Kutum, North Darfur UPDATE 1: 28 MARCH 2022



EMERGENCY EVENT TRACKING Data collection: 23 March 2022

The DTM Emergency Event Tracking (EET) is deployed to track sudden displacement and population movements, provide more frequent updates on the scale of displacement, and quantify the affected population when needed. As a subcomponent of the new Mobility Tracking methodology in Sudan (Round Three), and activated on a need basis, EET utilises a broad network of key informants to capture best estimates of the affected population presence per location - a useful tool for humanitarian response planning and design.

Event Overview






IDP households

DTM teams activated EET to monitor the displacement of individuals affected by inter-communal violence between members of the Fur and Arab tribes travelling between Toom village and Kutum town in Kutum locality, North Darfur on 20 March 2022. In retaliation, members of the Arab tribe attacked Toom and Meri villages located approximately 25 km northwest of Kutum town. The first EET update estimates that a total number of 2,094 individuals (370 households) are currently seeking refuge in an open area approximately 3 km north of Meri village (100%). The IDP caseload was originally displaced from Toom village (78%), and Meri village


All displaced individuals are Sudanese nationals. At least 213 cases of additional vulnerabilities in need of further support and assistance were identified by key informants through DTM's protection indicator. Additionally, DTM Sudan estimates that there are 314 persons with disabilities among the displaced caseload.* DTM teams report that no individuals were killed, and five individuals have sustained injuries, whilst 370 families report lost personal belongings, crops, and/or livestock. Based on a ranking scale, the three main priority needs for the displaced caseload are Emergency Shelter, Non-Food Items, and Food.






Return Intention

Data collected through the return intention indicator suggests that all IDPs (100%) intend to return to their locations of origin upon improvement of the security situation.
