EMERGENCY EVENT TRACKING: Misterei and Ag Geneina, West Darfur

UPDATE 3: 23 August 2020

The DTM Emergency Event Tracking (EET) is deployed to track sudden displacement and population movements, provide more frequent updates on the scale of displacement and quantify the affected population when needed. As a subcomponent of the new Mobility Tracking methodology in Sudan (Round one), and activated on a need basis, EET utilises a broad network of key informants to capture best estimates of the affected population presence per location - a useful tool for humanitarian response planning and design.

Event Overview






DTM teams activated EET to monitor the displacement of individuals affected by the ongoing violent clashes between Arab and Masalit tribes in Beida and Geneina locality, West Darfur, since 18-20 July 2020. For more information, please see EET Misterei and Ag Geneina, West Darfur 002.

The third update estimates a total number of 3,217 individuals (596 households) dispersed across Misterei, Beida locality, and 9,722 individuals (1,981 households) dispersed across Ag Geneina town, Geneina locality. All IDPs are currently sheltering in schools or other public buildings. At least 1,895 individuals (15%) report additional vulnerabilities in need of assistance and support.

Since the second EET (4 August 2020), there has been a decrease of 7,033 individuals displaced (35%) and a decrease of 1,783 households displaced (41%), largely due to the IOM/UNHCR distribution of 2,299 emergency shelter and non-food item kits in Misterei. Upon receiving these emergency kits, some families have reportedly returned to their locations of origin to begin building/rebuilding their own shelters.





Return Intention

Data collected through the return intention indicator suggests that the majority of the IDPs intend to return to their locations of origin upon improvement of the security situation.




