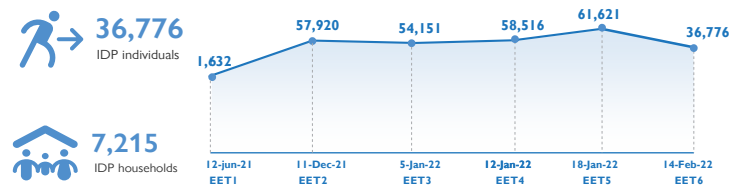

CONFLICT



The DTM Emergency Event Tracking (EET) is deployed to track sudden displacement and population movements, provide more frequent updates on the scale of displacement, and quantify the affected population when needed. As a subcomponent of the new Mobility Tracking methodology in Sudan (Round Three), and activated on a need basis, EET utilises a broad network of key informants to capture best estimates of the affected population presence per location – a useful tool for humanitarian response planning and design.

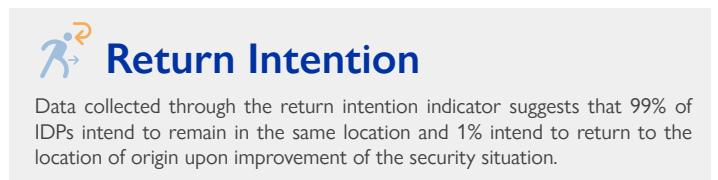
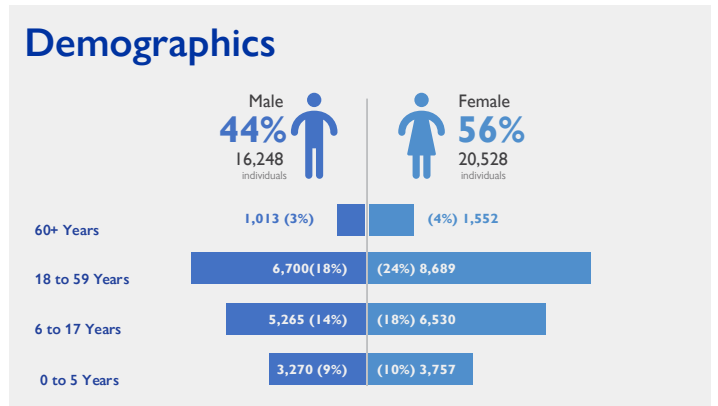
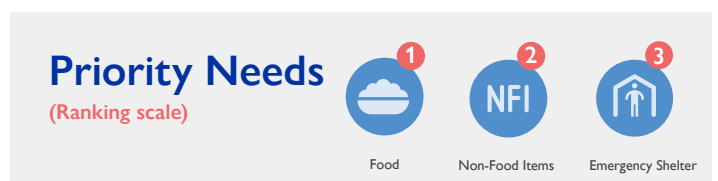
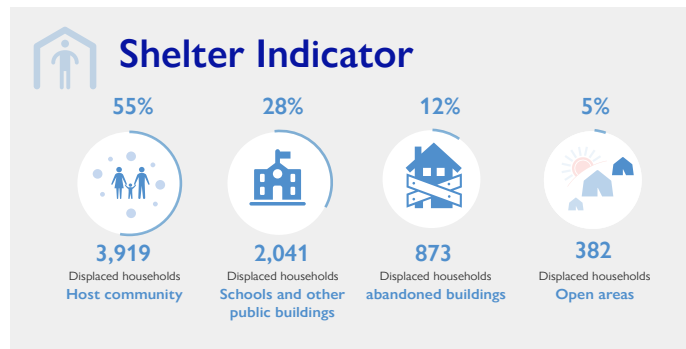
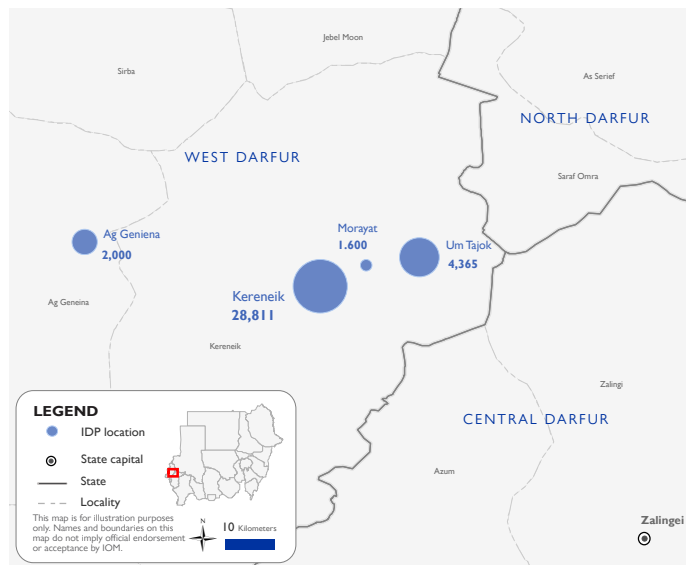
Event Overview



DTM teams activated EET to monitor the displacement of individuals affected by inter-communal violence in Kereneik locality, West Darfur. Clashes erupted on 4 December over a property dispute at a local market involving Arab nomads and Masalit tribe. Field teams report that situation in Kereneik town calms down and more than half of the IDP caseload have returned to their places of origin. This includes villages of Hi Lima, Hi Alsehrej, Hi Abou, Hi Al Mdaris and Hi Al Naser.

The sixth EET update estimates a total number of 36,776 individuals (7,215 households) currently seeking shelter in Kereneik town (79%), Um Tajok (12%) and Morayat village (4%) in Kereneik locality, West Darfur, as well as in Ag Geneina Town (5%) in Ag Geneina locality, West Darfur. The IDP caseload was originally displaced from Kereneik/Abuja camp (42%), Um Dowin (24%), Hi Alsehrej (4%), Dafour village (3%), Hi Al Jabal (1%) and other locations across Kereneik (23%) and Ag Geneina (3%) localities, West Darfur.

DTM field teams have confirmed, upon reverification, that at least 67 individuals were killed with a further 78 individuals sustaining injuries. A total of seven individuals report lost goods/livestock and cattle. All displaced individuals are Sudanese nationals. In the current IDP caseload, DTM teams identified at least 6,890 cases of additional vulnerabilities in need of assistance and support. Based on a ranking scale, the three priority needs across the caseload are Food, Non-Food Items and Emergency Shelter.
