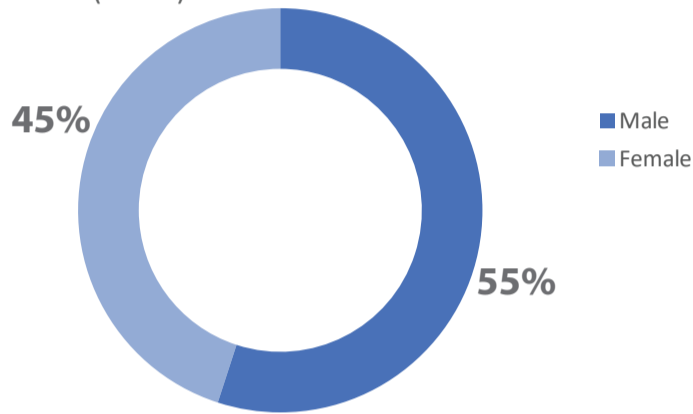
**OVERVIEW**

The lingering conflict in Nigeria's North East Zone has been the major cause of widespread population displacement. Over 2 million persons have been forced to leave their areas of residence in search of safety and security in neighbouring Wards and LGAs.

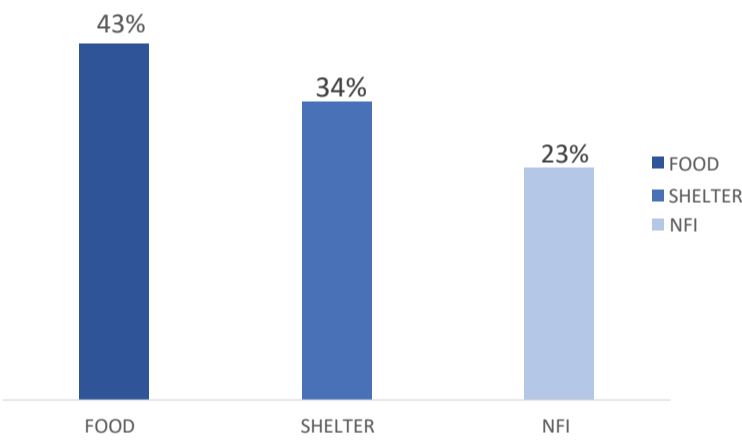
On 01 and 02 March 2021, a Non-State Armed Group (NSAG) carried out an attack in Dikwa LGA. On 18 April 2021, Dikwa LGA was attacked once more by a Non-State Armed Group, leading to a new wave of population displacement. Following the attacks, flow monitoring assessments were conducted by DTM field staff with the purpose of informing the humanitarian community and government partners, and enabling targeted response. DTM enumerators were deployed in the transit point Dikwa Motor Park in the ward Dusuman in Jere LGA. IDPs passing through the transit point were asked about their intended destinations and most needed assistance.

As a result of the attacks, between 16 and 22 April 2021, a total of 1,551 individuals were displaced from Dikwa LGA towards the LGAs Jere and Maiduguri Metropolitan Council. They arrived at Dikwa Motor Park from various camps and communities in Dikwa LGA. No displacements were recorded on 19 April 2021 due to the restriction of movement following the attack on 18 April 2021. As presented on the map below, their intended destinations were locations in the LGAs Jere and Maiduguri Metropolitan Council in Borno State.

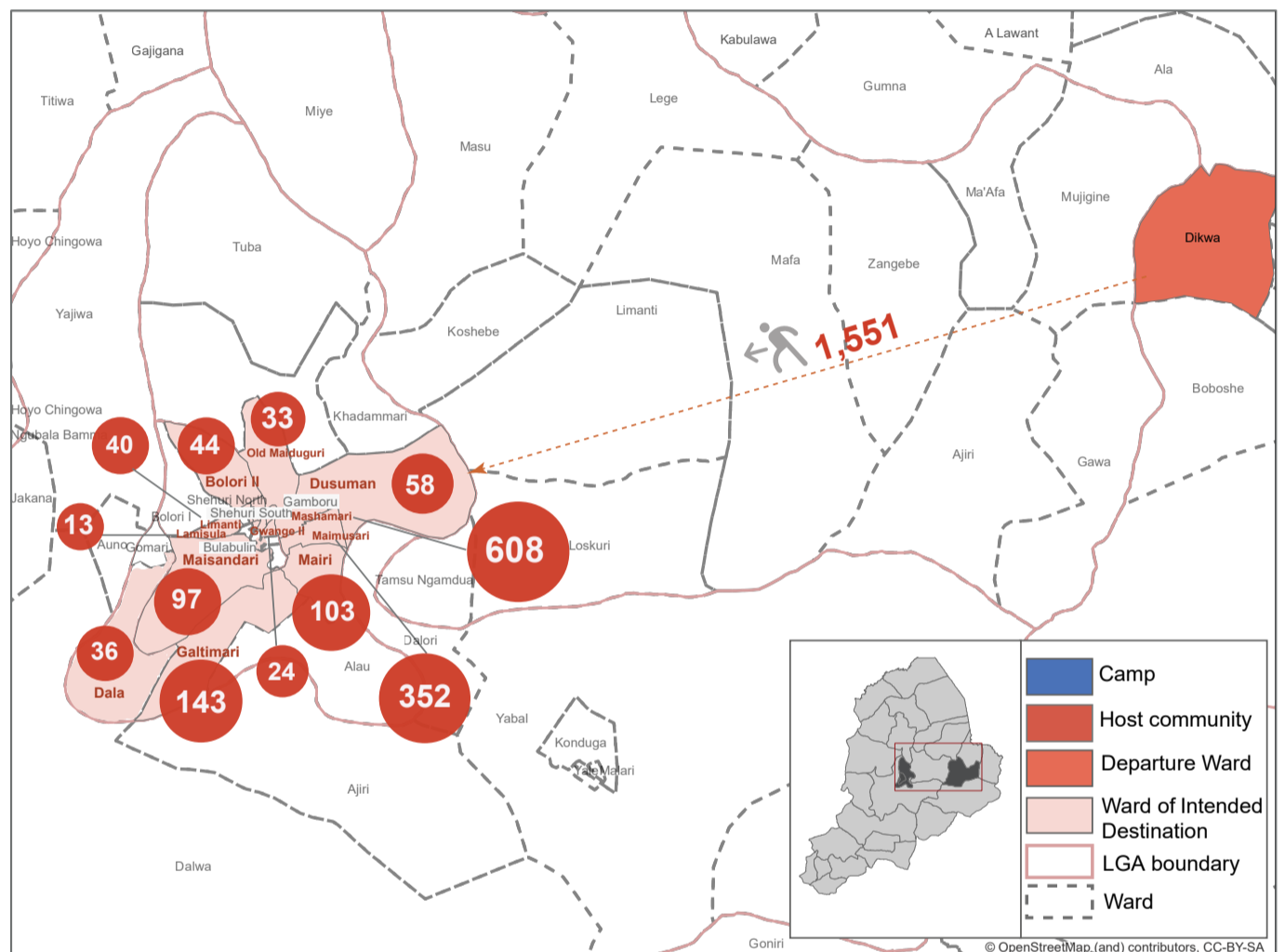
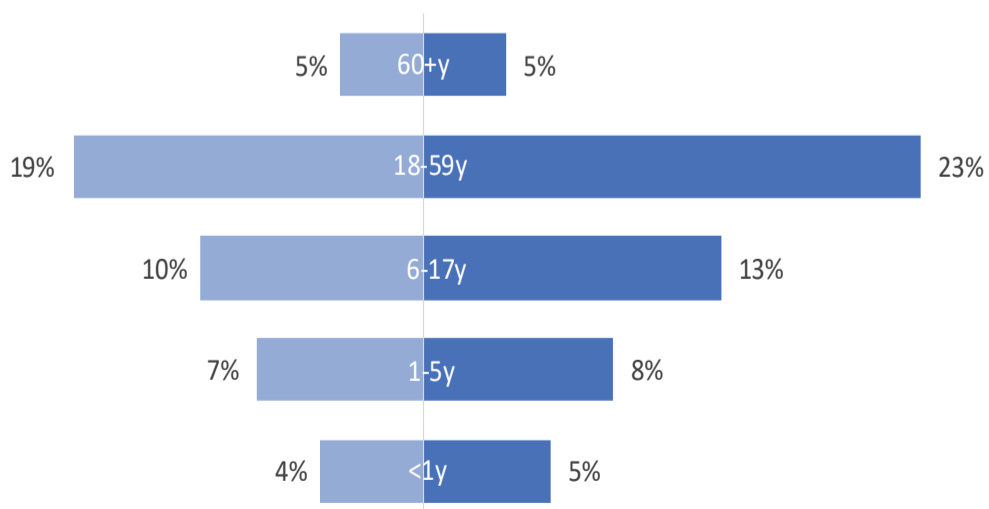
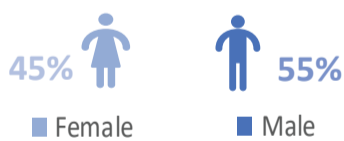
**GENDER (FIG. 1)**



**MOST NEEDED ASSISTANCE (FIG. 2)**

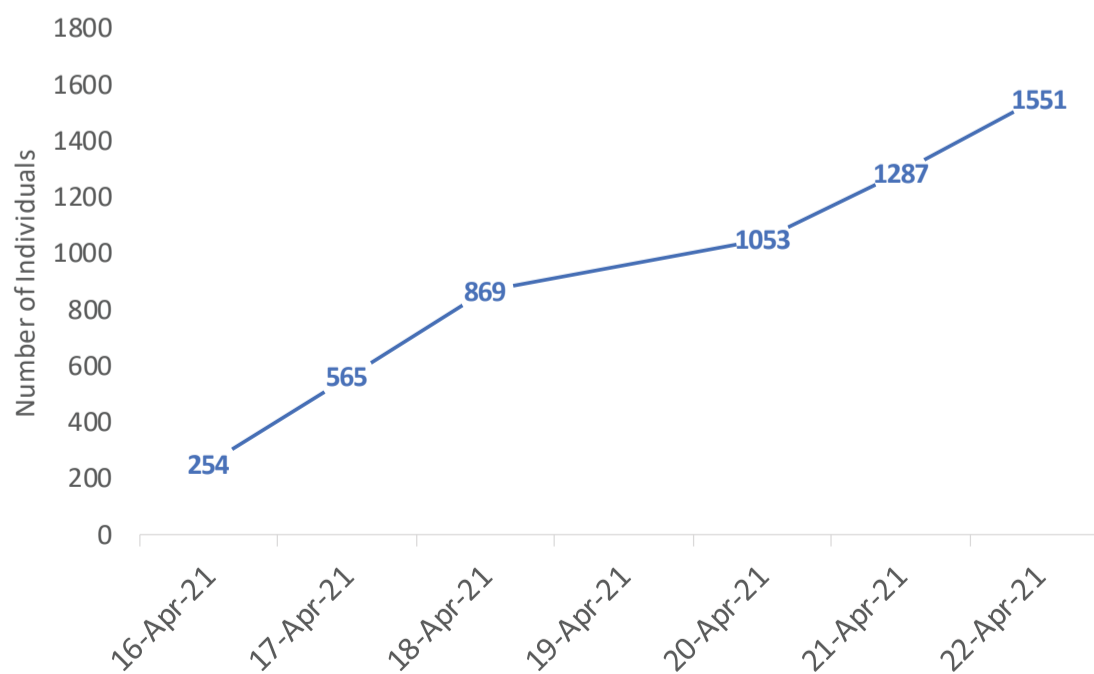


**AGE CLASSIFICATION (FIG. 3)**

## Sectorial information on departure location - Dikwa



The General Food Distribution (GFD) by Care International for the month of March 2021 took place in the week following the attack. The camps have been covered, they are currently distributing in the host communities.



Acted commenced distribution of NFIs and Emergency shelter kits in camps in Dikwa. So far, they have attended Mohammed Kyari, Shehuri Mudu Kasa and Shehu Masta II Camps. The distribution and registration are still ongoing. The objective of the emergency shelter kits is to support the IDPs with shelter needs during the upcoming rainy season.



Care International and the National Youth Council of Nigeria (NYCN) distributed NFIs to a targeted vulnerable set of beneficiaries in Mohammed Kyari Camp and Ajari Camp. This has reduced the NFI needs in the locations where they were distributed.



The ICRC clinic in 1000 Camp and UNICEF clinic in Dikwa host community continues to support IDPs in and around the affected communities. However, these clinics do not suffice to meet the needs of the IDPs. The ICRC clinic in Shehu Masta II Camp has not been functional since the previous attack during which drugs and other medical items were taken from the clinic by insurgents. Until today, the clinic remains closed.



IOM repaired the borehole in Masarmari Camp in Dikwa. Meanwhile, COVID-19 sensitization and hygiene promotion is on-going in various camps by IOM WASH volunteers. SI has maintained constant water truck supply to Ministry of Works Camp and Shuwari Host Community. There is always general environmental sanitation carried out in the weekends in the camps in Dikwa.
