FLOOD RAPID NEEDS ASSESSMENT - KOGI STATE (15 November 2022)



KEY HIGHLIGHTS



The rainy season in Nigeria typically occurs annually with the greatest concentration of precipitation between the months of June and September. Many states in Nigeria have been affected by unprecedented heavy rainfalls and floods have devastated various communities. Infrastructure, crops, and shelters have been damaged which led to decimated livelihoods and the displacement of numerous households. Over the past months, climate variability and the release of excess water from the Lagdo dam in northern Cameroon, have worsened the flood situation and has resulted in a renewed situation of widespread displacement across Nigeria.¹

Between 28 October and 1 November 2022, DTM, in collaboration with the National Emergency Management Agency (NEMA), the Kogi State Emergency Management Agency (KGSEMA) and the Nigerian Red Cross Society (NCRS) identified 31 locations in nine LGAs in Kogi State that were affected by the floods and/or received IDPs that are currently displaced as a result of the floods. Through a network of 34 key informants and field focal points, and in close coordination with other humanitarian partners and local authorities on the ground, DTM conducted assessments in these locations to inform the humanitarian community of the main needs, vulnerabilities and mobility intentions of the affected population.

FINDINGS


In the nine (9) Local Government Areas (LGAs) of Kogi state that were assessed, DTM identified 472,218 individuals in 74,436 households that were affected by the floods. These affected individuals included both IDPs that were living in camp-like settings, those displaced by the flood into the host communities and residents impacted by the floods but remained in their communities.

Ibaji LGA recorded the highest number of affected persons with 133,395 individuals or 28 per cent of the affected population in the State. Kogi was followed by Lokoja LGA with 73,201 individuals or 16 per cent of the affected population. Meanwhile, Omala LGA had the least number of affected individuals. All affected persons in Eroko/Abom of Bassa LGA (1,023 individuals) were displaced from Bassa LGA and are currently hosted in Ajaokuta LGA.

Eighty-four per cent (51%) of the houses of the affected population were either partially damaged (18%) or completely damaged (33%).




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


Fig 1.2 TIME SINCE DISPLACEMENT



NEEDS

Shelter is the most urgent need of the affected population as reported in 28 locations assessed. Shelter was followed by Food, mentioned in 10 per cent of the locations assessed (or 3 locations). Among the other needs, Non-food items(NFIs), health related services, WASH, MHPSS were the ones mentioned in descending order in fig 1.3B below.



Fig 1.7A Access to water





Fig 1.6A Health facilities available





Fig 1.6C The top three difficulties encountered when attempting to access health services or treatment

















Fig 1.7C Water sources available (multiple responses)




Fig 1.8A Shelters habitable but need repair






Fig 1.8C Shelters completely destroyed















Most preferred modality of intervention: **Hybrid.**²
