Renk, set up at a secondary school after arriving from Sudan.

#### Closing of Wau Collective Centres

The Diocesan Major Response
Team on COVID-19 decides
to close several Wau collective
centres. As of 12 April 2020,
Nazareth, Cathedral, St. Joseph

and Lokoloko (3,743 ind. in March 2020 according to DTM population count) are empty apart from a few stranded households.

#### Suspension of inter-state travel

The Government has

suspended passenger flights as well as public and private iner-state transport for up to two weeks effective from midnight Wednesday 15 April 2020 (Communication from the presidency 25, HLTF 13 April 2020).

#### Increased testing in Juba

The HLTF directs the Ministry of Health to divide Juba into five zones and to collect over 100 samples per week per zone to enable a minimum testing capacity of 500 samples a week (Communication from the presidency 28, HLTF 16 April 2020).



#### Internal movement restrictions

#### Arrest at Nimule border

A suspected truck driver who was tested at Kenyan-Ugandan border and tested positive is return package, although not all arrested in Nimiule border have left. IOM DTM confirms crossing point when returning an increase in intended from Juba to Uganda.

#### IDPs leave Wau PoC AA

265 households (992 IDPs) registered and picked up a permanent exits from Wau PoC AA peaking between 7 and 12 April.
