COVID-19 outbreak

During the reporting period, 248 COVID-19 were identified in Sebha and the surrounding areas, bringing the total to 326 confirmed cases in Southern Libya. On 27 June, 2020 the local authorities imposed a lockdown in all the cities in southern Libya.

Mobility Restrictions

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, Libyan authorities initiated public health measures in March 2020 aimed at curbing the spread of COVID-19. These measures include travel and mobility restrictions due to partial closure of airports, points of entry (POE) along land borders. On 05 May 2020, Libyan authorities started the repatriation of Libyans stranded abroad through Misrata, Benghazi Benina and Al Abraq airports, as well as Emsaed and Ras Ajdir land border crossing points.

During the reporting period, around 235 Libyans reportedly returned from Egypt through Emsaed, while almost 90 Libyans returned from Tunisia through Ras Ajdir land border crossing point.

In June, around 3,400 Libyans returned from abroad through Misrata Airport, and around 1,900 Libyans returned through Benina Airport in Benghazi and Al Abraq Airport in Al Bayda.

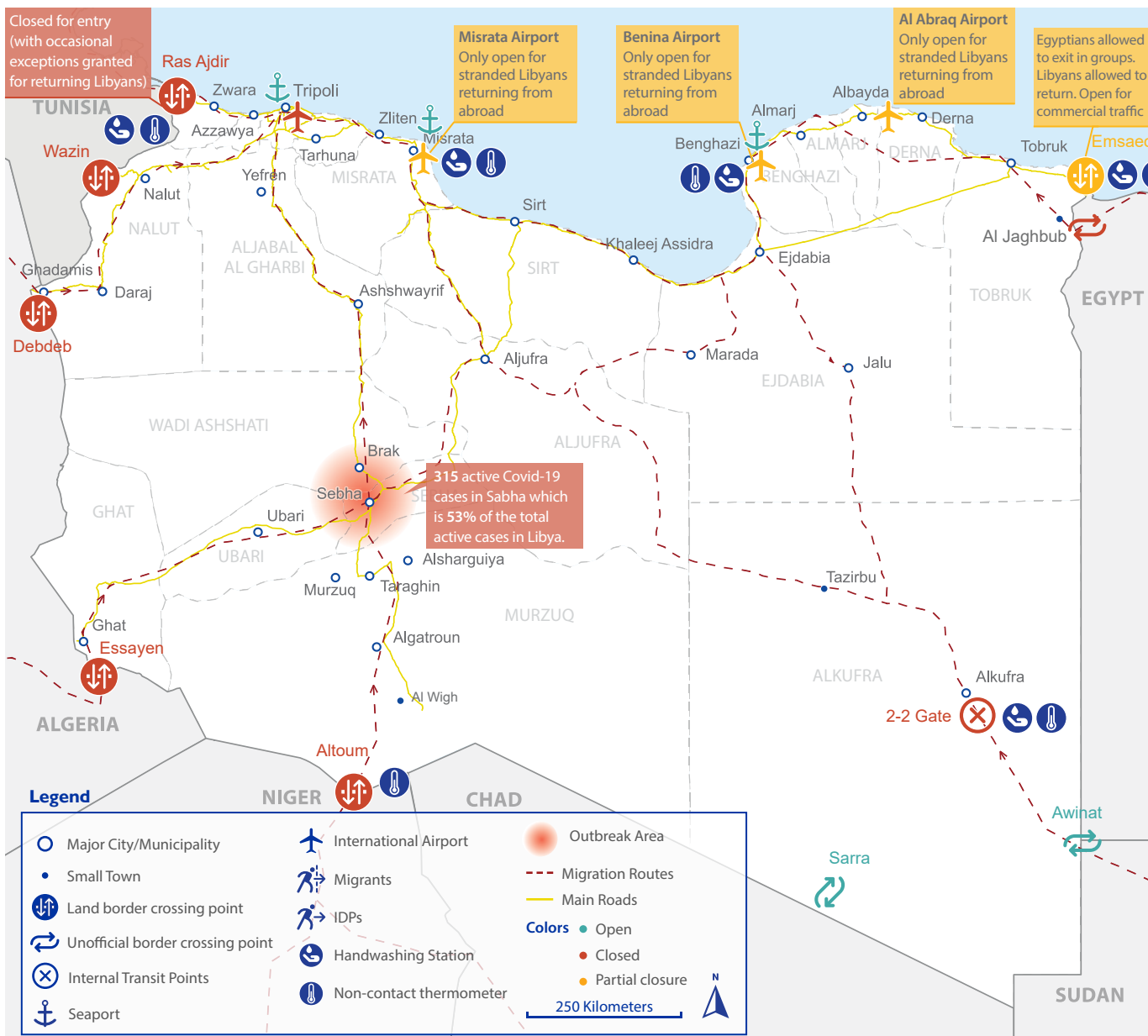
Local authorities in border cities such as Al Kufra and Al Jaghub have implemented stricter measures by implementing municipal entry restrictions into their cities.

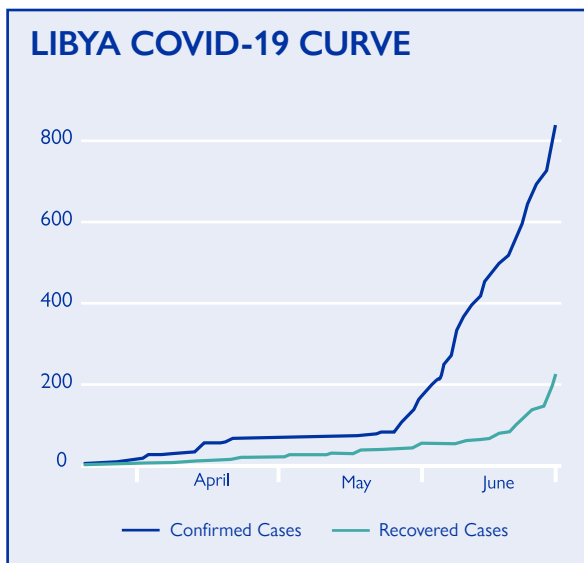
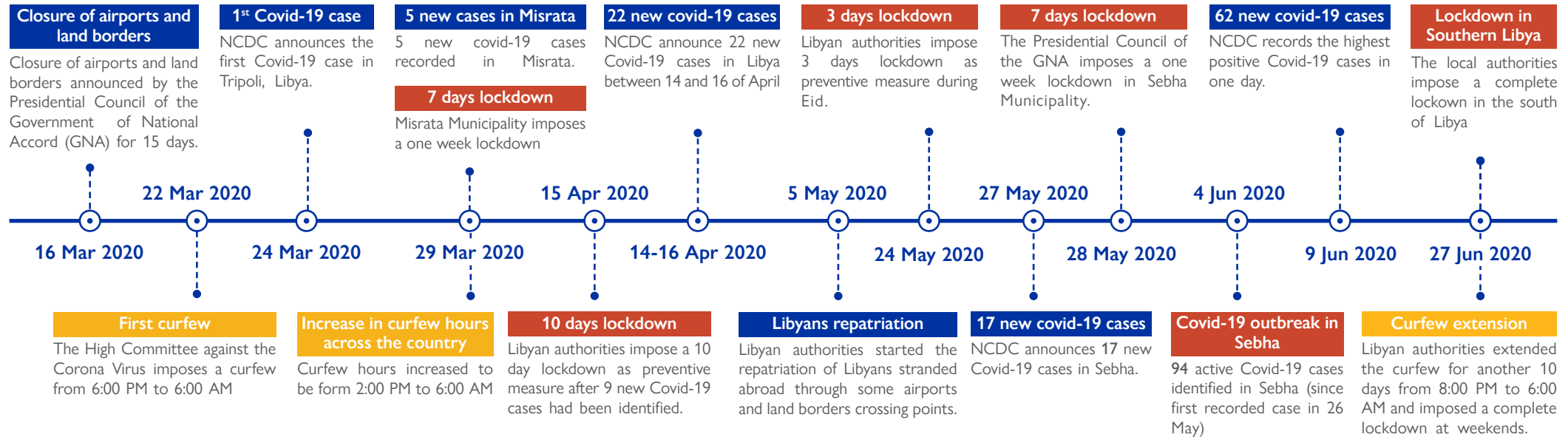

IMPACT OF MOBILITY RESTRICTIONS IN LIBYA*

IMPACT ON LOCAL RESIDENTS

In **5%** of assessed locations, residents were reported to be unable to move freely within the municipality (due to the mobility restrictions/curfew)

In **18%** of assessed locations, residents were reported to be unable to leave the municipality or return (due to the mobility restrictions/curfew)

IMPACT ON MIGRANTS

In **25%** of the assessed locations. Migrants were reported to be unable to move freely within the municipality (due to the mobility restrictions/curfew)

In **98%** of the locations, migrants who rely on daily labour were reported to have been negatively affected due to Covid-19 induced slowdown in economic activities.
