


DISPLACEMENT TRACKING MATRIX - Nigeria

EMERGENCY TRACKING TOOL (ETT)

The DTM Emergency Tracking Tool (ETT) is deployed to track and to collect information on large and sudden population movements, provide frequent updates on the scale of displacement and quantify the affected population when needed. As a subcomponent of the Mobility Tracking methodology in Nigeria, ETT utilises direct observation and a broad network of key informants to capture best estimates of the affected population per location, enabling targeted humanitarian response planning.




Between 27 June and 04 July 2021, a total of 1,939 movements were recorded in the states of Adamawa and Borno. The recorded movements consisted of 1,475 arrivals and 464 departures. Arrivals were recorded at locations in Askira/Uba, Bama, Gwoza, Hawul, Konduga, Monguno and Ngala Local Government Areas (LGAs) of the most conflict-affected state of Borno and in Fufore, Girei, Gombi, Hong, Lamurde, Madagali, Maiha, Michika, Mubi North, Mubi South, Numan, Song, Yola North and Yola South LGAs of Adamawa.

Departures were recorded in Askira/Uba, Gwoza, Kala/Balge and Konduga LGA of Borno, and Fufore, Lamurde, Madagali, Maiha, Michika, Mubi South, Numan, Song, Yola North and Yola South LGAs of Adamawa.

ETT assessments identified the following movement triggers: voluntary relocation (579 individuals or 30%), poor living conditions (506 individuals or 26%), seasonal farming (491 individuals or 25%), improved security (161 individuals or 8%), conflict/attack (110 individuals or 6%) and fear of attack (92 individuals or 5%).

SUMMARY OF MAJOR MOVEMENTS

Bama: 233 arrivals were recorded in Bama LGA of Borno State. The arrivals included 164 individuals from Marwa region in Cameroon, 64 individuals from within Bama LGA in Borno State and 5 individuals from Gwoza LGA in Borno State. Seventy-three per cent of the movements recorded were voluntary relocation and 27 per cent of the movements recorded were due to poor living conditions.

Lamurde: 187 arrivals and 19 departures were recorded in Lamurde LGA of Adamawa State. The arrivals included 142 individuals from Guyuk LGA in Adamawa State and 45 individuals from Kaltungo LGA in Gombe State. All individuals reported that their intended destination was within Lamurde LGA in Adamawa State. Ninety-one per cent of the movements recorded were due to seasonal farming and 9 per cent of the movements recorded were voluntary relocation.

Askira/Uba: 121 arrivals and 62 departures were recorded in Askira/Uba LGA of Borno State. The arrivals included 61 individuals from Hong LGA in Adamawa State, 53 individuals from within Askira/Uba LGA in Borno State and 7 individuals from Jalingo LGA in Taraba State. The departures included 34 individuals to Yola South LGA in Adamawa State, 17 individuals to Madagali LGA in Adamawa State and 11 individuals to Chibok LGA in Borno State. Fifty-seven per cent of the movements recorded were due to poor living conditions, 33 per cent of the movements recorded were a result of the improved security situation in areas of origin and 10 per cent of the movements recorded were voluntary relocation.

Michika: 83 arrivals and 74 departures were recorded in Michika LGA of Adamawa State. The arrivals included 33 individuals from Gombi LGA in Adamawa State, 26 individuals from Yola South LGA in Adamawa State and 24 individuals from Maiha LGA in Adamawa State. All individuals reported that their intended destination was Gombi LGA in Adamawa State. Fifty-three per cent of the movements recorded were a result of the improved security situation in areas of origin and 47 per cent of the movements recorded were due to seasonal farming.

IOM's Emergency Tracking Tool (ETT) is deployed in Nigeria's northeastern states. Only Local Government Areas (LGAs) in which the IDP population changed since the latest DTM round of assessments are represented in this report. The data has been collected by DTM staff deployed at the locations listed and cross-checked with the partners present on the ground.

NEW ARRIVAL MALNUTRITION SCREENING SUMMARY (CHILDREN 6-59 MONTHS)

An exhaustive nutrition screening using mid-upper arm circumference (MUAC) and oedema for acute malnutrition was conducted by sector partners for 81 children of 6-59 months. Of the 81 children screened, the MUAC reading indicated that 4 children were recorded in the red category, 15 children in the yellow category and 62 children in the green category. No case of oedema was reported in the 4 LGAs assessed.

The results also included 23 children who arrived from neighbouring countries (8 in Bama and 15 in Ngala). Of all the 23 children measured, 1 was recorded in the red category, 7 in the yellow category and the remaining 15 in the green category. All children found with acute malnutrition have been admitted for treatment. Please note, the data presented are not surveillance results and should be interpreted with caution.
