

# PROFILE OF MIGRANTS FROM SUDAN

#### **BACKGROUND**

There are 123,607 migrants from Sudan in Libya, which account for 18 per cent of the total migrant population in the country — the third most-represented nationality. The majority of migrants from Sudan surveyed by DTM in Libya in 2023 were employed, single, male, between 20 and 39 years old and had not completed a middle-school level education or above.





A smaller percentage of migrants from Sudan (33%) than average (44%) were employed in elementary occupations, which consist of simple and routine tasks that mainly require the use of hand-held tools and often some physical effort such as manufacturing or factory work, construction and mining (without specific skills), cleaning, garbage collection, kitchen work and itinerant retailers.
