ABOUT DTM

The Displacement Tracking Matrix (DTM) is a system that tracks and monitors displacement and population mobility. It is designed to regularly and systematically capture, process and disseminate information to provide a better understanding of the movements and evolving needs of displaced populations, whether on site or en route. For more information about the DTM, please visit www.displacement.iom.int/afghanistan.

In Afghanistan, DTM employs the Baseline Mobility Assessment tool, designed to track mobility, determine the population sizes and locations of forcibly displaced people, reasons for displacement, places of origin, displacement locations and times of displacement, including basic demographics, as well as vulnerabilities and priority needs. Data is collected at the settlement level, through key informant interviews, focus group discussions, and direct observations.

This provincial report summarises the DTM findings in Laghman. The data has been collected throughout 5 districts and 205 settlements in Laghman. This provincial report is supplementary to its nationwide counterpart, please see: Baseline Mobility Assessment Summary Results (November — December 2017).

DTM enables IOM and its partners to deliver evidencebased, better targeted, mobility-sensitive and sustainable humanitarian assistance, reintegration, community stabilization and development programming.

5 TARGET POPULATIONS

Through the Baseline Mobility Assessments, DTM tracks the locations, population sizes, and cross-sectoral needs of the five core target population categories:

- 1. Returnees from Abroad
- 2. Out-Migrants Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs), subdivided into the following three categories:
- 3. Arrival IDPs
- 4. Returnee IDPs
- Fled IDPs 5.

Data on population sizes for the 5 target population categories is collected by time of displacement, using each of the following time frames: 2012-2015 • 2016 • 2017.



DTM's field enumerators, District Focal Points (DFPs), collect data at the settlement level, predominantly through focus group discussions with key informants. The average size of focus groups is five key informants per group. In the rare case that DTM's District Focal Points cannot physically reach a community, due to insecurity, conflict, or risk of retaliation by anti-government elements, DFPs meet the focus groups at a safe place outside their communities or conduct the assessments by phone.

★ → RETURNEES

Returnees are Afghan nationals who have returned to Afghanistan in the assessed location after having spent at least six months abroad. This group includes both documented returnees (Afghans who were registered refugees in host countries and then requested voluntary return with UNHCR and relevant national authorities) and undocumented returnees (Afghans who did not request voluntary return with UNHCR, but rather returned spontaneously from host countries, irrespective of whether or not they were registered refugees with UNHCR and relevant national authorities).

The number of returnees in Laghman drastically increased by 127% in 2016, as compared to the period between 2012-2015. This was followed by a 86% reduction in returnees in 2017.
















★ → OUT-MIGRANTS






Returnees from Abroad | Annual Trends | Laghman





The below table shows the 20 settlements in Laghman that are most severely affected by influxes of IDPs and returnees. Overall, these 20 settlements (10% of all assessed settlements in the province) host 55% of the total provincial inflow. This demonstrates a high concentration of IDPs and returnees within specific settlements. The most affected settlement is Tag, in Alingar, which hosts 9,013 IDPs and returnees. Accordingly, Alingar, in the east of the province, is the most affected district, hosting 32% of total inflow. This is in spite of the fact that only 10 settlements were assessed within this district, as compared to an average of 50 settlements over the other four assessed districts of Laghman.



STORIES FROM THE DISPLACED

BORN AND RAISED IN PAKISTAN, BUT **RETURNEES TO AFGHANISTAN**

Farid Nabi is an Afghan was born in Peshawar, Pakistan and had grown up in Kacha Garhi refugee camp. He is married with three daughters and a son who were all also born in Pakistan. In 2017, Pakistani officials apprehended him for having incorrect documents. He was arrested and sent to jail, where he remained for 45 days. During this time, Farid tells us that his family had no knowledge of his whereabouts and he worried that they might presume him dead.

Given the protracted nature of the Afghan conflict, many Afghans have spent their entire lives in Pakistan. Many of whom, like Farid, are born in raised in the country. Despite this, without appropriate documentation (which can be hard to obtain), they are at high risk of deportation and police harassment.

After Farid's release, he was deported to the Afghan side of the Torkham border. By the time he managed to get back to Pakistan to reunite with his family, Farid tells us that he was met by police violence and intimidation. As such, the family decided to move back to their home province of Laghman, Afghanistan- a place that they had visited, but never lived in.

Between 2012 and 2017, almost 80,000 Afghan nationals have returned from Pakistan to Laghman.

Back in Laghman, Farid is disheartened by the living conditions, and fears for his family's present and future situation. "The life is here is so different compared to Pakistan," Farid explains. "We had a lot of services in Pakistan and life was much cheaper. But, that doesn't worry me the most. The thing that I am most worried about is that my children cannot go to schools here."

Our DTM reporting team found that the most significant obstacles to school attendance in Laghman are distance, affordability, and culture prohibiting female attendance in schools.
