

Al Manaqil, Al Jazirah UPDATE 2: 31 AUGUST 2022



EMERGENCY EVENT TRACKING Data collection: 21 August 2022



As a subcomponent of the Mobility Tracking methodology (Round Four), the Emergency Event Tracking (EET) tool is deployed to track sudden displacement, provide more frequent updates on the scale of displacement, and quantify the affected population when needed.

Event Overview






IDP households

DTM teams activated EET to monitor the displacement of individuals affected by heavy rains and flooding in locations across Al Manaqil locality, Al Jazirah state on 12 August 2022. For more information, please see EET Al Managil, Al Jazirah (Update 001). Additional locations, not previously accessible, were visited during the second round of the data collection on 21 August 2022. The second EET update estimates that a total number of 8,715 individuals (1,743 households) are currently displaced across Kogeila, Kambo Burkool, Alabata, Alabata Aboudy, Alrizigat, Alzraeb, Block 42 and Block 69, Garo, Karakat 26, Umgargor, Wad Abhajab and Wad Sareer Aldar (46%), in addition to other villages (54%) across Al Manaqil locality in Al Jazirah state. The IDP caseload (100%) was originally displaced from the above-mentioned villages and currently seeking shelters in gathering sites located at the higher grounds.

Upon verification, DTM field teams have confirmed that no individuals were killed or injured. There are at least 1,382 reported cases of lost goods, livestock, and/or cattle. All displaced individuals are Sudanese nationals. At least 873 cases of additional vulnerabilities in need of assistance and support were identified by key informants through DTM's Protection indicator. Additionally, DTM Sudan estimates that there are approximately 1,307 persons with disabilities among the IDP caseload.* Based on a ranking scale, and the three priority needs across the caseload are Non-Food Items, Food, and Emergency Shelter.





