



Within the period of 12 – 18 September 2018, a total of 5,991 movements were recorded, including 5,431 arrivals and 560 departures. These movements occurred at locations in Askira/Uba, Bama, Damboa, Dikwa, Gwoza, Hawul, Kala/Balge, Konduga, Kukawa, Mafa, Magumeri, Maiduguri, Mobbar, Monguno and Ngala Local Government Areas (LGAs) of Borno state, and locations in Demsa, Fufore, Girei, Gombi, Hong, Madagali, Maiha, Mayo-Belwa, Michika, Mubi-North, Mubi-South, Numan, Song, Yola-North and Yola-South LGAs of Adamawa state.

Assessments identified the following main triggers of movements: ongoing conflict (61%), poor living conditions (16%), voluntary relocation (9%), fear of attacks (6%), improved security (3%), farming activities (2%), involuntary relocation (2%) and flooding (1%).

## Summary of major movements

**DEMSA:** 2,232 arrivals and 53 departures were recorded at Demsa LGA of Adamawa state. These include 2,202 arrivals at Dong ward from Bolki ward of Numan LGA due to recent conflict in the area, 19 arrivals at Borrong ward from Nassarawo ward of Demsa due to flooding, 28 individuals who left Dong ward for Yola-South LGA due to fear of attacks, and 25 individuals who left Borrong ward for Yola-North due to flooding. Urgent needs include food, shelter and sanitation.

**NUMAN:** 1,013 arrivals and 28 departures were recorded at Numan LGA of Adamawa state. These include 844 arrivals at Gamadio ward and 169 arrivals at Numan II ward of Numan LGA. The arrivals were due to recent conflict at Bolki ward of Numan LGA. 28 individuals departed Numan II ward for Yola-North LGA due to fears of attack. Urgent needs include food, shelter and health support.

**BAMA:** 408 arrivals were recorded in Bama LGA of Borno state. These include 288 arrivals at GSSSS Camp and 161 arrivals at Banki Camp from surrounding wards. The main movement triggers include poor living conditions and voluntary relocation.

**ASKIRA/UBA:** 309 arrivals and 9 departures were recorded in Askira/Uba LGA of Borno state. These include 161 arrivals at Lassa ward from Kopa/Multhafu ward of Askira/Uba due to fear of attacks, 122 arrivals from surrounding areas, 26 arrivals from Adamawa and 9 departures from Uvu/Uda ward for Suleja in Niger state. The main movement triggers include fear of attacks and poor living conditions.

MONGUNO: 246 arrivals were recorded at Monguno LGA of Borno state. These include 179 arrivals at Monguno town (103 individuals), GDSS Camp (45 individuals) and GSSSS Camp (31 individuals) from Gudumbali ward of Guzamala LGA, and 67 arrivals at Water-Board Camp from Mairari ward of Guzamala LGA. The movements were triggered by recent conflict in Guzamala LGA.

### New Arrival Malnutrition Screening Summary (children 6-59 months)

An exhaustive nutrition screening using mid upper arm circumference (MUAC) and signs of Oedema was conducted by Sector partners for 208 children. Of the 208 children screened, the MUAC reading for 35 children (30 from inaccessible and 5 from accessible areas) was in the Red category, 34 were in the Yellow category and 139 were measured in the Green category. No case of Oedema was reported in any of the 7 LGAs where screening was conducted.

This result also covers 26 children from neighbouring countries (9 screened at Mobbar LGA and 17

screened at Ngala LGA); out of which 20 children were in the Green category, 4 in Yellow and 2 in the Red category.

All children found with severe acute malnutrition have been admitted for treatment.
