

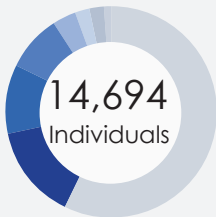
Overview

Since the conflict between the Sudanese Armed Forces (SAF) and the Rapid Support Forces (RSF) erupted in Khartoum-Sudan, clashes further spread to other States within the country. As of 27 January 2024, over 447,000 individuals had crossed into South Sudan through Wunthow (Juda) point of entry in Renk. The majority are South Sudanese (75.9%), followed by Sudanese (23.8%) and other nationalities (0.3%). The population of Renk TC and its adjacent area was 19,360 individuals (an average of 3,872 households) during the reporting period.

On 27 January 2024, the IOM's Displacement Tracking Matrix (DTM) in collaboration with WFP, ACTED, LWF, and Save the Children conducted a rapid intention survey in Renk TC and its adjacent area to understand the return intentions of the population, preferred destinations of return as well as reasons for choosing to remain in the transit center.

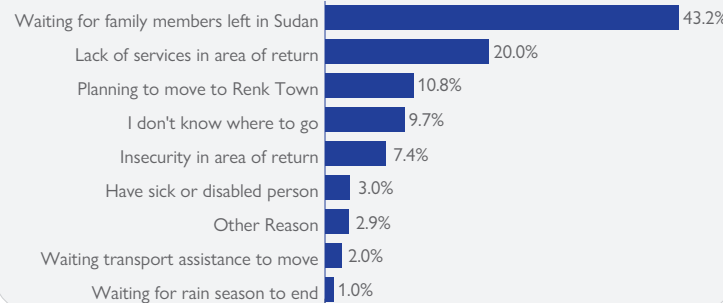
Intentions of returnees

79.8% of returnees intend to go to their areas of origin (71.8%) or move to other areas within South Sudan 8.0%)

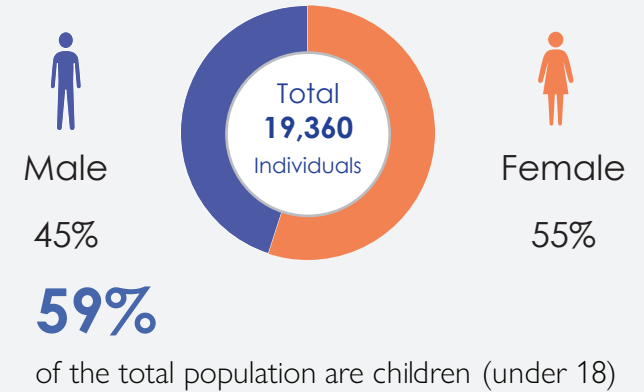

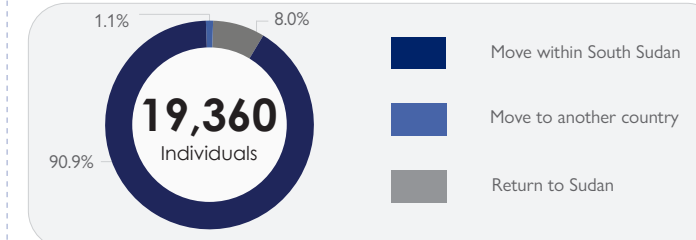
20.2% of returnees intend to remain at the Renk TC for the short-term indicating these reasons



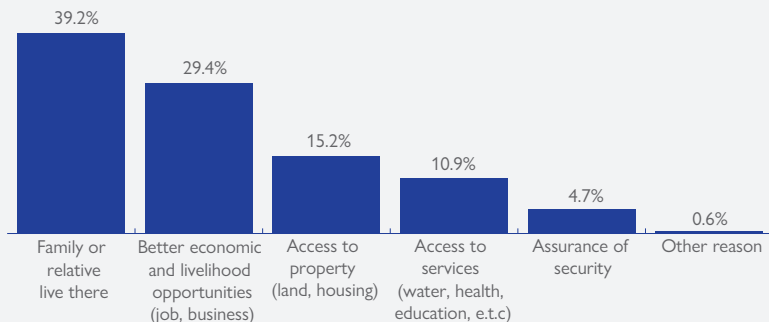

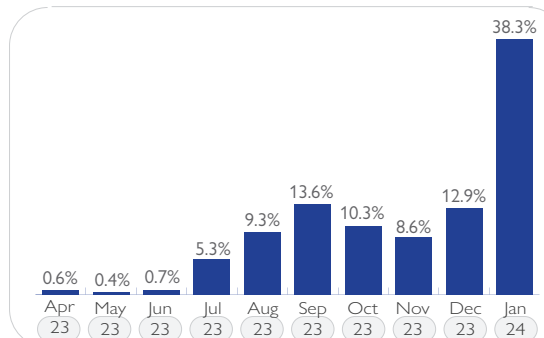
Intention of population at Renk TC
